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





While a gentleman would do so anyway, we think that all Americans should doff their hats to Congresswoman Cecil M. Harden, of Indiana, and make a deep bow. As chairman (or should it be chairwoman?) of the House Subcommittee on Intergovernmental Relations, Mrs. Harden has been leading her co-workers through the mud of ferrous scrap-yards, the perils of paint and box factories, down the shining lengths of rope-walks and through the heady atmosphere of coffee-roasting plants - just to see what the government is doing in such businesses.

It is Mrs. Harden's position that "many of these activities that use taxes but pay none, and reduce the tax base, will not stand that light of objective scrutiny, and we are going to see that they are all examined before we are through."

But, through or not, Mrs. Harden and her conferees appear already to have a convert in Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson who has issued a directive stating: the Department of Defense supports the basic principle that free competitive enterprise should be fostered by the government," and that it is the Department's policy not to engage in the operation of industrial or commercial type facilities unless it can be demonstrated that it is necessary for the government to perform the required work or service."

As of now, the Army, Navy and Air Force are looking over their collection of 61 scrap yards around the 5. with instructions to report on how come regular, commercial scrap yards can't handle this work for them. And we hope, along with Mrs. Harden, that similar action develops on all the other fronts where government is in competition with its texpayers.

Two years ago, Mrs. Harden's group began asking Uncle Sam why he was roasting coffee for the saldlers and sailors. At that time the National Coffee Association thought that was alright. Now, however, the association is urging the government to let the professionals

Perhaps Mrs. Marden can rouse some more trade associations to the need of protecting their members against tax-free competition,

In his State of the Union address delivered to a joint session of Congress last February second, President Eisenhower said: "Most of these particular resource problems pertain to the Department of Interior. Another of matter deserves attention. The platforms of both political parties promised statehood to Hawaii. The people of that territory have earned that status. Statehood should be granted promptly with the first election sched-

It now seems very probable that Hawaiian statehood will be among the first acts of Congress — also that Hawaii's first election will be "scheduled for 1954". when the Islands will elect two Republican senators.

We wondered last February why our "island possessions" should take precedence over our peninsular possessions. Alaska, after all, is not only the northwest gateway to our own continent, but has been American - in fact, in spirit, and in performance — since we bought this prodigious territory from Russia in 1867.

But it now appears that the resources to which the President referred did not involve the fabulous wealth of mines and fisheries with which Nature invested Alaska, not even the resource of strategic location. Rather, it seems, "these particular resource problems" concerned political resources rather than natural or tactical.

We do not think anyone objects to the admission of Hawaii . . . but Alaska was in line first. What a pity this mighty dominion can be expected to produce only Democratic senators in 1954!

Chain Store Story

On observer of changing national trends and attitudes recently observed that the chain store has immensely improved the efficiency and economy of distribution, to the vast benefit of the consumer. Yet, ironically, the development of the chain idea was fought bitterly, strong efforts were made to black it with punitive laws and special class taxes, and not until comparatively recently did the chains receive full acceptance in the thousands of communities they serve.

The fight against the chains, which reached a high point some 20 years ago, stemmed from a belief that their continued growth must inevitably mean the death of independent merchandising, especially by smaller stores. That attitude, as time has proved, did the independents a gross injustice. They weren't willing to perish. They didn't just sit back and shake their heads over the new competition and do nothing. Instead, they adopted the chain idea of big turnover and small unit profits, added attractive innovations of their own, and met that competition. Today independent merchants account for the majority of total retail sales, and independent stores

of all kinds, small and large, are flourishing. The lesson to be learned from this is that maximum pportunity for any enterprise can exist only when there naximum opportunity for all - and that the masses of the people are best served, quantitatively and quali-tatively, where enterprise is freest and competition is se open. Retailing is a perfect example of that truism.

"It seems possible, and it may

be probable, that our people have been so thoroughly demoralized by the statism of the New and Fair Deals that the majority of them are going to demand statism without understanding what it is. Strong evidence exists that the majority of our people may not comprehend the nature and importance of freedom, may fear it, and may not want it. Impressive evidence could be marshalled in support of a contention that an apparent majority of our people are demanding Socialism or a governmentally -managed economy in some form, and are going to get it. The forces operating in this direction are many, subtle, and powerful. Possibly, impressive evidence could also be marshalled in support of a contention, frequently advanced today, that the Republican Administration is not going to do anything effective to arrest this tide and is, in fact, keeping open the gates which lead to Socialism - the slow-fuse of Communism. edness is twice as common in boys as it is in girls. Why some people are born left-handed rather than right-handed still is not clear.

Hand preference may be related to eye preference. Most people who have equal vision in the two through a telescope, or looking through a hole in a fenge. The preferred eye is called the dominant eye. One investigator found that about 70 per cent of a group studied were right-eyed, 29 per cent were left-eyed, and only one in 100 did not have any preference. Most of those preferring the

right eye were also right-handed, but nine of the ten of those who preferred the left eye were also right handed. Just what all this means, however, is not quite clear, Many tests have been devised for testing hand preference. One investigator working with young infants found that whichever hand was used in wiping a deak with a dust cloth, rolling it into a ball and throwing it away was reliable in testing which hand was preferred.

Older children and grownups can be asked which hand they prefet

to use for throwing, cutting bread It is believed that heredity is at least partly responsible for hand and eye preference. However, heredity probably is not the only factor involved, but it seems to be the most important.

OCCABIONAL PROBLEMS Occasionally children who are left-handed, but who have been forced to use their right hands have developed stuttering or some other type of speech defect. Some authorities believe that a young stutterer is one who has shifted from normal left-handedness to us-ing the right hand and that he or she should be encouraged to use the left rather than the right hand. This does not mean that most left-handed children will develop stuttering M they are forced to use the right hand, but it is con-sidered wiser to let left-handed shildren write with and use the preferred hand. 

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
