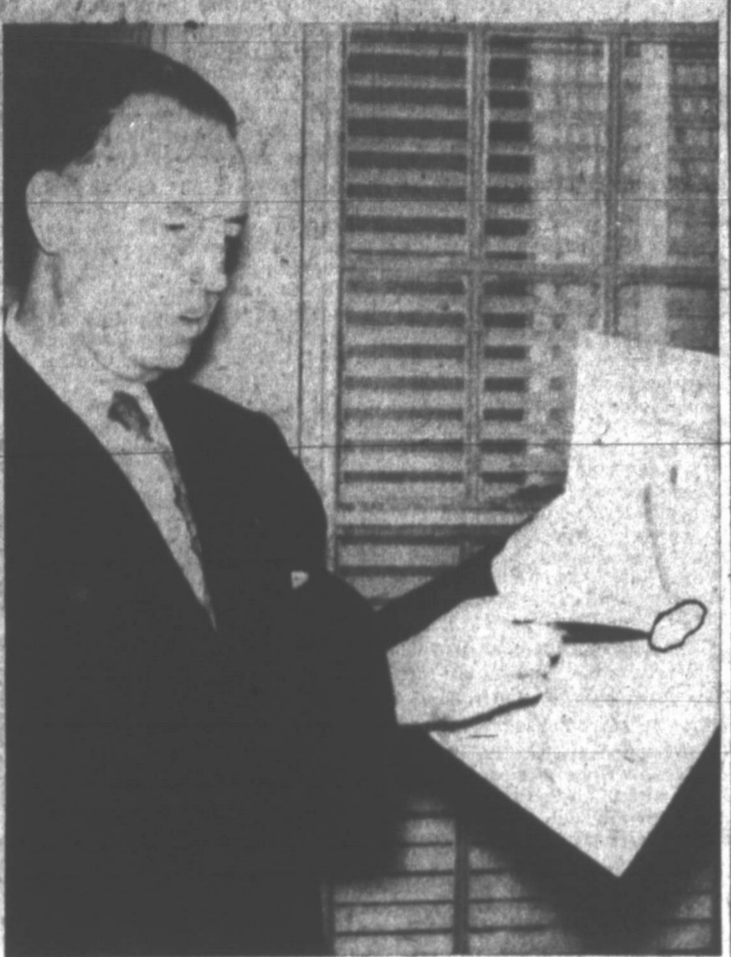

Hvasta Claims Czech People Dislike Reds

Former Prisoner Recalls Beatings At Secret Trial

HILLSIDE, N.J., Feb. 6—UP—John Hvasta, who hid out in Czechoslovakia for nearly two years after escaping from a Communist prison, said Saturday the Czechs are dissatisfied with their Red rulers and have a well-organized anti-Kremlin underground.
Hvasta waited until he had returned to his home town of Hillside before breaking the silence he had maintained since he left Czechoslovakia a few days ago.
"The 26-year-old, Czech-born naturalized American perched on a desk in the town hall to tell reporters about his experiences. He said he was sent to prison five years ago on espionage charges.
"It was a secret trial and I was subjected to both mental and physical torture, including beatings, before I confessed," Hvasta said. "I was subjected to the worst possible treatment in prison, treatment reserved only for political prisoners."
Sheltered by Underground
Hvasta said the underground that sheltered him for 21 months appeared to be supported by the people.
"The Czech government is not representative of the country," he said. "People are not happy with the present government. The country is suffering and the standard of living has been reduced. The people have been deprived of their freedom, they are poorly clothed and fed."
Hvasta talked to reporters soon after receiving a hero's welcome from his friends, family and the city of Hillside.
Dr. Juraj Slavik, former Czech ambassador to the United States, told newsmen Hvasta had said he would give the State Department top secret information about the Czech underground. Slavik said Hvasta told him he had given secret documents to a U.S. diplomatic courier in London for safe delivery to Washington officials.
Receives Offers
Hvasta said he had received several offers to buy his story and had been asked to appear on several radio and television programs.

Rites Today For Victim

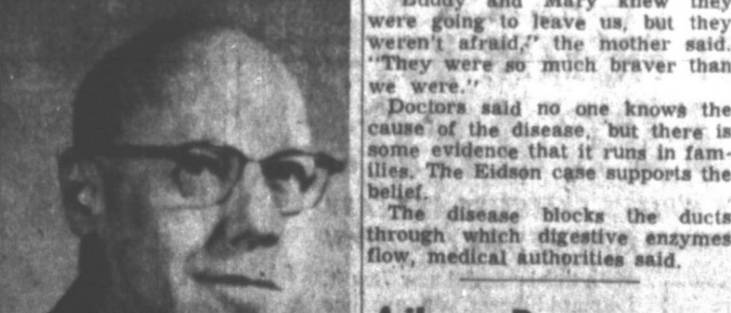
SHAMROCK — Funeral services for M. C. Helton, shot to death by his wife of three years over family and money matters, were scheduled for 2:30 p.m. today in the Richardson Funeral Home Chapel, Shamrock.
Wheeler County Sheriff Bus Dorman Saturday night said that Mrs. Hazel Barker Helton, wife of the 47-year-old farmer and rancher, signed a written statement before Wheeler County Attorney Guy Hardin admitting the shooting and the reason for it.
The shooting occurred close to 1:30 a.m. Friday in the Helton home, two miles east and three miles north of Shamrock, Dorman said. Helton died at 3:53 a.m. Friday in Shamrock General Hospital.
Mrs. Helton was released on \$5,000 bond after Dorman had charged her with "murder with malice aforethought." Her case will be brought before the Wheeler County grand jury, scheduled to meet Thursday, the sheriff said. (It will not be a special grand jury meeting, however; District Attorney Tom Braly several weeks ago called it for that day.)
A second funeral will be held in the Assembly God Church in Brown & Highline, Pampa, at 11:30 a.m. Sunday, Feb. 7, 1954. Adv.

Two-Headed Child Dies

WUERZBURG, Germany, Feb. 6—UP—A five-month-old boy born with two heads, four arms and a single lower body died Friday night, doctors report Saturday.
Doctors said the baby had "no chance to survive since the one torso had two distinct heads and two personalities directing a central nervous system."
"One personality, for example, would sleep while the other was awake and trying to move," a doctor said.
The twins were born to the 25-year-old wife of a farmer in a nearby village. They were named "Wendelin" and "Mildred" by the parents who were not identified.
A country physician cared for the baby during the first two weeks and then called in Wuerzburg physicians.
The baby was removed to the special clinic here, doctors said. The weaker left head stopped beating first, and a few seconds later the heart on the right side stopped.
The baby's upper body merged at the hip. Doctors said the heads and upper bodies were perfectly formed. They had separate hearts, lungs and stomachs although they shared a single intestinal tract.

Rare Disease May Kill Fourth Child

CHICAGO, Feb. 6—UP—A young mother, two of whose children have died of a rare disease, tried to reconcile herself Saturday to losing a third and perhaps a fourth.
Mrs. Jeanine Eldson, 25, said she is "trying to paint a beautiful picture of heaven" for her dying five-year-old daughter, Margaret. The child is suffering from cystic fibrosis of the pancreas.
Two of the five Eldson children have died of the same disease in the past year, and a fourth, Eugene, 2, shows symptoms of the ailment.

County Has 7,000 Eligible Voters

There are nearly 7,000 eligible voters in Gray county this year. This was revealed Saturday by County Tax Assessor J. Collector Jack Black when he announced the number of poll taxes paid and the number of exemption certificates issued.
A total of 5,804 Gray county residents paid their poll taxes before the Jan. 31 deadline, he said, and exemption certificates were issued to 1,071 others, making a total of 6,875 eligible voters.
In 1952, a presidential election year, approximately 5,000 persons in the county paid poll taxes or received exemptions, but the total number of eligible voters last year dropped sharply to 4,300.

Navy Constructs Newest Fighter

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Feb. 6—UP—A new, revolutionary Navy fighter plane that can take off and land straight up and down but can fly at fighter speeds nears completion Saturday at Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corp.
The plane, which looks like a long cigar with a little wing and four-bladed propeller sitting on top, has been nicknamed the "Pogo stick." Its formal name is the Navy Vertical Takeoff Project.
Company officials disclosed they expect to test fly the fantastic-looking plane in "several weeks."

Commies Defied By East Germans

BERLIN, Feb. 6—UP—East Germans in five cities marched in open defiance of Communist authorities this week, shouting demands for freedom, but the demonstrators were broken up by police riot squads, the West Berlin newspaper *Telegraf* reported Saturday.
The *Telegraf* reported that rioting in Leipzig, Gera, Dresden, Halle and Bitterfeld.
Western sources reported the Communist had moved a Soviet army division to the outskirts of Berlin Saturday and arrested 1,000 anti-Communist leaders in an effort to halt the rumblings of new zone-wide revolt.
Reports reaching West Berlin said thousands of East Germans were threatening to march on Berlin, that they distributed anti-government leaflets, beat up Communist officials, broke up government called rallies and stopped work for one minute in factories as a sign of protest.
The wave of unrest swept through East Germany in protest against Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov's visit to the western zone to route Germany through free German elections. Western sources said the Communists met the unrest with troops, tanks and police reinforcements.
The anti-Communist "Information Bureau West" reported workers were in a "mood of revolt" at a time the Big Four foreign ministers were meeting in Berlin with apparent little hope of success of reuniting the divided nation.

Germany Issue Still Deadlocked

BERLIN, Feb. 6—UP—The Western Big Three in a major compromise aimed at breaking the deadlock on German unification, agreed Saturday to give East Germans an equal share in running all-German elections.
But Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov ignored it completely, shrugged off a new British mutual security offer, proposed a propaganda-studded German economic plan instead and then refused to go on to the question of an Austrian treaty.
The compromise was offered at the 12th session of the Big Four foreign ministers conference by French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault who pleaded with Molotov: "I hope that I have not spoken in vain and language of compromise."
The West did not retreat on its stand that free German elections must precede formulation of an all-German government, but it dropped its earlier demand for Big Four supervision and suggested eastern participation for the first time.
Under the plan the elections would be supervised by East and West Germans with a neutral nation acting as mediator.
The plan was offered at a time when East Germans were growing openly rebellious against the Communist regime because of Molotov's previous rejection of the free election plan.
British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden in another conciliatory move to break down Soviet resistance to the western plan which hopes for eventual German rearmament within a framework of guarantees against aggression offered to renew Britain's 20-year pact of friendship. This, too, went unheeded.
Molotov then offered his three-

Wealthy Texan Candidate For Johnson's Post

AUSTIN, Feb. 6—UP—Dudley T. Dougherty, multimillionaire fossil-fuel man member of the Texas legislature, Saturday announced his candidacy for the U.S. Senate post now held by Lyndon B. Johnson.
Dougherty, 30-year-old Beeville rancher and oil operator, said he would seek the Democratic senatorial nomination as a result of a "continuous flow of letters from individuals and groups over the state during the past seven months."
Johnson, Democratic leader of the Senate, is now serving his first term in the upper chamber. He won his seat in 1948 by the slim margin of 87 votes in a historic race against former Gov. Coke Stevenson.
Although Johnson has not formally announced for re-election, he returned from Congress last fall and immediately launched into a speaking campaign carrying all the earmarks of a man intent on retaining his seat in the Senate.
"No one seems to be willing to speak out against Senator Johnson's errors," Dougherty said. "No one seems willing to risk the price of truth. Enormous finances and powerful groups are behind the senator. If he had done the right thing by his country and his state I would not quarrel with him, I would help him instead."
Dougherty, an outspoken critic of American foreign policy, is the founder of an organization known as the "Committee for American Victory."

U. S. Asks Russia To Free Americans

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6—UP—The United States has asked Russia to release three American citizens reported held in Soviet prison camps, the State Department disclosed Saturday.
The request was made at Moscow during a call at the Soviet foreign office by Elim O'Shaughnessy, U.S. charge d'affaires in the absence of Ambassador Charles E. Bohlen who is in Berlin.
The department in response to inquiries said O'Shaughnessy was asked for the release of William T. Marchuk of Brookridge, Pa.; William A. Verdine of Starks, La.; and John Hellmuth Noble, Detroit.

'FEAR DEAL' DEMOS HIT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 6—UP—Presidential assistant Sherman Adams charged Saturday that "fear deal" Democrats are trying to undermine public confidence in the Eisenhower administration by raising the specter of a depression.
He bitterly denounced "political sadists" of the opposition party in a gloves-off speech to the final session of a three day meeting of the Republican national committee. The meeting formally launched the GOP's 1954 congressional election campaign.
Before Adams spoke, the committee unanimously adopted a resolution acclaiming President Eisenhower's "record of accomplishment" and pledging loyal support of his administration and its "principles."
Adams, former governor of New Hampshire who has been serving as Mr. Eisenhower's White House "chief of staff," asserted the Democrats are using "perniciously evil" tactics to gain a political advantage.
Fear of Budget
He said Democrats have been spreading "the fear that the budget won't be balanced, the fear that the words 'honest economy' are something that is inimical to the best interests of the American people, the fear of depression, and fear of this government not being able to cope with whatever problems confront the people."
"Well, I think that should be labeled and recognized for exactly what it is, the attempt by these political sadists to talk the country into a depression. This perniciously evil device of attempting to destroy the confidence of the people in our government... should be recognized for exactly what it is, the fear deal."
Republican national chairman Leonard W. Hall closed the meeting with a plea that all party leaders give President Eisenhower their "unwavering support."
"Unless we do, we do not deserve to win victory in 1954," Hall declared.

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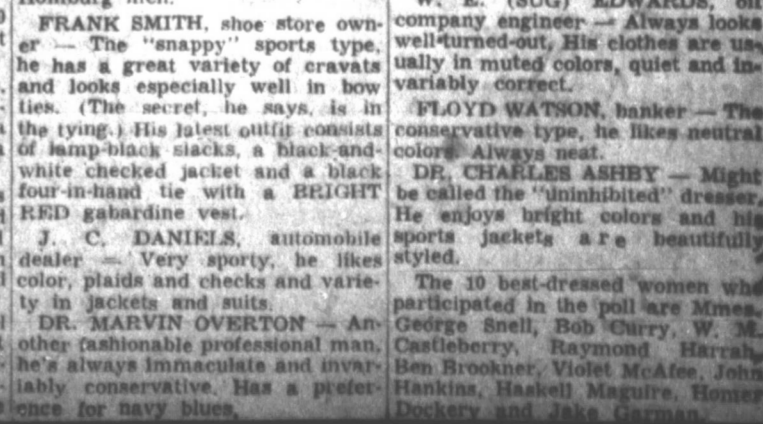

East-West Trade Reported Booming

By RICHARD WITKIN UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. Feb. 6-UP—Trade between Communist China and the United States' free world Allies has been booming. That's the highlight of the latest issue of the United Nations' monthly bulletin of statistics, which was released Saturday night.

The figures did not make a careful distinction between Red China and Formosa. But a footnote said those countries that lumped the two had only negligible trade with the Nationalists.

The report shows: 1. World exports to Red China rose in the period between the first half of 1953 to \$183 million to \$183 million. 2. Corresponding figures on imports from China are \$181 million and \$205 million.

3. The sharpest percentage rise in trade was between West Germany and Red China. The Bonn government's exports to Red China rose from \$100,000 to \$13.7 million. 4. Hong Kong was the biggest volume trader with the Chinese mainland. Its exports rose \$29 million to \$65.7 million.

5. Britain's exports rose from \$1.8 million to \$8.7 million while its imports rose from \$4.5 million to \$10.9 million. 6. Red China's exports to the United States fell from \$22.5 million to \$4 million. United States exports to Red China were at zero both periods.

7. World exports to all Communist countries fell from \$689 million to \$612 million. Total Communist exports to the non-Communist world fell from \$738.9 million to \$682.5 million. 8. Russia's export to Britain fell from \$9.2 million to \$2.5 million. While Russia's exports to the U.S. fell from \$9.4 million to \$6.3 million.

Area Farmers Hear Law Explanations

McLEAN — (Special) — Provisions of the recently enacted legislation on cotton allotments were explained to approximately 100 Gray county farmers and business men at a meeting here Friday afternoon.

Bob Lyons, Amarillo, a member of the state Agricultural Experiment Station, was on hand to explain the new law. Under provisions of the new law, an upland cotton grower can plant 65 percent of his average cotton acreage during 1953-54, or he can plant 40 percent of his highest acreage during any one of these years.

The meeting was informative and such a large number attending evidenced much interest in the new cotton plan. Attending from Pampa were County Agent Ralph Thomas and Irvin Cole, Paul Kennedy, retiring superintendent of McLean schools and who has considerable farming interests, presided at the meeting.

GALVESTON, Tex., Feb. 6-UP — A doctor who has been conducting cancer research for years said Saturday he doubts theories that lung cancer can be traced to cigarette smoking.

Dr. Rigdon said "it is true that a substance has been isolated from cigarette smoke that, when properly applied to a laboratory animal, will produce cancer. But there's a difference. It can produce one kind of tumor on the skin of a chicken and a different kind of tumor on the skin of a duck."

Dr. Rigdon said that he doubted if "cigarette smoking could ever be pinpointed as a definite cause of lung cancer because of the difficulties in experimenting on human beings and because of the many other factors to be considered as possible causes."

Blast Occurs In Skellytown

The Cleady Steward family in Skellytown Saturday were surveying the damage to the family car and its garage, following an explosion which demolished both. The blast occurred about 7 p. m. Friday when a specially built butane tank on the car exploded at the Steward's company - owned home at the Skelly-Schafer Camp No. 2.

Steward, an employe of the Skelly-Schafer plant, was not at home when the earth-shaking blast demolished the car and garage. Firemen from Pampa were called to assist the Skellytown Volunteer Fire department in extinguishing the blaze that resulted from the blast. Firemen reported the car and garage a total loss. No one was injured.

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White Deer Man Charged With DWI

A White Deer man Saturday night flipped his car over an estimated five times on the Amarillo highway, 2.5 miles west of Pampa, and was taken to Worley Hospital where he was given X-rays and a charge of driving-while-intoxicated.

Robert Leroy Dickson, 25, was headed west at 8:28 p. m. Saturday when his car ran off one side of the road, then went over to the other side and turned over, according to Deputy Sheriff Buck Haggard, who said that Highway Patrolmen R. C. Parker, Monty Cotter and Joe O'Rear made the investigation.

An ambulance took Dickson to the hospital where it was reported he was just shaken up — no broken bones, Haggard said. If dismissed from the hospital, he will be lodged in county jail over the weekend.

Pampans Aiding Victims Of Fire

Because Wilson is a World War I veteran, the Red Cross is helping them obtain enough household items to start housekeeping again. Still needed are chairs, beds, mattresses, springs, tables, underwear, bedclothes, and nightwear, Mrs. Shotwell advised.

Generous Pampans have already contributed \$28 in cash — a complete set of dishes, some silverware, a stove, two blankets and a quilt, and clothes for both of them. Girl Scout Troop 61 contributed 35, some linens, a pillow and an electric iron.

Mrs. Shotwell stated that the only things for which enough have been contributed are dishes and men's clothes. Anyone wishing to help the couple should call Mrs. Shotwell at the Red Cross office, 4-7121, Monday.

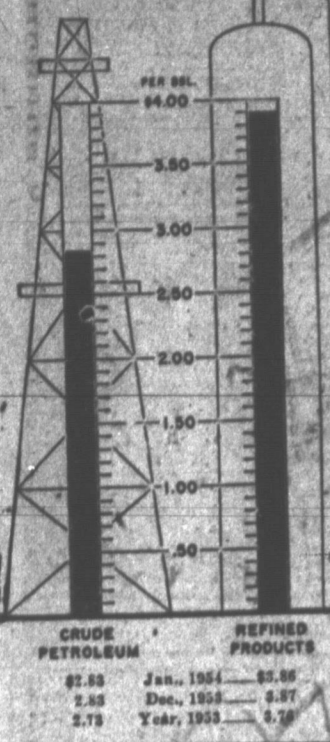
