Floods Still Baffle Europe

LONDON, Dec. 13 — Floods rolled over parts of England and Ireland Monday while floods and landslides blocked traffic on many Italian roads and left scores homeless in Sicily.

Rain threatened to bring new disaster to battered Irish homesteads, already hit by the heaviest floods in many years. Three persons have died in the swirling waters.

Towns along the upper reaches of the River Thames in England reported two feet of water in some streets in the worst floods since 1947. The floods were expected to abate Monday unless there is more rain.

In Italy emergency crews cleared slides, blocked roads in the Paestria and Senales valleys near Bolzano in the Alps while storms raged over the lower Adriatic forcing Italian vessels and a Yugoslav motorship into the port of Brindisi.

Heavy storms hit Sicily, inflicting damage in the Catania — Messina area. Many were homeless and Catania's main sewer blew up under pressure of water flowing down the slopes of Mounta Etna.

Firemen stood by through the night in Messina to evacuate inhabitants of flood-threatened houses.

Dulles, Wilson Report To GOP

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 — UP — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson Monday gave special reports on foreign and military affairs to Republican legislative leaders gathered at the White House.

President Eisenhower called the GOP congressional leaders to the meeting for a full-dress review of the legislative program he will send to Congress next month.

CLEVELAND, Dec. 13 — UP — Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard's direct testimony ended Monday with his admitting that he had succumbed to "human frailties" during his life.

The testimony was an apparent reference to Dr. Sam's affair with pretty Susan Hayes, 24, a laboratory technician who has told of sexual intimacies with him during a 16-month period.

Police Clear Husband In Wife's Death

BRINKLEY, Ark., Dec. 13 — UP — Police Monday cleared a prominent auto agency owner of any connection with the brutal "killing stick" slaying of his attractive wife and sent bloodhounds on the trail of a "tall man wearing one shoe."

Mrs. Milton Fuller, 25, mother of two children, was killed in the bedroom of her home while her husband dozed on a couch in the living room.

'Wrote In Anger' Fulbright And Pen Critic Patch Up Censure Tiff

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 — UP — Sen. J. William Fulbright (D-Ark.) and a letter writer who sharply criticized him for supporting censure of Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy have made peace.

During the censure debate, Fulbright, a sharp critic of McCarthy, received an abusive letter beginning, "Dear Senator Half-Bright" from George J. Nick of Middle Village, Long Island, N.Y.

Nick has now apologized and Fulbright has accepted.

Justice of the Peace John Anderson, acting as coroner, ruled it a suicide.

Dulles Plans Paris Visit

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 — UP — Secretary of State John Foster Dulles will fly to Paris Tuesday to try to bolster French support for German rearmament in the face of a crescendo of threats from Moscow.

Dulles is said to be worried about the effect recent Soviet propaganda may have on the showdown vote coming up in the French assembly on ratification of the Allied plan for freeing and rearming West Germany.

Hammaruskjold Is Due Icy Reception

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Dec. 13 — UP — Red China angrily accused the United Nations Monday of interfering in the Communist regime's affairs by authorizing Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold to try to arrange the release of 11 American airmen jailed there as "spies."

Radio Peiping, official voice of Red China, indicated that the outcast Communist government would reject any overtures made by Hammarskjold on behalf of the fliers.

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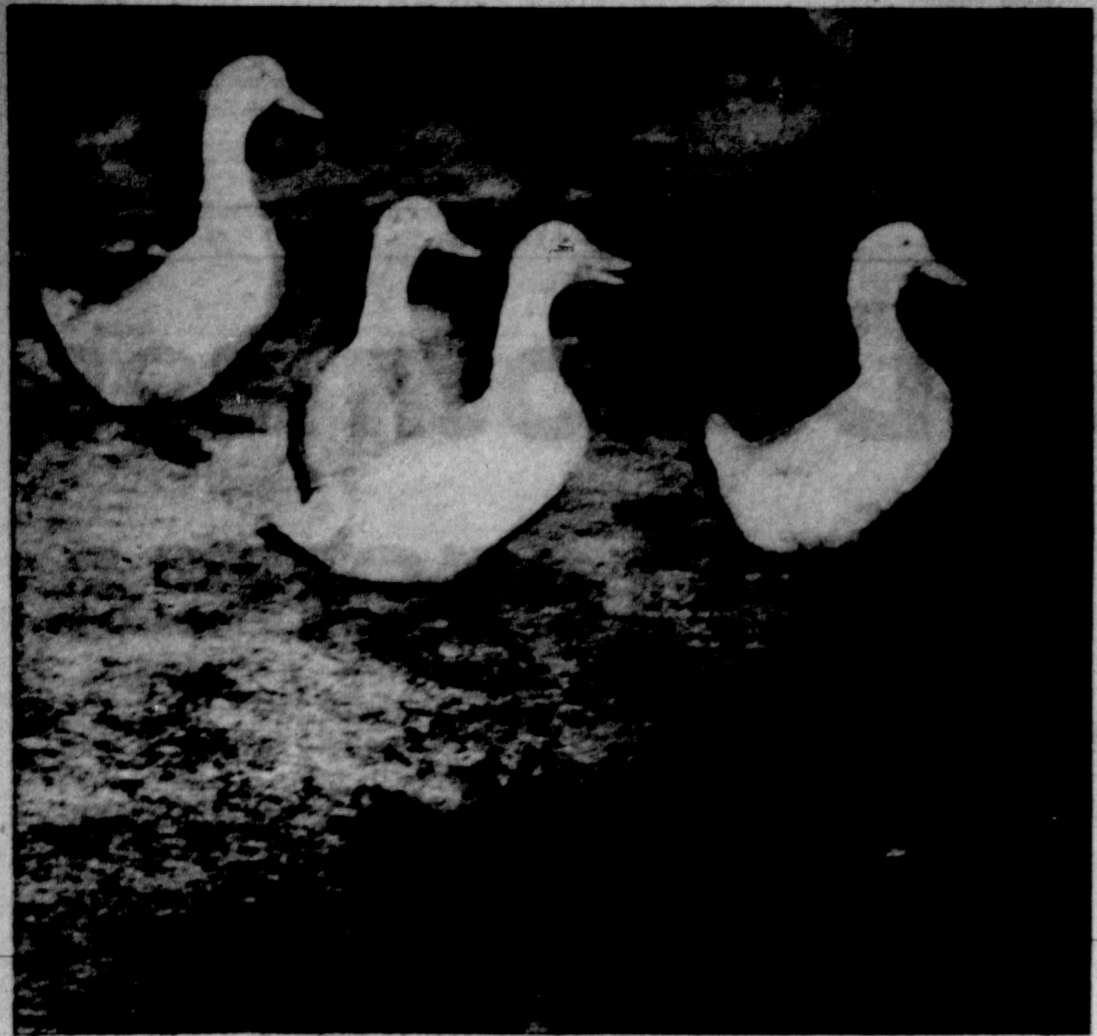

Man Killed In Tavern Gun Duel

AUSTIN, Dec. 13—UP—One man was killed and two others wounded early Sunday in a four-way tavern gun battle that left police seeking a motive for the violence. No charges had been filed. "There must have been 50 people in there, but they all say they were in the next room. Nobody saw anything and nobody knows anything," Detective Lt. Merle Wells said. Police identified the victim as Gabriel C. Guerra, 22. Manuel Pena, 23, and Estacio Zapata was shot in the lower abdomen. Wells said both were expected to live. Valentine Gonzales, operator of the tavern, said Guerra entered his establishment with two other men, still sought by police. "Somebody drew a gun. It seemed as if everyone shot at once. I don't see how none of the other customers got hurt," Gonzales said.

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West German Envoy Speaks In Houston

HOUSTON, Dec. 13—UP—Dr. Heinz L. Krekeler, Western Germany's ambassador to the U. S., said here Monday that unification of Germany is his country's goal but that the real objective is to secure human rights for his countrymen. He said "the fundamental issue facing the new republic is the return of human rights for 18 million Germans now under Soviet control." Dr. Krekeler arrived here Sunday to honor Rice Institute prof. emeritus Dr. Max Freund, the translator of Gustav Dresse's Houston Dresse Journal which recounts the experience of a young German traveler here in the early 19th century. Dr. Krekeler was greeted at the airport by Mrs. Marguerita Stolar, German consul here, and civic officials led by Mayor Pro Tem Matt Wilson. In commenting upon the recent proposal for Western Germany's admission into the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO), Dr. Krekeler said: "We are partners in the general problem of common security, and therefore we have been asked to be partners in NATO and in the Western European union. "We want to participate with the other countries of this organization to build for the security of the free world, and we are prepared to do our share in the burden of defense." Dr. Krekeler added that his country was "happy to share with the United States the pursuit of peace and liberty and the preservation of our common heritage."

Say, Why! Uncle Sam Has Plenty

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13—UP—The government, like little Miss Muffet, has its hands full of whey. And it wonders why. No one dreamed just seven short months ago when the government's newest venture in price propping that a whopping 41 million pounds of the by-product of cheese making would end up in federal larders. Although the \$2.5 million tied up in whey is chickenfeed compared with the close to \$7 billion tied up in all price support operations, it is considerably more than the "little or nothing" officials expected the program to cost them. Started Last Spring It all started last spring when the government wanted to unload some of its mountainous stocks of dried milk at cut-rate prices for livestock feed. The whey people figured that was unfair competition since whey also is fed to the animal population. So after much deliberation the department announced that any whey makers who were hurt by the dried milk program could sell whey to the government. They did. Now the department is plagued with unloading the whey as well as the dried milk. So far it has been able to sell about 14.8 million pounds of the piled up whey—but selling it for export at about half the price it paid for it. So far the sales have meant about a \$318,000 loss. If the 26 million remaining pounds are sold at the same rate, losses would total a cozy \$1,428,000. Start Vicious Cycle Meantime, the dried milk for livestock feed program went great guns. The department has unloaded about 580 million pounds of the item that started the vicious cycle. The cut-rate price for which it sold it has meant about a \$73 million loss. It still has, however, about 108 million pounds of the dried milk piled up in storage. Now, the whey buying has ground to a halt along with the dried milk for feed program and the department is almost right back where it was last spring, minus a few million dollars.

Mrs. M. Framie Berkley, 54, of Dripping Springs, was injured fatally when thrown from a pickup truck that skidded on wet pavement near Austin. Dean C. Blank, 24, of Perryton, was injured fatally when his car skidded on a slick road and overturned north of Pampa.

Thompson, the new county Democratic chairman.
In Washington, Rogers is a member of the House Committee for Interior and Insular Affairs which, he says, handles more bills than any other committee except the Judiciary (which must process all "private" bills).
His committee has jurisdiction over all areas covered by the Department of the Interior: the public lands, mines and mining, territories and possessions, irrigation and reclamation, Indian affairs and water resources. He is a member of five of the six committee subcommittees. The only subcommittee he isn't on deals with Indians—there isn't an Indian in the 18th Congressional District.
It isn't all work and no play for Rogers on Capitol Hill, though. He plays a mean shortstop for the Democratic Nine and last summer he and his Demo colleagues "pulled one out of the fire" against the Republicans. He played a lot of sandlot ball in his earlier days, but no professional.
"I'm getting too old to play ball now," he says, laughingly. He's got the right build for a shortstop, however. Short, slender and seemingly nimble.
The best thing about politics to Rogers is the campaigning. "I like people, I always have," he says. He'd have to — there are 28 counties in this district, more than in any other in Texas.

Two Escape 'Copter Crash

FREEMONT, Tex., Dec. 13—UP—A helicopter serving an offshore oil well plummeted into the Gulf of Mexico off San Luis Pass Sunday, hurling two men into a battle for their lives.
The two men—the pilot and an oil well rigger—sat tight in the cockpit of the floating 'copter sending SOS messages for an hour until they were picked up.
The crew of an offshore oil well service ship sent from here finally towed the disabled aircraft in. The two men were not identified.
Both the 'copter and the rescue ship were owned by the Glascock Drilling Co., Corpus Christi, which is drilling an offshore well for Shell Oil Co. at San Luis Pass.
R. A. Pacey of Shell's Freeport office said the 'copter motor failed at about 150 feet altitude.
"Luckily, she landed right side up and rode the waves pretty well," he said.
"It was the second such crash in 30 days."
Four men were killed recently when a 'copter serving an Humble Oil and Refining Co. offshore oil well crashed into the Gulf of Louisiana.

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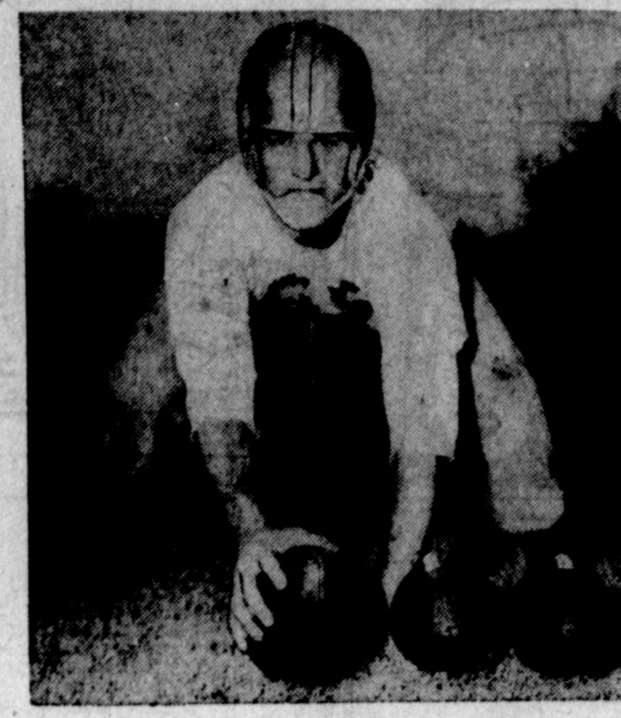

Boxer Dies Of Ring Injuries

BOSTON, Dec. 13-UP—A brain surgeon said Monday "several damaging blows" were the cause of a brain hemorrhage that took the life of Eddie Sanders—second boxer to die of ring injuries in two days.

A third died in a highway crash. Sanders, 25-year-old 1952 Olympic heavyweight champion from Los Angeles, died Sunday at a hospital 19 hours after an 11th round knockout by Willie James of Boston at Boston Garden.

The quiet-mannered young Negro died of the same type of injury that took the life of Ralph Weiser in Kilmath Falls, Ore., Saturday after a Friday night bout.

A third fighter died Sunday in Montreal. Johnny Greco, former Canadian welterweight champion, was killed when his automobile went out of control and hit a tree. He was starting a comeback after holding the title from 1946 to 1953.

Nat Fleischer, editor of Ring magazine, said "incomplete records" for 1954 indicated Weiser and Sanders were the first professionals to die of ring injuries this year in the United States.

Special Vote Fills Sadler Senale Seat

Special elections in West Texas Saturday promoted State Rep. David W. Ratliff of Stamford to the state Senate and sent a political novice, Richard White of El Paso, to the lower house of the Legislature. Final returns Monday gave White 3,199 votes to 1,281 for Gene Puck, El Paso attorney and onetime member of the Texas House of Representatives, and 565 for Rep. Anita Blair, who was defeated this summer in her bid for re-election. White succeeds Re. Frank Owen, who on Nov. 2 was elected to the state Senate. El Paso county makes up the 100th district and White won place 2. Seven candidates sought the 24th district state Senate post won by Ratliff and left vacant by the death of Sen. Harley Sadler of Abilene. The 13-county district includes Borden, Dickens, Fisher, Garza, Howard, Jones, Kent, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry, Shackelford, Stonewall and Taylor counties. Ratliff late Sunday held a 771-vote margin over his nearest opponent, former State Sen. Pat Bullock of Colorado City. The 24th district returns were from 13 counties, six complete. Only small boxes containing about 775 votes were out last Sunday. Rep. Truett Latimer of Abilene had 1,817 votes; Abilene attorney Dan T. Sorrells, 1,789; Justin M. Morrow of Rotan, 1,202; Dr. Robert F. Wasson of Snyder, 731; and Rotan merchant Cecil A. Lotief, 690 votes. Both elections were "high-man-take-all" affairs with no runoffs.

S-D Day Competition Springs Up
WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—UP—Competition is springing up among cities in many parts of the country to see which can turn in the best record on "safe driving day" Wednesday. President Eisenhower has asked all Americans to cooperate in the observance and make "S-D Day" go by without a single fatal traffic accident in the nation. The idea is to stimulate year-round support for proven safety methods by demonstrating that accidents can be sharply reduced when all motorists and pedestrians take care. The competitive spirit was first introduced by Fort Wayne, Ind. It challenged other Indiana cities in the same population class—South Bend, Gary and Evansville—to compete for a trophy offered by the Fort Wayne Chamber of Commerce. The trophy will go to the city that turns in the most nearly perfect safety record on S-D Day. A similar four-city contest is on among St. Joseph, Mo., Springfield, Mo., Topeka, Kan., and Lincoln, Neb. Each city is contributing \$25 toward the purchase of a plaque for the winner. Ashland, Ky., threw down the broadest challenge—offering to pit its S-D Day accident toll against that of any other community, large or small, in the entire country. Mayor David Aronberg said Ashland is confident because it has been preparing for S-D Day for a long time, with safety poster contests in the public schools, safety demonstrations by civic organizations, and plant safety campaigns by industrial firms. Last Wednesday, Ashland held a "dress rehearsal" of S-D Day, hoping to maintain a perfect record of no accidents for 24 hours. For 23 hours and 55 minutes, all went well. Five minutes before midnight a driver crumpled a fender. He was promptly charged with drunken driving.
