





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History Lesson

Those who believe that the system of laissez-faire will not work, or is not beneficial to humanity, should read "Hu Shih's "Authority and Freedom in the Ancient Asian World." Mr. Hu is president of the National Peking University. He now lives in New York. Probably had to flee from the Commies.

Hu Shih tells of a great Chinese revolution that started in 209 B.C. when the people rose and threw off the tyrannical rulers of the Ch'in Empire. The new ruler, who came from the common people and knew their long suffering under the tyrants, proclaimed that, "Hereafter only two simple laws shall prevail: namely, that manslaughter shall be punished by death, and that assault and theft shall be justly punished according to the facts of each case "

"This early proclaimed policy," says Hu Shih, "to relieve the people from the authoritarian rule of too much government was consciously carried out by some of the great statesmen of the Han Empire."

One Gen. Ts'ao, who was appointed in 201 B.C. the second year of the Empire, to govern the advanced and prosperous state of Ch'i on the Eastern seacoast, selected an old philosopher as his chief advisor and religiously carried out the old philosopher's advice to do nothing and give the people a rest.

Ts'ao's nine year administration over this rich province of 70 cities became known as the best in the Empire, and he was appointed Prime Minister in 193 B.C. where he continued his practice of "do nothing" on a national

Directly quoting again from Hu Shih: "History tells us that these decades of deliberate experimentation with the philosophy of non-interference brought great prosperity to the people and wealth to the national treasury and gave the nation a chance to recuperate from long years of war and revolution, and to learn to appreciate the real benefits of a vast, unified empire with no tariff walls, with no large standing army, and with little interference from the authorities of the government."

The first unified empire, founded on totalitarianism, lasted fifteen years. The Second Empire of Han, founded on the philosophy of laissez-faire, lasted 400 years from 200 B.C. to 200 A.D. - and was one of the happiest and most prosperous eras in China's long history.

Our government was founded pretty much on the noninterference doctrine - but we have drifted a long philosophy in late years. What our leaders need is a few advisors like the ancient Chinese philosopher - and sense enough to listen to them.

Book On Goals Of Economic Life Authorized By Federal Council Of Churches

Here is the last installment of a review written by Percy L. Greaves, Jr. on a chapter in the sponsored by the Federal Council of Churches

In the last installment the auth or of the chapter being reviewed, that we do not have real cometition when producers can influence the prices. Answering this argument under the heading of 'Competition Always Present' Mr. Greaves writes:

"Those who hold this belief, fail to understand the function of competition in the operation of a free market. Actually, competition is present in every conceivable form of specialization, known as the division of labor. Its function is not to maintain 'given prices' or provide equal opportunity or 'full knowledge.' Its function is to select the most capable persons for each economic activity, according to values determined on a scale of consumer wishes.

"In the market place, as Professor Misses reminds us, 'The function of competition is to assign to every member of a social system that position in which he can best serve the whole of society and all its members. It is a method of selecting the most able man for each performance. Where there is social co-operation, there some variety of selection must be applied. Only where the assignment of various individuals to various tasks is effected by the dictator's decisions alone and the individuals concerned do not aid the dictator by endeavors to represent their own virtues and abilities in the most favorable light, is there no competition.'

"Unhampered competition by moral men permits each person to seek and find that niche where he can best satisfy the justified desires of his fellow contributors to society. His fellow contributors, known as buyers or consumers, indicate the individual niche for every man by offering him his highest attainable compensation to perform that function to the best of his ability. Such compensation is rarely a completely monetary one. It usually includes a complex combination of all 'hat man values here on earth. In a free economy, each man is free to choose any of many available locations, situations, occupations and compensations he considers most satisfactory for himself and his family. That freedom is the God-given right of every man and woman.

Market Competition "In a free economy, every job, good or service offered in the market is in competition with every other job, good or service offered. Suppliers soon learn not to continue supplying those jobs, goods and services for which consumers will not repay them their out-of-pocket expenses. Wise businessmen seek to serve their fellow men by providing those jobs, goods and services for which consumers will pay the highest prices over and above the costs of production.

"If one businessman uses less time, energy and-or scarce goods than another in providing the same service, he releases the unused assets for providing something that would not otherwise be available. If he reduces costs 20 per cent and reduces prices only 5 per cent, before competition forces a full 20 per cent reduction, he is still helding consumers considerably. For in addition to the immediate price cut, consumers have available the additional products made with the released time, energy

and-or scarce goods. "The competition which serves humanity is the competition to provide services which consumers value higher than they do any other use of the same time, energy and scarce goods consumed in the production of those services. No aws are needed to enforce such

"Those who demand equal competitive knowledge and opportunity for all, deny the God-given facts of life. Laws which try to assure the so-called 'perfect competition,' would place handicaps on all those especially well qualified to serve their fellow men. The idiocy of this idea is revealed by a perusal of professional pursuits. Is there, or can there be, 'perfect competition' between opera singers, in the sense that all singers have equal abilities, equal opportunities and equal prices? Is there, or can there be, such 'perfect competition' between all doctors or all lawyers? Can they all have 'full knowledge?

Every man has specific assets which should be devoted to those areas where they can provide the greatest satisfaction to consumers. most deserving of their limited services. The competition of a free market provides the best way to assign men to the positions where they can best serve the most deserved.

Let's Have Progress

"In one sense, unrestricted competition is the force which seeks to reduce or eliminate the discomforts which are a part of the ealities of life. It seeks to imrove the satisfaction of human wants. Under a government enforced 'perfect competition,' all automobiles and their prices would have to be the same. The minor changes and improvements that are now made by each manufacturer from year to year, and from model to model, would never be permitted. 'Perfect competition,' which, by definition, precludes in-

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

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
