





#### Flood Prospects For LA Mapped

LOS ANGELES - UP - Flood control engineers say Los Angeles can expect "moderate" flood conditions on the average of once every 10 years. Research and interviews on the

subject were conducted recently by Dr. W. Richard Bigger, member of the political science faculty at San Diego State College, for his doctoral dissertation at the University of California at Los Angelas. He further observed that "a great flood" condition can be expected to cover the Los Angeles flood plain on the average of once every 100 years.

A large flood, drowning all low loing valley areas and sections of coastal plain adjacent to atream channels, can be looked for about six times each century, he said, but all this can be prevented by flood - entrol projects in the course of construction by the U. 8. Army Corps of Engineers.

And the dispatch is based on high authority - Soviet Trade, the official newspaper of the ministry which runs all the stores in the country.

It seems that the volume, variety and quality of all manner of goods have been decreasing, despite all the late government propaganda about giving consumers a break. The commonest wares are in short supply - sewing needles, hairpins, garters, shaving gear, belt buckles, cosmetics, elastic items and so on. And some of these goods, Soviet Trade says, are obtainable from speculators and black market operators who operate out of suitcases and briefcases on the street right in front of the

Thus does the workers' paradise meet the needs and desires of the people. And the reason things work out this way isn't hard to discern. Under communism, or any other totalitarian system, there is no true competition as we know it in either manufacturing or retailing. There is no incentive to do a better job. Everything is run by decree, and the red tape involved is incredible. The result is poor goods, shortage of goods, excessively-priced

### BETTER JOBS

Book On Goals Of Economic Life Authorized By Federal Council Of Churches

I want to continue to reproduce a review of a chapter from the book "Goals of Economic Life," which was prepared by a study group authorized by the Federal Council of Churches. This particu-Economics at the State University of Iowa. This review was writpublished in "Christian Economics." Under the heading of "Forc-

"Professor Bloom does not believe that the free and unhampered market, the economic way, is the most efficient method to satisfy the wishes of able and moral men. He believes, as do many others whom he calls 'competent economists,' that 'the assumptions of competition' in an unhampered market do not exist in 'realitythe actual, existing state of affairs.' He believes, among other things, that governmental action is necessary 'to enforce competition.'

"For more than sixty years there has been a growing misconception concerning competition and the functioning of a free market. The result has been a bevy of manmade laws based on the idea that limiting free market operations will improve the morality of men, increase total production and provide the free competition so necessary for the just distribution of production. The results are all around us. They are the direct antithesis of the sponsors' anticipations. Each and every such law has resulted in more immorality (bribery of bureaucrats), more unproductive activity (including red tape, misemployment and unemployment) and more injustice in the compensation of participants (discriminatory taxes, subsidies and unearned privileges).

"In earlier and simpler days, many people, including some 'economists' (Marshall and his followers), presumed that competition existed only when individual producers, buyers or sellers were unable to influence market prices. They thought that no matter how much wheat an individual farmer grew, his production would not change wheat prices. He was not a monopolist and therefore, in their opinion, could not raise prices by reducing his production. As they saw it, this was the real test of competition. Unfortunately, such reasoning defied one of God's economic laws - that other things remaining equal, any decrease in supply tends to increase prices.

Costs And Prices "These people did not see that when demand remains the same and an efficient farmer reduces his crop, he provides a market for the crops of a less efficient farmer - a producer who would otherwise have been forced out of wheat farming by finding it more profitable to engage in another enterprise. Since the price of wheat, like the price of anything else currently produced, tends to equal the production costs of marginal producers, providing markets for less efficient wheat growers must result in higher prices for all wheat sales. This is elementary econom-

"The current and more sophisticated form of the fall - y presumes that 'pure' or 'perfect competition' can exist only when everyone has complete information, and where here are many producers and sellers of identical commodities whose market prices cannot be changed by the actions of any one participant, 'Perfect competition,' as Professor Bloom sees it, exists only when 'decision - makers take market prices as given, have full knowledge, and find no bars to indicate adjustments.' This assumes all market participants will have full and equal knowledge of all information affecting each transaction, and that no producer will make anything different from what is made by many other producers. Such 'perfect competition' does not, cannot and thus never will exist

anywhere on God's earth. "Nevertheless, there are 'economists,' like Professor Bloom, who believe that governments s h o u l d pass laws which they think can bring about such a state of affairs. Neither he, nor his confreres, seem to realize that such legislation can only result in government protected monopolies that can charge higher prices than a free market would permit, not to mention the disemployment, misemployment, and decrease in human satisfactions due to the suffocation of all efforts to provide new and different products for which some consumers might show a preference by offering high-

er prices. (to be continued)



#### The Doctor Says

Any severe long-lasting cough, no matter what the cause, may result in a serious condition of the lungs known as bronchiectasis. An irritation of the breathing tubes such as a bronchitis, a severe asthma, or even a chronic sinus infection associated with coughing may bring about this condition. In bronchiectasis the small

pockets in the lungs known as

alveoli (which are normally filled with air when a person breathes) are broken down, dilated and packed with mucus, fluid, or pus. If you could see the involved areas of the lungs they would look much like a bunch of grapes. COUGHING BY A person with bronchiectasis usually brings up a heavy mucus sputum, often having a foul odor. Accurate diagnosis, however, depends on special examinations, including an X-ray film. A remarkable instrument called a bronchoscope, by which the dilated pockets can be seen by the physician, may also be used. Once bronchiectasis has devel-

oped the first step in treatment is to find out if the condition which produced the bronchiectasis is still active. If it is, appropriate treatment must be directed at the active cause UNTIL RECENTLY treatment

of bronchiectasis was unsatisfactory. Now, however, many good results have been reported from the use of penicillin given by injection or inhalation,

The other method of treatment which is satisfactory for many of cially when the condition is advanced, is surgery.
