## Twisters Hit Hard In South

One Known Dead, 66 Others Injured

ATLANTA, Dec. 6 -- UP -- Tornados whirled out of the skies into some 19 Georgia and Alabama towns Sunday night leaving death, countless injured and vast destruction.

One person was known dead and the Red Cross said two others were listed as possible victims. At least 66 other persons were known to have been injured by the twisters that destroyed some 67 homes and damaged 218 others.

The hardest hit towns were Manchester and Richland, Ga., and Wellington, Ala., which was leveled.

The Georgia State Patrol reported that an unidentified eight-year-old Negro girl was killed at Richland where 14 other persons were injured. Another 21 persons were injured at Wellington.

The tornadoes that left their destruction along north-south paths in both states also struck Whitesville, Angel Station, Roanoke, Tuskegee, Beulah and in the vicinity of Opelika in Alabama.

Other Georgia towns hit by tornadoes or tornadoic winds were Pine Mountain Valley, Blakely, Cataula, Talbotton, Blue Springs, Taylorville, Stilesboro, Ellaville, Bancroft, Buena Vista, Dranville, Dawson and Atlanta.

One of the tornadoes ripped a path a mile wide and three miles long in Manchester, where State Patrol Sgt. M. F. Hale estimated damage at \$100,000. More than 200 homes were damaged at Manchester where a truck was overturned, critically injuring one of its occupants and injuring the other.

# Eden Scores Chinese For Jailing Americans

## Reds Accused Of Truce Violation

LONDON, Dec. 6 -- UP -- Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden Monday accused the Red Chinese of "direct violation" of the Korean armistice in jailing the 11 American airmen it has charged with "espionage."

Eden said he was speaking on behalf of "the government and all civilized nations."

"We deplore this Red China's conduct," the foreign secretary said.

Eden's views on the highly explosive case of the imprisoned Americans was given before the House of Commons in reply to Socialist John Baird who asked why instructions were given to British United Nations representatives to "condemn the Chinese people's government because they have punished United States spies."

## Freed PW Knew Jailed Yank 'Spies'

HONG KONG, Dec. 6 -- UP -- Canadian air force squadron leader A. E. MacKenzie, released Sunday from two years' imprisonment in Red Chinese jails, told American authorities Monday he has no idea what the Chinese intend doing with "several" American airmen held in his prison camp.

MacKenzie, who declined to discuss details of his knowledge of the imprisoned Americans with the press, said the men he knew in Red jails are in addition to 11 airmen the Chinese Communists have sentenced to long prison terms on trumped-up spy charges.

## Ike Attacks Planned

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 6 -- UP -- Newly-elected Democratic Chairman Paul M. Butler Monday planned new party unity and bold attacks against President Eisenhower in an attempt to win Democratic control of the government in 1956.

Butler, in his first interview after winning the chairmanship, attacked the President's leadership and left the party's door open for recalcitrant southern Democrats.

Butler said he was pleased that the national committee which met here this weekend ditched the controversial loyalty pledge that split the party in 1952. An expected fight between north and south factions of the party did not develop after the rules advisory committee said no one should be required to make a pledge of loyalty.

## Joe Renews Red Search

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6 -- UP -- Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, swinging to the offensive after his condemnation by the Senate, called S. D. said the purpose Monday his investigating subcommittee was to lay the groundwork for the full scale inquiry.

Another man waited for him at the curb in a 1951 black Ford automobile. As the tall bandit got the money, he sprinted for the curb and leaped into the automobile, which disappeared into heavy traffic.

Given first-aid treatment in Panhandle and released were Miss Loreta White, 15, and Miss Lenore Mitchell, 16, both of Panhandle.

## Doss Relative's Body Exhumed

LEXINGTON, N. C., Dec. 6 -- UP -- The body of a third relative of confessed poison slayer Mrs. Nanette L. Doss was exhumed Monday to be checked for signs of arsenic which she confessed she used to kill four of her five husbands.

Dr. David E. Plummer, Davidson county coroner, said he obtained a court order to exhume the body of Mrs. Sarah E. Lanning, mother-in-law of Mrs. Doss, who was being held in jail at Tulsa, Okla. Mrs. Lanning died at the age of 34 in 1950, presumably of cancer.

## Pope Shows Improvement

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 6 -- UP -- Pope Pius XII showed further improvement Monday and the Vatican announced he will close the Roman Catholic Marian year Wednesday with a broadcast from his bedside.

The pope, seriously ill with a stomach ailment, will recite an Ave Maria and pronounce his apostolic benediction urbe et orbe (to the city and world).

## GI Insurance Monopoly Probed

HEIDELBERG, Germany, Dec. 6 -- UP -- A congressional subcommittee opens hearings here Monday on charges that companies incorporated under "lax" Texas laws have a monopoly of the GI insurance business in Germany.

Rep. William E. Hess (R-Ohio), chairman of the four-man armed services subcommittee, said it probably also will investigate charges of irregularities in the Army's multi-million-dollar post exchange system and its liquor supply operations in Europe.

## Low Temperature Hits 29 Today

A low of 29 degrees at 6:30 this morning sent Pampans scampering for overcoats following a high of 55 Sunday.

The thermometer climbed to 41 by noon and the weatherman forecast today's high in the upper 40s. Temperatures are expected to drop this evening with lows expected in the middle 30s, but the mercury is scheduled to head for an upgrade Tuesday to about 55. The forecast Tuesday calls for increased cloudiness.

# Courage Ebbs In The City Hitler Could Not Control

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** The city of Coventry, England, where Lady Godiva rode nude on horseback through the streets 900 years ago, is again feeding the fires of controversy. The Socialist local government, which had already withdrawn from British civil defense in protest against the atom and hydrogen bombs, has now sent a goodwill delegation to visit Russia. IFA sent a special correspondent from London to Coventry to get the story behind these actions for readers of The Pampa Daily News.

**COVENTRY, England** — (NEA) — The city that Hitler destroyed 14 years ago — but could not conquer — today shows signs of coming in from civic dry rot. On the surface, Coventry looks healthy enough. As the hub of Britain's motor car industry, its factories are busy turning out sleek Jaguars, understung Hillmans and Sapphire jet engines which earn dollars for England. Its population (now 270,000) has nearly doubled since the war. The last of the bomb-rubble has been cleared away. Its shops glitter with expensive goods. Yet its people are restless. They shuffle along the narrow streets, as if in search of something. And the courage for which they became famous under Hitler's aerial rain of death on Nov. 14, 1940, has disappeared.



**THIS WAS COVENTRY 14 YEARS Ago**, when Hitler's mighty one-day air raid took 1,100 civilians lives, left the city in ruins. Its people buried their dead in a common grave and fought back. But in 1954's mock H-bomb attack for civil defense test, the people of Coventry panicked.



**LADY GODIVA**, Coventry's most famous citizen, rides again in pageant repeated every five years. But the spirit she symbolizes seems to be ebbing.

This year a hydrogen bomb "fell" on Coventry. No one was killed, nor did the city vanish, for it was a mock H-bomb, a test of Coventry's civil defense system. But what happened sent a wave of bitterness billowing over Britain. For the people of Coventry panicked.

The Socialists started it — the Socialists who run Coventry like Boss Tweed ran Tammany. They set up loudspeakers to drown out the instructions of civil defense "rescuers."

In the ensuing riot in which police had to intervene, the screams of the bomb "victims" mingled with jeers and catcalls led by the Socialists. One gray-haired woman, her face smeared with lipstick to represent bloodstains, swung her birdcage at the Socialist microphone and sent it tottering.

Thus Britain's first exercise in civil defense against the H-bomb ended in what the British press termed "a national disgrace."

But the Socialists have another name for it — "a gesture to save mankind," they call it.

By refusing to defend itself in a future atomic war, Coventry is setting an example for the world, according to the Socialists, who control a three-to-one majority on its city council.

And just so there is no mistaking where their loyalty lies, the Socialists have joined Stalingrad, Russia, in a "Ban-the-Bomb" appeal to the United Nations. Coventry's Lord Mayor John Fennell headed the delegation that went to Stalingrad.

This is Coventry in 1954.

same streets were strewn with over a thousand dead killed in a single Nazi bombing attack. Coventry buried its dead in a common grave, there being not enough

coffins to go around — and fought back.

What are they looking for now? The welfare state Donald Gibson, Coventry's young city architect, thinks so. Gibson, trained in Boston, U.S.A., thinks that the welfare state is the answer to all mankind's problems.

"We are building the garden city of the future," he explains, handling the plaster model of the new civic center with loving care.

It's all there, the creches, the free health clinics, the shopping center with its patios and fountains. No detail has been overlooked in this cradle-to-grave planning.

But is it enough? "People come here to make money and they get lost," an elderly shopkeeper was telling me as we stood in Broadgate Square watching work on the new civic center.

"When I came here 21 years ago," he reminisced, "there weren't over 100,000 people here. Now look at them — refugees Poles and Czechs, Irish, Glaswegians, Welsh miners, Lancashire cotton operatives. Coventry is the modern Babel."

Like the ancient Babel, Coventry has its unfinished tower — a smoke-blackened spire, which is all that's left of St. Michael's, the lovely 14th-Century cathedral destroyed in 1940.

For 14 years the world has been waiting for Coventry to build a new cathedral. Yet, no sooner was the winning design published — a dramatic affair, all glass and pencil-thin columns — than Coventrians fell to fighting among themselves.

Some said that it looked like a biscuit factory, others a super-cinema. The architect received over 700 letters, most of them abusive, in three weeks.

Hodgkinson confided to me, "the people of Coventry don't want a cathedral. They prefer plush seats and tankards to parsons and pews."

American servicemen from nearby bases have contributed to it. Canadians have raised \$30,000 for a new pipe organ. Even the Federal German Republic has pledged a stained-glass window to replace one knocked out by Hitler's bombs.

Yet the people of Coventry have too little pride to honor their traditions, the Socialists would have the world believe.

The most hopeful voice I heard in Coventry belonged to Canon Moore Darling, a tall, bald Anglican clergyman pushing 70. His answer to the Pub vs Parson challenge is to take the church to the pub.

"Usually I take the vicar of the parish with me," he explains, "and we sit in the backroom. Pretty soon the men drift in, at first out of curiosity. And while they drink their pints of ale I tell them why they need religion and answer their questions."

"Sometimes," the canon laughed, "the Lord Bishop of Coventry comes along."

But Canon Darling's work is not confined to pubs. One day a week he spends in a machine tool factory employing 420 workers.

"We have to start rebuilding the community from the bottom. People come here and they're put down in these magnificent new housing projects, yet they're strangers to the people next door," the canon explains.

"No one wants to deny the welfare state, but what consolation does it have for the man who lost his wife, or the chap whose worries gave him a peptic ulcer?"

"The Socialists," he sums up, "can create new houses, but they can't create what the Greeks called a city. That is the job of the Church."

New Field Tapped in Mexico

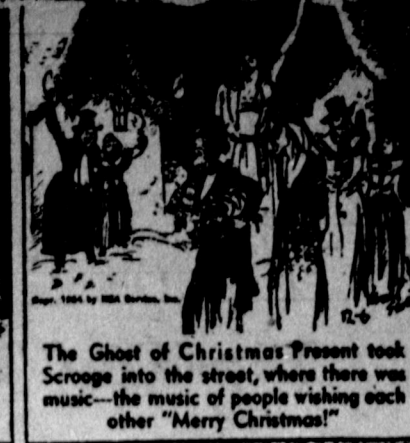

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## Gray County Home Demonstration Agent Gives Review Of Year's Achievements

By MISS HELEN DUNLAP  
The leadership training and the expansion programs of Gray County, during 1954, have helped the agents, home demonstration women, and 4-H girls to reach 1034 families with some phase of the extension program. Programs in the making of yeast breads, quick breads, high altitude cakes, and a new method of sewing, are among those given to the club membership and to other groups, not enrolled in club work.

The newspapers, radio and television are among some of the other means of informing people. However, it is not possible to know the numbers reached by these means. One television program, given during the summer, is responsible for the organization of the Goodwill club a short while after the presentation.

Through the leadership training program, 76 home demonstration and 4-H leaders were trained to give programs and demonstrations to others. They gave them to a total attendance of 447 people, at club and other group meetings. Fourteen team demonstrations were also given during the county-wide achievement event in Recreation Park in August.

The home demonstration and 4-H club members presented clothing and cereal food demonstrations during the year. Besides these, they continued with demonstrations from previous years. As one of these carry-over programs, the assistant agent trained eight boys and girls in the identifying of shrubs and trees.

In the clothing program, the women learned to sew for the members of their families by the time-saving, no-pin no-baste method. They made a total of 1,442 garments at an estimated saving of \$2,497.00. The girls learned methods of sewing in six workshops, directed by assistant agent during July. They made a total of 73 garments and 19 took part in the county dress revue.

The women worked to improve the quality of their pies, sponge and butter cakes, while the girls worked intensively to improve their methods of making biscuits and banana bread. The women learned that cakes baked at high altitudes require less sugar and baking powder, but need more liquids. They also discovered that the ingredients are combined differently. They also learned that the method used in combining the ingredients in meringues helps to determine whether or not it will "weep."

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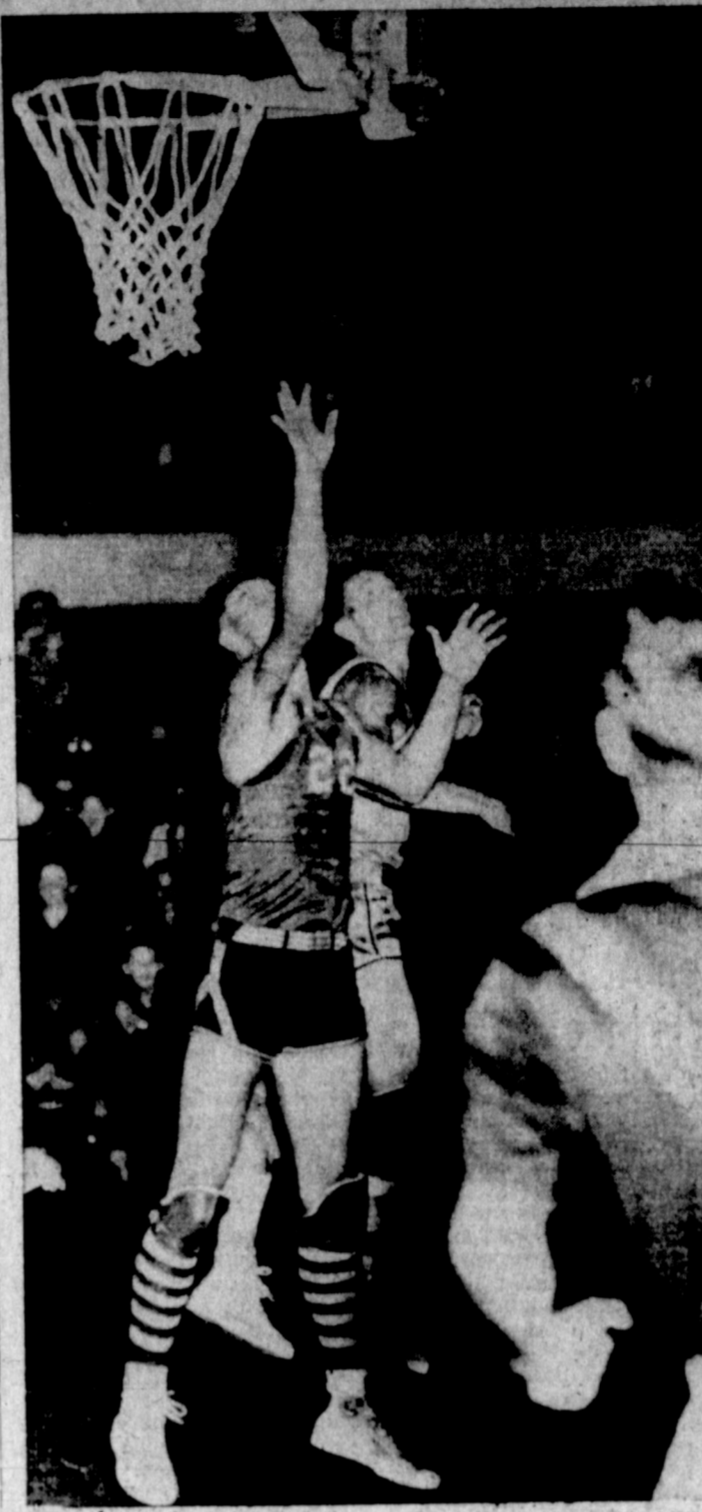

## Eidom Moves From 2nd To 4th In Rushing

Although he carried the ball but four times for 15 yards against Notre Dame, SMU's Frank Eidom moved from fourth into second place among the Southwest Conference's leading ball carriers.

Final conference statistics were released Monday, but there was little change among the leaders since the SMU-Notre Dame game was the season finale. Other teams finished their seasons the week before.

The Mustangs also gave up their title as the best offensive and defensive team in the conference in losing 26 to 14 to Notre Dame in a game played in the Big Red building on the ground and in the air to drop their per-game offense back to 310.3 per game, behind Baylor's 329.7.

The 477 yards Notre Dame gained via runs and passes boosted SMU's per-game defensive record to 273.3 yards-per-contest. This left Baylor in first place defensively with 261.0 followed closely by Texas A&M with 261.4.

Eidom, with a net gain of 677 yards, was far behind Rice's All-America halfback, Dicky Moegle, who finished first in ball carrying, first in scoring, second in punt returns and third in total offense despite the fact every yard he gained was made on runs. He didn't pass a time.

In ball carrying, Moegle had a net gain of 905 yards to 677 for Eidom and 670 for TCU's Jim Swink; in third place, Moegle's average per-carry was 6.2 yards in 144 times with the ball. Dicky scored 12 touchdowns, four more than his nearest rival, for 72 points to lead the conference.

In total offense, Moegle's 905 yards placed him third behind Texas A&M's Elwood Kettler, in first with 937, and Baylor's Billy Hooper, second with 934. Kettler gained 448 yards rushing and 411 passing.

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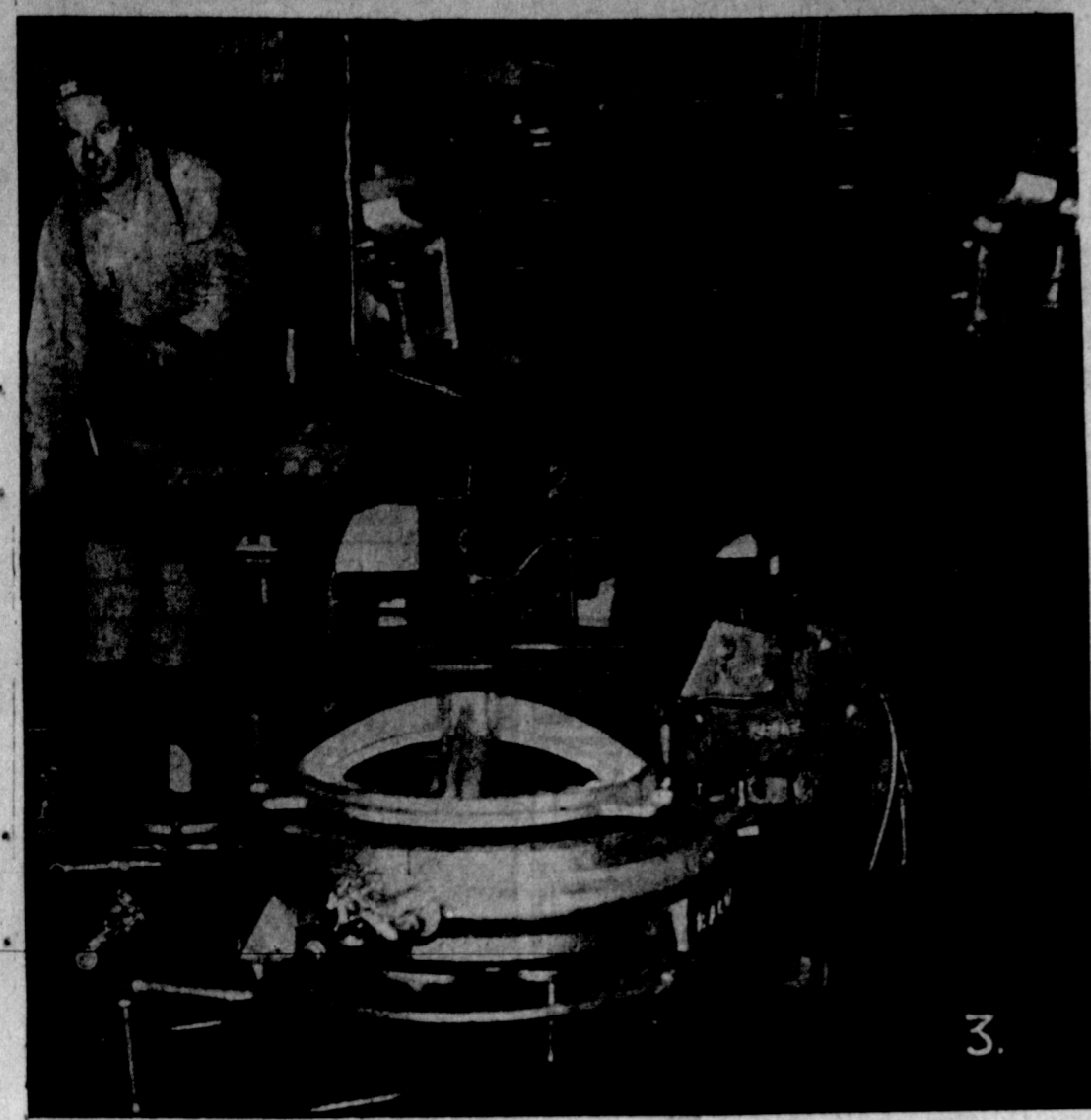

## Whipping Post Is Whipped

DOVER, Del. — (UP) — The whipping post — one of the few holdovers of colonial forms of punishment still remaining in this country — may be on its way out in Delaware.

A proposal to abolish the whipping post, still a legal form of punishment in the state, probably will come up at the opening term of the state legislature. The Democratic Party, which included abolition of the cat-o-nine-tails punishment in their victorious campaign at the last election, have enough votes to push it through.

However, the anti-whipping plank has been included in both the Republican and Democratic platforms as a matter of course during recent years, but there has been no well-organized effort to kill the penalty in the legislature.

The measure came up for vote on several occasions but was defeated each time, frequently by a narrow margin. Most of the opposition to the whipping post came from influences outside the state which branded the punishment inhumane.

24 Offenses  
In Delaware, however, many residents believe the whipping post is the best crime deterrent possible. They point out, for example, that the state is singularly untroubled by highway robberies for which whipping up to 40 lashes is compulsory.

The whip may be ordered for 23 other offenses at the discretion of the courts, including breaking and entering, forgery, wife-beating and high-pocketing.

However, whippings are rather rare. But there is a common belief that the threat of the whipping post is as effective as the lash itself.

Each of the three county prisons in the state has a whipping post in its yard. The yard is opened to the public under the law when a whipping takes place, but usually only a handful of witnesses appear.

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### Liberal Texas Demos Sponsor Breakfast To Honor Leaders

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 6.—UP—A group of Texas Liberal Democrats who oppose Gov. Allan Shivers' conservative leadership sponsored a scrambled egg and sausage breakfast Sunday in honor of national Democratic leaders. Among those honored at the breakfast were Adlai Stevenson, 1952 Democratic presidential nominee; Rep. Sam Rayburn of Bonham, slated to be speaker of the House; Stephen A. Mitchell, retir-

ing national chairman, and Paul Butler, newly-elected Democratic national chairman.

Among the 70 liberal party members present was Mrs. H. H. Weinert of Seguin, state Democratic national committeewoman. However, George Sandlin, state chairman and Shivers' lone spokesman attending the two-day national committee meeting which concluded Saturday, was not present.

Butler spoke briefly, and Stevenson added his bit of humor when he told the group in his opinion a political breakfast was the "highest example of man's inhumanity to man. But you Texans," he added, "have managed to even take the sting from that."

Stevenson lauded Butler and expressed confidence the new national chairman would "walk in the footsteps of his predecessor."

Butler hailed Rayburn as "one of the great leaders of the free world today," and said he was gratified to have received the vote of Mrs. Weinert in Saturday's committee balloting on election of the national chairman.

**THE RECORD SHOP:** Song-writing is a tough racket. There's an ad in Variety, jocosely headlined "2 Hits in a Row!" The hits are "I Get So Lonely" and "Mr. Sandman." They were written by Pat Ballard, who signed the ad. Underneath, in small print, it says "Also writer of 248 lousy songs."

A violin player and orchestra leader, name of George Liberace, is out with his first record album. It's on Columbia, and it's called "A Musical Journey." More of that later.

If this fellow's last name is familiar, you're right. He provides the musical backgrounds for his kid brother, a piano player and

candelabra-polisher who calls himself simply Liberace. He'll still do that for a living, but he's making records by himself to glid the living.

"Lee has always been very generous about giving me credit and introducing me everywhere we play," brother George said, "but it's nice to do something by myself. You know, there are always some people who'll say anything. They say that Lee just carries me as excess baggage because I'm his brother. This way I can prove that I can do something on my own."

Although George is the older of the two, he's the shorter. And he sports a mustache. But, otherwise, he's a lot like his brother—the same dimples, the same broad smile, the same soft voice.

George played his violin in orchestras for years before he teamed up with Lee in '47. Now he does everything for the team except play the piano and take the bows. He writes the arrangements, rehearses the orchestras they recruit in each city they play (only nine key musicians travel with them), and, to an extent, plans the programs.

"Lee never knows exactly what he's going to play ahead of time," George says. "I have to outguess him. I usually can tell just enough in advance to signal the orchestra. Sometimes, though, he deliberately tries to fool me—throws me a curve."

George is proud of his new album. It features selections that represent different nations around the world, which accounts for the title.

And one thing is significant. There's no piano.

The Christmas Seal drive this year will be sparked by a popular song. It was written by Matt Dennis and Tom Adair ("Will You Be Mine" was their creation). It's called "The Spirit of Christmas." Kitty Kalley has recorded it for Decca.

Dorsey's band featured a drummer named Buddy Rich. Buddy has just rejoined Tommy—who is now with his brother, Jimmy—and will handle the drums on their present tour of the south and on their Bell record numbers.

All Tommy needs now is to get Jack Leonard back and the old days will be the new days.

**DICK'S PICKS:** Stuart Hamblen, who wrote "This Ole House," has a new one on RCA called "Ole Pappy Time." Other good ones: "Triumph of Love" (Kaye Ballard, Decca); "The Song from Desiree" (Alan Dean, MGM); "Ling Ting Tong" (The Five Keys, Capitol); "Just for Laughs" (Bob Manning, Capitol); "The Touch" (Rosanne June, MGM); "Restless Heart" (Tony Martin, RCA); "Flame of Love" (Bas Sheva, Capitol).

Anyone for a slow song? There's a spate of albums with vocalists who sing songs softly. First, there's "Ella" (Fitzgerald, of course), on Decca. And Dinah Shore in a new RCA album. And "A Girl They Call Maria"—she's Mrs. Nat "King" Cole—on Kapp records. And "Autumn Nocturne," with the Ray Charles singers, on MGM, doing a bunch of autumnal melodies.

Classically, RCA-Victor has the new Verdi "Requiem," Toscanini's masterpiece of masterpieces, available. It is, simply, a gem.

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
