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Phillips Decision

People in the gas-producing area of the Top o' Texas have shown keen interest in the Phillips case in which, as the result of the Supreme Court decision, the Federal Power Commission has acted to control the price of natural gas in the field. Very likely, many consumers of this widely used fuel think that development a salutary one, which will work in their interest. But the view is vigorously disputed by many experts, who are convinced that in the interest of both consumer and producer Congress should eliminate FPC regulatory authority over the price the gas may be sold at the well-head,

This was strongly advocated by L. F. McCollum, President of the Continental Oil Company, in a recent speech. In his view, "The oil and gas industry literally has its back to the wall in a life-and-death struggle." Further, "the public is largely unaware of how their future supplies of natural gas are in jeopardy." To implement his argument, Mr. McCullum asked and answered three basic questions. The questions are: (1) Are the rates for gas in the field so high that the consumer needs protection by a Federal agency? (2) Will Federal controls achieve the desired end of assuring consumers of a continuing adequate supply of natural gas at reasonable prices? (3) Are regulations of this nature in the public interest and compatible with our American way

Mr. McCullum answered the first question with an unqualified No, and then told some of the economic facts of life as they apply to natural gas at the well. He stated, "The field price for the gas bears about the same relationship to the consumers' price as does the cost of water to the price of a cake of ice." The Supreme Court itself has said that the well-head price "is but a small fraction of the price paid by domestic consumers . . . The major items of cost are transmission and distribution, and these elements are already under the jurisdiction of the FPC and state regulatory bodies. If nothing at all was charged for the gas in the field, the average residential consumer would see his bill reduced by less than 10 per cent. Mr. McCollum also submitted figures to show that, by comparison with other fuels, natural gas in the field "is certainly not over-priced."

To the second question, his answer was also an unequivocal No. His reasons are that gas in the field is now sold competitively, prices are established by the law of supply and demand, and government efforts to artificially force prices down would ultimately result in inadequate supplies, "because the incentive to find and develop new sources is dependent upon receiving a fair price for the product." Also, he added, "it would cause such new supplies as were found to be diverted to sale within the state outside of FPC jurisdiction. Thus, the economies of other areas could suffer dislocations of "terrifying proportions."

Finally, Mr. McCollum answered the third question with another No. Production of natural gas, he stated, is a highly competitive business with "none of the characteristics of a public utility." The prices of the fuels with which it competes are not regulated. To quote him again, "The present attempt to regulate natural gas is a policy which is not applied to any other fuel energy source, and which represents a radical departure from the free enterprise system that has made this country what it is today - the stronghold of the free world."


