BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Oct. 4-UP- A cloudburst dropped out of tropical storm on Brownsville, at the mouth of the Rio Grande, Monday, flooding part of the city in as much as six feet of rain-

The National Guard was called

out to help flood victims from their homes. The guardsmen and civilian rescue workers went up and down the streets in boats, which became canals in less than five hours. No injuries were reported. Bill Watts of the Brownsville Herald, who made a tour of the city of 37,000 persons said, "at least 20 or 30 blocks are flooded . .the bulk of our rain fell in two-and-a-half hours." Up to 9:30 a.m. the weather bureau had recorded 6.84

Watts said west Brownsville and the mid-town area were worst hit. Stores along Elizabeth street were hard hit. The storm that brought the rain never got to be a hurricane before it hit land and there was little wind.








Dirksen Knows

Why it was not given more prominence, seeing that the subject of Sen. Joe McCarthy has been figuring in the news lately, we don't know - but a recent speech by Sen. Dirksen of Illinois certainly hit the nail on the head so far as the efforts to "get Joe" are concerned.

We were naturally somewhat pleased since the opening of his speech before the Senate followed a line of reasoning that this paper has used in connection with a number of things we have not liked about the junior senator from Wisconsin — but not his fighting Communism nor his "methods."

Sen. Dirksen said:

"I shall castigate and scold the senator from Wisconsin when he is wrong, and I shall stand up and be counted for him when I think there is what appears to be something in the nature of a conspiratorial effort to liquidate

Who were the participants in this conspiracy to "get" Joe McCarthy? Senator Dirksen goes on to name them, in a way that must have penetrated even the rhinocerous hide of Senator Flanders.

"The Communist Party got into bed with the Senator from Vermont," said Dirksen. "There is the record. Who will try to dispute it? The Congress of Industrial Organizations got into the bed too, and so did the Labor League of Students in New York. Oh, what a marching concourse. It includes the Americans for Democratic Action. There they are, a multitude to do what? To liquidate a member of the Senate. They want to do it on a personal basis, because the resolution has been changed three times, and the condemnation now is not to Joe McCarthy as chairman, but of Joe McCarthy as an individual.

"Who of us shall be next on the list. We come next to the fourth contingent of the marching multitude. The National Committee for an Effective Congress, 680 Fifth Avenue, New York 19, N. Y.

Mr. Dirksen then told the Senate that this organization had moved into a hotel room across the street from the Senate office building, from which place it carried on its propaganda campaign against McCarthy.

"I am distressed," he said, "that the Senator from Vermont permitted himself to be used as the spearhead for a multitude to do evil to a member of this body. It could be any other Senator some time before the next






