Weathermen **Study Rainfall** In Hawaii

By ROBERT C. MILLER United Press Staff Correspondent HILO, Hawaii - (UP) - The rain that falls on golf courses, parched lands and loaded clotheslines has character.

And a group of international scientists has gathered in Hawaii to do a character study and analysis of the temperamental rain drops. The study, known as "operation shower" is a study of warm rainfall.

The project is unique in two ways. It's the first intensified study of what causes warm rain-fail, and it's a sort of a bring-your-own-bottle party, as all the UN Faces Third scientists involved have lugged their own equipment and instruments to Hawaii. The Australians even brought their own airplane. Some 25 meteorologists are taking part in the two-month study, the most intensive ever undertaken into the causes of warm rainfall. 



Rule By Fear

"Freedom from Fear" was one of the reasons Roosevelt gave for involving us in World War II, remember? Where is that freedom now? The only thing Roosevelt was afraid of at the time was that the war would be over before he could get us into it.

This is the first time in history that any nation has ever possessed a new and terrible weapon and used it only to frighten its own citizens; always before it has been turned against the enemy.

This hullabaloo about the terrible destruction that will come with the next war --- A bombs, H bombs, chemical and germ warfare, etc. is propaganda from the internationalists in our government who are trying to frighten us into surrendering our sovereignty and joining some super world government.

Since there are only two powerful nations left on the planet it follows that every concession we make toward an international order will put us that much more under the domination of Russia. Has anybody heard any Russian offering to surrender Russia's sovereignty or to weaken her position in any way? No one has; the pressure is all on us; we will make all the concessions; all 'compromises" will be decided in Russia's favor, as they have been in the United Nations from the very start.

We know that Russia has but one objective: world conquest. "Peaceful coexistence" is a dream of our gullible diplomats and statesmen. Russia wants no part of it, and will have none. Whenever she appears to relax, or to agree with us on any subject, that's when she needs watching most. If our leaders are still dumb enough to believe they can make any kind of deal with Russia that the Russians will be bound by they are dumb indeed. Russia will make no deals but to further her own interests and quicken her conquest. All other deals will be mere pretense on her part which she will regard as "scraps of paper" when they no longer suit her whims.

Thanks to the internationalists, fellow travelers, and just plain Communists in our government we built Russia into the formidable enemy she is today. And now they are trying to frighten us into surrendering to her by joining a world government.

The politicians may be as frightened as they seem to be, but they haven't scared the general public much to date. If it comes to a showdown, most of us would rather be dead Americans than live Communists. The words of Patrick Henry still ring in our ears: "Give me liberty, or give me death!"

As pointed out in the last issue, Smith shows how the people who believe there are no absolute principles - no absolute values - no guides of human conduct that in-

dividuals must obey - have taken possession of our public schools. Mr. Smith points out that his

idea of education is to transmit the intellectual and cultural heritage and knowledge of the race, and in the process to teach young

people to think and to buttress moral values. But how can teachers teach moral values when they deny there are any absolute moral values? Then Mr. Smith observes:

"To fulfill this function is not a small or a simple task: I am convinced that lukewarm devotion to it, or outright contempt for it, is responsible for the progressive decline in the quality of public education which we are witnessing today."

Then he says: 'I believe there are universal values in education that are good for everyone, whether he intends to become a butcher or a banker, a minister or a motorman, a professor or a plumber."

But since the schools are operated by violating universal moral values, they of course cannot teach moral principles, as this column has repeatedly pointed out. Many people contend, as Mr. Smith does, that we should try to correct our public schools rather than take a stand against them. But it is impossible to correct a thing that is basically immoral. It is impossible to make a thing in harmony with morality that violates the Commandments and the Golden Rule. It is no more possible to correct public schools that are based on might-makes-right, than it is to correct putting poison in the food of children.

We are in the position of placing a child in a room into which poison gas is seeping - gas that soon will kill the child - and then worrying about whether or not the child is getting the proper food diet until such time as the poison has done its work. We are putting poi-son in the minds of the youth of the land by teachers who are prac-


