

This was one of the areas held by the Dutch before the outbreak of hostilities Sunday. Modjokerto is 28 miles southwest of Socrabaja.

The answer to the French objec-tion is that the United States and Britain also have had a stomach full of Prussianism and have no thought of allowing Germany to become industrialized again to the point where she might wage war. To ensure this, there is the agreement to keep the country occupied by Allied troops until all danger is past.

Another monkey-wrench has been tossed into the rehabilitation machinery by Britain herself. The Socialist government has been insisting on nationalization of the all important Ruhr coal industry which by the way is lagging badly, whereas the United States has urged that this be deferred so that the German people themselves may have an opportunity to decide whether there shall be Socialization.

This argument is spot-lighted by a rather melodramatic turn: British Minister of Labor Isaacs announced yesterday that government compulsion would be applied in Britain, if necessary, to force the introduction of staggered working hours in industry in order to avert another fuel crisis next winter. He again appealed for the voluntary intro-cuction of night work-an appeal thus far ignored by the great majority of industries and trade unions. Oddly enough last Saturday in Moscow Soviet Minister of Agri-culture Benedi demanded that farmers stop taking two hours for lunch and work harder in getting in the grain crop. He criticized some col-lective farms where he said the farmers had been loafing. So the Socialist states do have their troubles after all.


