# Rough Going

For some reason the idea has been gaining wide currency that the Eisenhower legislative program has encountered extremely thorny going, and that only a relatively small part of it has any chance of becoming law. There seems to be more talk about the setbacks than about the accomplishments.

It was obvious from the beginning that no program so all-embracing as that laid down by the President at the start of his administration would be approved in its entirety. Some of the President's friends and followers are of the opinion that he made a mistake in asking so · much. But, whether that is true or not, an objective look at the record shows many very important accomplish-

Jay Hayden, a nationally syndicated columnist, recently discussed what has happened. "Eisenhower is approaching the end of his first full fiscal year in a remarkably strong position. It is not too much to say that Eisenhower's accomplishments in the field of economics adds up to \$5 revolutionary a swing toward inaustrial freedom and stability as Roosevelt's New Deal did in the opposite direction of socialistic government

Mr. Hayden went on to describe a number of the major achievements. Some are highly controversial, of course, and many people will disagree with their wisdom. Regardless of that the President wanted them and got them. Here is a partial list:

The Administration wiped out all price and wage controls. And it did this, as Mr. Hayden observes, "with no sign of inflation, wholesale strikes and other disturbances that were prophesied as resulting from that action."

Government military buying for military purposes has been reduced by \$7,500,000,000 in a single fiscal year. Yet employment has been running at higher levels than was the case a year ago. In May, the number of emplayed reached a peacetime record.

Substantial reductions have been made in taxes, from which all individuals and enterprises will benefit in one way or another. Even so, the deficit will be two-thirds less than the Truman estimate.

Though the Senate and House agricultural committees voted down the Eisenhower flexible support proposals and voted continuance of 90 per cent supports, a surprising number of senators from farm states -- including lowa, Kansas, Idaho, Florida and New Mexico - supported the President. Here Mr. Hayden observes. "The avowed purpose of President Eisenhower to cut back farm price supports, hailed earlier as his greatest political danger, shows signs of becoming an election-day asset."

Other Eisenhower requests which have been approved include the St. Lawrence Seaway, which had been advocated by every President beginning with Harding without success; increased social security benefits; a national defense bill differing in a number of important respects from prior ones, and extension for a year of the reciprocal trade plan.

That is the record of a stormy and eventful year. Few Presidents have obtained so much they wanted in so

Means Better Jobs

I know of no person who knows more about the ill-effects of unsound money than Ludwig von Mises, I have read 2,000 or 3,000 pages of von Mises' books. His latest book is "The Theory of Money and Credit." Some of it was rather tedious to me because it was, to a degree, elementary. He goes into the theory of quantity of money and explains the other factor's that influence prices as well as the quantity of money. I got a clearer conception of why prices change from his treatise than I had before,

His chapter on "The Principle of Sound Money" was especially interesting, I want to quote from this chapter, Mr. von Mises has this to say:

"The liberal doctrine sees in the market economy the best, even the only possible, system of economic organization of society. Private ownership of the means of production tends to shift control of production to the hands of those best fitted for this job and thus to secure for all members of society the fullest possible satisfaction of their needs. It assigns to the consumers the power to choose those purveyors who supply them in the cheapest way with the articles they are most urgently asking for and thus subjects the entrepreneurs and the owners of the means of production, viz. the capitalists and the landowners, to the sovereignty of the buying public, It makes nations and their citizens free and provides ample sustenance for a steadilyincreasing population

From The Tree Of Freedom "As a system of peaceful cooperation under the division of labor, the market economy could not work without an institution warranting to its members pro-tection against domestic gangsters and external foes. Violent aggression can be thwarted only by armed resistance and repression, Society needs an apparatus of defense, a state, a government, a police force. Its undisturbed functioning must be safeguarded by continuous preparedness to repel aggressors. But then a new danger springs up. How to keep under control the men entrusted with the handling of the government apparatus lest they turn their weapons against those whom they were expected to serve? The main political problem is how to prevent the rulers from becoming despots and enslaving the citizenry. Defense of the individual's liberty against the encroachments of tyrannical governments is the essential theme of the history of Western civilization. 




