

Immigration

Many people who otherwise believe in freedom draw the line at free immigration. Many people who fight for relaxing restrictions in economics demand further restrictions in the field of immigration. The generic freedom lovers known as libertarians are divided on this

Some of them favor repeal of the McCarran Immigration Act; others asked for a stricter act.

The National Economic Council, consistent in advocating freedom in most areas, supports the principles of exclusion and restriction in the McCorran Act. We are admirers of the National Economic Council, and will continue to reprint their excellent articles, though we take issue with them on this subject of immigration.

We believe in a liberal immigration policy.

Many of our arguments concerning immigration come from other fighters for freedom.

Leonard Reed, President of the Foundation for Economic Education, believes that immigration laws should be as liberal as they were in the 19th Century when America became a great nation.

Frank Chodorov, editor of The Freeman, whose own people were immigrants, believes that we should cut out spending huge sums on foreign propaganda, such as the Voice of America, and rely instead on the letters written back home by immigrants who love this country. That was what caused so many Europeans to fall in love with America. Their relatives wrote glowing accounts of life here, and the whole family wanted to come.

Bill Johnson, editor of Faith and Freedom, believes that it is not consistent with Christian principles for us immigrants (all of us are immigrants or descendents of immigrants, excepting only those of us who are Indians) to beat other immigrants back from the border, preventing them from seeking the prosperity which we other immigrants have achieved.

Isabel Paterson, author of The God of the Machine, described how the political power which claimed to be humanitarian, treated the immigrants:

"It's first requirement was that each immigrant should bring with him a certain sum of money. That is to say, it cut off the most needy abroad from their sole hope. Later, when the political power in Europe had reduced life to a gloomy hell, but a large number of persons might still have scraped together the requisite sum for admittance to America, the political power here simply cut down admission to a quota. The more desperate the need, the less chance could the political power allow them. Would not many millions in Europe be glad and grateful if they could have even the poorest chance which the old (American) system afforded, instead of convict camps, torture cellars, vile humiliations, and violent death?

. Risking nothing himself (the political official) gets his pay for thrusting desperate people back from the borders, as drowning men might be beaten back from the sides of a well-provisioned ship."

Professor Of History Contends There Are No Natural Rights

I wat to continue to comment on an article from "The Quarterly Review" written by Dr. Preston Slosson, a Professor of History at the University of Michigan, under the heading of "Freedom, and What It Means" and "We Hold These Truths to be Self-Evident. "-which he denies.

Of course, no professor in any state college could actually believe that there are any natural, inalienable rights. Nor could we expect any professor in or any believer in state compulsory schools to be able to properly define liberty or freedom. If they really defined liberty or freedom and inalienable rights for each and every individual, they would be embarrassed because state schools are based on a denial of the rights of some people for the material benefit of others. They would be uncomfortable if they properly defined liberty as being the absence of aggression, or the right to be let alone, or that man is owner of himself and all he produces, or that an individual has the right to manage his own life and no one elses. They dare not define freedom and liberty in this manner. In fact, most of the textbooks in public schools and colleges teach that the youth of the land must give up some of their liberty to the state. - even if the sole purpose of any just state should be to protect the liberty of every citizen.

Dr. Slosson writes:

"It must be admitted that no right is quite absolute. Almost every law limits someone's freedom in one way or another, but the impracticability of lawless anarchy is admitted by nearly everyone."-

You will note from the above that Dr. Slosson realizes that the overnment is interfering with freedom. But what has that got to do with the inalienable rights of individuals? Because we have a government by short-sighted men that does the exact opposite from what it should do-protect the freedom and liberty of every individual-has nothing to do with the inalienable rights of individ-

Dr. Slossons contends there are no such things as freedom and liberty. If he was trying to contend that we never had perfect freedom or liberty, that would be right; but he is arguing that there are no such things as liberts and freedom. He writes:

What about the conscientious objector to vaccination, or schooling, or draft registration, or the

A man has a perfect right to refuse to be vaccinated if he does property. But, of course, Dr. Slosson being on the government payroll where he does not have to teach well enough that people will voluntarily pay him, has to try to defend compulsory vaccinations and schooling.

Now listen to this from a man who is supposed to be an educa-

Believes Laissez Faire Is Wage Slavery

"We have long since found out that 'free enterprise,' in the sense of complete laissez faire, meant 'wage slavery' for millions.'

I know of no one who will answer questions without evasion who so believes. Of course, men who believe there are no inalienable rights do not believe in free entrprise of a laissez-faire economy. And a laissez-faire economy does not give the government the right to interfere with men freely exchanging goods and services. It only gives-them the right to penalize fraud and aggression. To the degree that we have had a laissez-faire economy, to that degree do we have material blessings and freedom. Lissez-faire is nothing life and recognizing the equal right


