# World Hot War

For First Time In Twenty Years Global Peace Reigns

GENEVA, July 21 -UP- France and her Communist enemy signed an Indo-China cease-fire Wednesday, leaving the world without a "hot" war for the first time in 20

Representatives of both sides in the nearly eight-year-old war offi-cially ended the hostilities in two separate ceremonies, both delayed

by red tape, Ceremonies leading to the signing of the cease - fire for Viet Nam, Indo . China's largest state and scene of the major fighting, and the lesser state of Laos were concluded at 3:50 a. m. (8:50 p. m. Tuesday est).

Last - minute objections to the continued presence of Red guerrillas in Cambodia, the third Indo-Chinese state, plus the loss of an official seal delayed completion of the overall cease - fire agreement

until (12:30 p. m., 5:38 a. m. cst).
Sporadic Shooting May Continue
The cease - fire became effective moment the documents were signed, but sporadic shooting may continue throughout Indo-China for two more weeks because it may take that long to relay the order to isolated units.

In achieving the cease fire, French Premier Pierre Mendes-France attained his goal of winning peace in Indo-China within 30 days after taking office.

Even though the first documents were signed almost four hours after his midnight deadline, the delay was a technicality and all documents were dated July 20. "Agreement was reached before

midnight as the premier promised," a conference spokesman said. "The technical details of the signing were held up because a number of pages had to be retyped. The premier does not intend to re-sign because of a simple delay in



## The Real Answer

People send us stuff from time to time cut out from newspapers and magazines with sentences underlined. Idea is to needle us or make us think by showing up clippings which appear at first glance to prove that freedom does not work out in practice.

Latest tidbit tells the story of a Japanese industrialist who has made millions according to the story by paying his labor extremely low wages, and requiring young girls to work long hours.

This kind of news wrings our "friend's" heart. His heart is as big as a house and in his own language he is a "humanitarian."

He claims that he is a humanitarian because his heart bleeds for the poor young Japanese girls who must work long hours for small pay in slum surroundings. Something should be done about it.

Our answer is that this humanitarian's heart is not big enough; instead of bleeding for the few thousand overworked Japanese girls --- we believe his heart should bleed (if humanitarian means one concerned for humanity) for all the starving hoardes of Asia.

His heart bleeds for these girls because their working conditions, pay and hours don't compare even remotely with those enjoyed by American workers.

But we say his heart should bleed even more for the millions of Asians who work in rice paddies at wages (if any) even lower than those received by the factory workers.

The young factory girls in this story earn \$10 per month, or \$120 per year. The fishermen and field workers earn much less. The last figures we saw showed that the Japanese fishermen and field workers earn \$50 per year and less.

The Japanese capitalist rose out of an agricultural economy with the idea of investing their meager profits in new industries. Their new factories, they hoped, would compete with the rest of the world's industry and thereby raise Japan's standard of living.

They succeeded remarkably. The standard of living of Japan stands immeasurably

higher than that of China, India, or the rest of Asia. The only major country of Asia which can boast a standard of living higher than Japan's is the Philippine Islands. The credit for the Philippine's high standard goes to the Filipino's smart use of American capital, and willingness to copy the American capitalist's methods.

The Japanese capitalists, at first, weren't very rich. They risked the little capital which they had scraped together in hiring people — the most energetic young people they could find.

They were accused by the small-hearted "humanitar tans" of doing these young people a horrible wrong, and their businesses were cited as revealing the intrinsic brutality of capitalism. They gave people jobs? Shame on them!

The conditions of the factory workers, though they worked long hours for small pay in slum surroundings, certainly couldn't compare with the conditions of American workers, many of whom are capitalists themselves through the interest they receive on savings accounts, insurance policies and stocks.

But the most lowly paid Japanese factory worker's standard of living soars high over that of his Chinese or Indian neighbor.

How would you go about increasing the standard of living of all these people?

All . . . not just a few

The humanitarian whose small heart bleeds for the factory worker is bleeding for the few thousand whose living standard has already been raised above that of the vast majority.

The humanitarian with the small heart believes that the capitalist's profits should be used in raising the pay of these few thousand who are already better off than their brothers.

If his heart were really large, the humanitarian would advise that these profits be used to create new factories so that the rest of the Asians can pull themselves up by their bootstraps . . . up to the level of Japan.

Instead of worrying about those thousand factory workers in Japan he should worry about the millions of much poorer field workers who would jump at the chance to work in a factory, at the meanest job - but for the fact there aren't enough factory jobs to go around.

The solution, if the humanitarian's heart were big enough to grasp it, would be to build factories all over Asia, and gradually raise the standard of living of all the people.

But in shortsighted, small-hearted fashion, the humanitarian instead advocates using profits to raise the standard of the few factory workers now fortunate enough

to have jobs. If his heart were bigger, he'd want more capitalism and more factories everywhere to benefit the many rath-

er than the few. As the factories get started, improvements are made slowly. Competition for labor increases at the same rate building of new factories increases. More factories mean eventual higher wages for everybody, whether the benefits come in lower prices to the consumer or higher wages

to the workers in the form of production bonuses. But the way to this goal is to plow the profits back into new factories, new expansion programs which will put more and more people to work. The way is to warry in a practical way about all the unemployed hungry people everywhere - not the few who are already fortunate enough to be employed in a Japanese factory.

The only real way to increase wages for everybody is to increase production, and production means profits re-

How Should We Regard Public Officials?

The kind of government we have will to a large degree depend upon how individual citizens regard

It will be remembered that Pegler thinks all public officials should be required to wear an emblem showing that they are sup-ported by taxes.

Now, Frank Chodorov in an article headed "Washington, the American Mecca" discusses the attitude we should have towards our government servants, whether they be city, county, state or federal. I have permission to quote his article that appeared in Human Events on this subject:

"It's June in Washington. It's June all over the country, of course, but to the capital city the month has special significance. It inaugurates the annual trek of gaping sightseers from all over the country to this American Mecca.

"Soon the vacationing school teachers will be ah-ing and oh-ing before the wondrous temples of government, while prize-winning high school students will pay their worshipful respects to the pompous dignitaries and official hirelings who carry on the affairs of state. Honeymooning couples, already taking one another for granted, will transfer their admiration and adoration to the indicia of political power, while farmers, satiated with the wonders of nature in their native habitats, will be propitiating the gods of government in their air-conditioned apses. In summer, it is the proper thing for Americans to come to Washington and view with awe.

"If you were to ask these visitors, they would tell you that they came here only to admire the beauty of the town. And, to be fair, this is a beautiful town. Why shouldn't it be? It is like a harlot who never soils her hands with useful work, and whose only occupation, outside a harlotry, is to preen and primp - at the expense of her admirers. Washington s, and ought to be, the most beautiful city in the country; it is also the most use ess.

"Putting aside the esthetc thrill which these gapers get out of the visit, they cannot but carry away with them an overpowering impression of the glory and grandeur of the government domiciled here. It must be a wondrous government that operates in this wondrous environment, And when they get back home they will tell of the invigorating, almost healing, experience of having seen the anointed and brushed the robes of greatness; even as did those who in ancient times visited Rome. They will have visited the holy of holies. And all their lives thereafter they will tell, and magnify the tale of their almost sacred pilgrimage.

"By the easy processes of the simple mind, this adoration of the domes and the masonry and the staruary will spill over to the denzens of the city-to the Pharisees and Sadducees who are integrated with the monumentalization of government. They are the bureaucrats, the truly blessed. To see them in their charmed cubicles, deeply immersed in papers, is to realize that they are different from the ordinary run of mortals, and that the difference is not one of degree but of kind. One reads sometimes of a bureaucrat who has fallen from grace, by taking a bribe or surreptitiously letting a foreign nation in an official secrets. But, a single transgression does not disprove the infallibility of the class.


There are elected officials here oo, but the aura that surrounds them is not comparable with that which surrounds the bureaucrats. The former must descend from the clouds at election time and simulate the life of ordinary men. The bureaucrat always stands aloof. He is a special person, educated and trained for the priesthood, and his adeptness with the exotic rituals of government sets him off from the rest of mankind. He wields power without benefit of votes. He is anonymous, ubiquitous, indispensable. And, in a way, he enjoys immortality; administrations and Congressmen come and go, but the bureaucracy goes on forever. It is the soul of that superperson called government.

"The summer pilgrims who come to Washington ostensibly to see, but not unprpared to worship, are aided in their devotions by droning guides. Perhaps it is only by dint of constant repetition, but it is a fact that these carefully trained expositors of the wonders of the national shrine develop an intonation suronaly reminiscent of the ritualistic Sunday sermon. Every bid of monumentalized government is described with reverence. Stress is laid on the tradition, the historical significance, the inner meaning of each piece of stonework, until the weary minds and legs of the pilgrims are left limp with adoration, and are willing to settle on a religious acceptance of

the whole thing "There must be a purpose in all this architectural pageantry, this careful manicuring of parks and the elaborate horticulture, a purpose quite unrelated to mere estheticism. 


