It said its stormy investigation of the department last year produced "no conclusive" evidence of wrongdoing" on the part of the former attorney general.

But it said Clark's decision "to withhold his co-operation" during the investigation left "the strong inference..., that he was respon-sible for some of the conditions the subcommittee has found most worthy of criticism."



Allan Shivers has run into the kind of bind that Dick Nixon encounted — and Nixon turned it into votes - but it's going to be the neatest political trick of the century if Allan can do the same.

Remember the famous Nixon heart-washing?

It was right about the time lke was beginning to find out that running for President wasn't covered in any of the manuals he'd studied at West Point. He was being given bad advice by the same GOP "liberals" who are still doing business with him; and he was more scared than heroic.

In other words, the whole truth about taxes is not readily apparent. But piecemeal facts about taxes can be collected. Taken altogether, these facts are enough to make even complacent taxpayers demand that the size and cost of government be drastically whittled down, and that the whittling begin at once.

Record Spending

1. Expenditures of the national government in the current fiscal year will total approximately \$70 billion. This is the highest level of spending every reached by the U.S. government except for the three World War II years and the Korean crisis year, 1952-53. It is more than twice as high as the \$33 billion spent in 1948, and almost eight times the \$9.1 billion spent in 1940. In actual purchasing power, the estimated 1954 expenditures are almost twice those of 1948 and four times those of 1940,







For instance, a careless catcher won't hide his signals and thus he lets the opponents know what pitch to expect. When you give signals, lay your mitt over the left knee to block the view of the third hase coach, and point your right knee approximately halfway between first and second base to cut off the view of the first base coach. Then place the fingers of the right hand near the right thigh to keep the people behind you from seeing the signs.

Don't stay in a crouch after giving your signals. Stand up with the weight on the bails of your feet and body bent forward. Once you give the pitcher a target with your mitt, hold the target still until he throws the ball. Otherwise, your mitt will resemble a moving target in a shooting gallery and will hinder the pitcher's control. 




