## SE Asia Defenses Heat Wave Grip **Built Up**

Into Third Day U. S. To Rush Jet Planes And Arms To **Vulnerable Thailand** 

WASHINGTON, July 14 -UP -- America's drive to shore up Southeast Asia's defenses picked up speed Wednesday following a decision to rush jet planes and arms to vulnerable Thailand.

The Defense Department announced the "crash" program Tuesday night at the conclusion of 14 days of secret strategy talks here with a Thai military mis-









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## The Greedy State

Eisenhower seems to have a number of sound ideas that he is incapable of applying to the situation confronting him. Thus, in receiving an honorary degree from a small college in Maryland, he said that governments are customarily greedy and that they seek, with busybody instinct, to intrude into the concerns of the

We agree with that. This is a government in which more than three Americans out of each hundred engage in overseeing the rest. It is a government which earns nothing itself, but spends one dollar out of every five dollars earned by the people of the United States. Its programs and budgets can barely be outlined in a book of a thousand pages, which is beyond the understanding of all except a limited few. This government attempts not only to chaperon the people in almost everything they do, but to exercise a regulatory function over the concerns of a great number of foreign nations and to impose its views upon them in the name of "world leadership." This mission has not been vested in the government of the United States by the acclamation of the other nations concerned, but is self-conferred.

When Eisenhower speaks out against greedy and busybody conceptions of the state, he is incapable of observing the forest in being because of his contemplation of trees in the abstract. His sentiments are correct, but his

Of course, the President can account for that by saving that, although in past times it would have been considered reprehensible for the government to do many of the things it is now doing, these things are now perfectly acceptable, for they are done "through terms of legislation." If legislating something, or anything, is the simple test of whether it is appropriate or right, there would seem to be no limit upon the possible extension of governmental power.

If these things the government is now doing were considered "reprehensible" in the past, to use Eisenhower's term, they were regarded as reprehensible because they were considered to be not only unconstitutional and unlawful but outside the proper sphere of activity by the state. That they are now considered tawful does not signify that they lie within the proper area of governmental action. It only means that Presidents, Congresses, and courts have decided what the people want on the demonstrated voting response. If the people want to be bribed with their own money, or, more particularly, with the money of their fellows, that is not reprehensible and the government will accommodate then...

Great Conspiracy to Destroy United States

Now I want to reproduce a peech made by Congressman Usher L. Lurdick of North Dakota recently in the House of Representatives. He uses as a heading for his talk "The Great Conspiracy to Destroy the United States." Here is the way he explains how the backers of the UN are lined up to destroy our form of government.

What proof do we have to back up this general statement? The purpose of this speech is to lay this proof before the American peo-

"First of all, the people of the United States were so completely sick of war after World War II that these schemers found a fertile field to exploit. They appealed to churches, schools, and every other organization they could reach, on the basis that the way to secure peace in the world was to organize United Nations group, and that through the machinery which they proposed to set up wars could be stopped before they started. It eemed like a plausible idea, and not knowing the sinister purpose behind the move, millions of people supported the sugggestion.



## \$256 Million Ideas Talked By Water Men

contest in Long Beach, Calif., on July 23. The 18-year-old beauty won out over 50 entries. Seventeen board members considered three proposals totaling \$256,000,000 at the Canadian River Municipal Water meeting at Plainview Monday, said C. A. Huff, one of the two Pampa directors.

The directors representing the 11 cities in the organization will hear feasibility reports concerning each of the proposals at their next meeting Aug. 9. One proposal, with an estimated cost of \$94 million, is that each city in the group have its own water plant. A second pro-posal costing \$72 million would cut some of the pumping stations and meter lines of the water system. The third proposal would also cut some of the feeder lines and pumping stations while providing water for all the cities and the industrial organizations around each city. The cost is approximately

"I favor the third proposal from my first glance at it," said Huff, "It will cut a lot of things we won't need for 20 years."

Thompson, a former mayor of Pampa, said he feels the same way. "We didn't seriously consider the first proposal, only the second and third. Of the last two I like the third proposal best.

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
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
