Ike Highway Plan Upsets Governors

BOLTON LANDING, N.Y., July 14 — UP — State governors, upset over President Eisenhower's multi-billion dollar highway proposal, planned Wednesday for a show-up meeting with the President. A resolution advocating the meeting is being held in Washington soon after the November elections to seek a compromise highway plan approved at Wednesday's closing session of the 66th annual governors' conference.

The Eisenhower "grand plan" for highway modernization, unveiled in a speech by Vice President Richard M. Nixon, proposed a broad, co-operative federal-state highway construction plan costing \$50 billion over the next 10 years. It was understood this would be in addition to normal expenditures. The speech shocked some governors who said the program's total cost might run as high as \$90 billion. Governors who want to get the federal government out of the road building business expressed their that before the end of the year.

Public Power Fight Is On

WASHINGTON, July 14 — UP — A Senate fight over public vs. private power Wednesday threatened to hold up approval of the administration's atomic energy bill. Three amendments dealing with phases of the public power controversy were scheduled to be offered as the Senate resumed debate on the bill which would broaden international co-operation in the atomic field, develop atomic power industry and lay the groundwork for President Eisenhower's worldwide atomic pool plan. Senate Republican leader William F. Knowland said he expects the Senate to take two or three days to complete its consideration of the atomic bill, a revision of the 1946 atomic energy act.

SE Asia Defenses Built Up

U. S. To Rush Jet Planes And Arms To Vulnerable Thailand

WASHINGTON, July 14 — UP — America's drive to shore up Southeast Asia's defenses picked up speed Wednesday following a decision to rush jet planes and arms to vulnerable Thailand. The Defense Department announced the "crash" program Tuesday night at the conclusion of 14 days of secret strategy talks here with a Thai military mission. U. S. and Thai officials said the plan calls for immediate doubling of officer and non-com trainees in the Thai army; prompt shipment of U. S. jets, small arms, tanks, artillery and equipment; and the allotment of \$3 million in American funds to build a strategically important highway. Informed sources revealed Wednesday that Nationalist China also will soon be receiving swift U. S. F-86 Sabres that may help keep Red China from committing the bulk of its air power to the Communist aggression in Southeast Asia.

These strategic moves were disclosed after the House Foreign Affairs committee unanimously approved a resolution opposing the admission of Red China to the United Nations and backing President Eisenhower in his determination to keep it out. The committee adopted the resolution instead of several stronger proposals calling for U. S. withdrawal from the UN or at least a policy "re-examination" in case of Red China's admission. The group emphasized that it was making "no recommendation" as to what action the President or Congress should take. It said it has "every confidence" that Mr. Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles will retain free world support for the U. S. position.

Business Slow At Elevators

Harvest of the 1954 wheat crop in Gray County is practically complete. Grain elevators are receiving about one or two loads per day, operators report. Fisher-Panhandle Grain Company officials reported activity at their elevator here was practically at a standstill and that the harvest is virtually complete. Most of the wheat has been No. 2 and 3 quality throughout the country and the average yield has been about 30 bushels per acre. Between 900,000 and one million bushels was the estimated total yield for the county.

Gruver Boy Arrested On Arms Charge

An 18-year-old Gruver youth was being held by Pampa police today on charges of unlawfully carrying arms, a reporter said. He was Raymond Floyd Malena, who was arrested at 12:45 a.m. today in the 700 block of N. West. The arrest came after a Pampa man came to the police station and bid officers some boys were waiting in his yard for him to come home and asked that they follow him to his home. He told them he had previously had trouble with one of the boys, at which time the youth had pulled a knife on him, but he ran away from him, the man added. Police followed him to his home and as his car entered his driveway, two youths walked into the yard from the sidewalk toward the man. Officers stopped them before they could get to him and took them to the police station. Malena, police said, was carrying a dagger at the time of the arrest. The other youth, 15 years old, was released pending further investigation. Malena was expected to appear before County Judge J. B. Maguire, Jr., this afternoon to answer the charge.

Absentee Votes Nearing 100

The total of absentee votes nearing 100 late this morning. There were 98 absentee ballots cast, of which eight were mailed to the office of County Clerk Charles Thut. Voters wishing to cast absentee ballots have through Tuesday to do so. After that time, there will be no voting till July 24 which is Primary Day for both Republicans and Democrats.

SHANNON, Ireland, July 14 — UP — Officials at Shannon Airport said Tuesday Army Secretary Robert T. Stevens, a key figure in the Army-McCarthy hearings, really was in McCarthyland when he passed through here recently. Jack McCarthy was on duty in the control tower when Stevens' special plane landed and Charlie McCarthy was in charge of airport operations. John and Jack McCarthy cleared the secretary through customs. Mick McCarthy, head manager at the airport, directed Stevens to the post office where Tom McCarthy sold him postcards. Paddy McCarthy served him coffee at the airport lounge. However, the secretary did not bump into Joe McCarthy of the airport staff. It was his day off.

Tri Powers In Harmony

PARIS, July 14 — UP — High diplomatic sources said Wednesday that the British and French diplomats were scheduled to leave Wednesday afternoon for Geneva for the final phase of the pay-off bargaining session. U. S. Ambassador to Czechoslovakia U. Alexis Johnson will represent the United States there until Smith returns. The Big Three diplomats were said to have ironed out their differences over Indo-China at the second of their conferences since Dulles arrived Tuesday. Dulles turned down French and British pleas to return to Geneva for the final attempts to hammer out an Indo-China peace. He prepared to fly back to Washington late Wednesday. But he agreed that Undersecretary of State Walter Bedell Smith would return to Geneva if prospects for an honorable settlement turn out as bright as Mendes-France and Eden reported they were. Dulles arrived here skeptical of Communist intentions, but authoritative sources said the first-hand accounts given by Mendes-France and Eden of the progress so far convinced him that an acceptable peace may be in the making.

Three Sides Of Hanoi In Path Of Reds

HANOI, July 14 — UP — Communist troops tightened their pressure on Hanoi from three sides Wednesday with most of the action centering around the area of the Seven Pagodas 30 miles northeast of the capital. French forces south of Hanoi prepared to defend Hung Yen, last important French city below the Ho Chi Minh-Haiphong corridor. Hung Yen is encircled by 12 rebel battalions. Strong pressure was exerted against Son Tay, 25 miles to the west and many civilians were reported leaving there for Hanoi on their way out of the Red River delta. The attacks in the Seven Pagodas region appeared to be part of a clamp the rebels are trying to close on the north and south sides of the French-held part of the delta. Political and military observers offered converse opinions on Red Gen. Vo Nguyen Giap's strategy on taking Hanoi. The political sources argued that even though the rebels are tightening their hold around the delta, Giap will not make an all-out assault on Hanoi until he sees how cease-fire negotiations work out at Geneva.

AF Band's Rodeo Show Discussed

Paul Crouch, president of the Top of Texas Rodeo Association, and E. O. Wedgworth, secretary, were in Amarillo this morning for a conference with Maj. Gen. A. G. Walker, commander of Amarillo Air Force base in regard to the appearance of the AFB band here during the Rodeo and Kid Pony Show Aug. 3-7. The band's schedule, housing of personnel and other matters were to be discussed during the conference, Crouch said. Meanwhile, rodeo ticket takers and sellers, gate men and fence riders were assigned their posts and duties Tuesday night.

Wholesale Food Prices Edge Up

NEW YORK, July 14 — UP — Wholesale food prices edged up one cent this week from their four-month low, on the Dun & Bradstreet Inc. index released Wednesday. The index of 77.23 on July 13 compared with 77.22 last week, a four-month low, 86.74 in the like 1953 period and was 21.3 per cent above the pre-Korea 55.94.

British Jet Bomber Crashes

CRANFIELD, Eng., July 14 — UP — The world's first crescent-winged jet bomber, the giant four-engined Handley Page Victor, crashed Wednesday, killing its crew of four. The bomber, with a wing shaped like a scythe on each side of its gleaming fuselage, plunged into the airfield here and exploded, officials said. The designers had billed the unusual plane as "the air battleship of the future." It was designed to carry a bigger bomb load higher, faster and farther than any comparable plane. Water Rationing Measures Taken

The Southwest suffered Wednesday in one of its worst heat waves since 1936, a heat wave that has killed at least seven persons and sent temperatures as high as 121 degrees. The 121-degree mark was reported unofficially Monday at Pittsburg, Kans. Tuesday there was an official high of 117.5 at Vinita, Okla. Serious water shortages developed over many areas of the Southwest and city governing bodies rushed to place rationing in effect. In some parts of Fort Worth there was no water at all during the evening hours, when demand is heaviest. The city turned off the water during evening hours to some suburbs which get their water from Fort Worth so as to have more water for Fort Worth residents.

Pampa Water Situation In Critical State

Pampa's water situation remained critical late this morning as the mercury rose toward a new high for the year. City Mgr. Fred Brook, acting the Pampa City Commission's decision Tuesday to ask all residents to ration themselves voluntarily, this morning said city officials had decided to ask Pampans to quit watering their lawns for the next two days. 101 Tuesday
Meanwhile, the temperature continued to rise this morning toward Tuesday's record high reading of 101 degrees, making water all the harder to conserve. By 11 a.m. the mercury had reached 96 at the KPDM weather bureau and was still rising. The high Sunday and Monday were 99. Pampans Tuesday consumed 7,157,000 gallons of water, down from the Monday a history-making high of 8,038,628 gallons. That makes a total of 94,727,750 gallons consumed during June. Brook, City Director of Public Works James Cowan and Water Superintendent E. S. Lowry held a meeting late this morning to determine what could be done about the critical water situation in the way of precautionary measures. Their discussion centered around the same statistics reviewed by the commission Tuesday. Production capacity is 6,500,000 gallons. Average daily consumption in June has been 7,000,000 gallons. Total storage capacity for the city's three overhead tanks and four ground storage tanks is 5,700,000 gallons. Conservation Urged
Watermen however, reported the tanks were below capacity. Lowry said the water situation this morning was what could be expected. (See PAMPA WATER, Page 4)

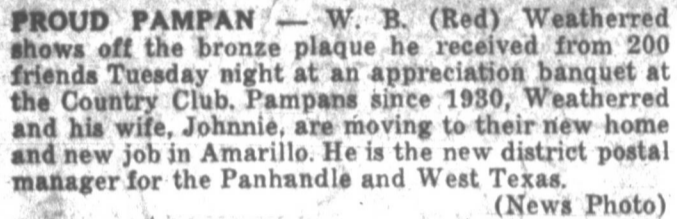

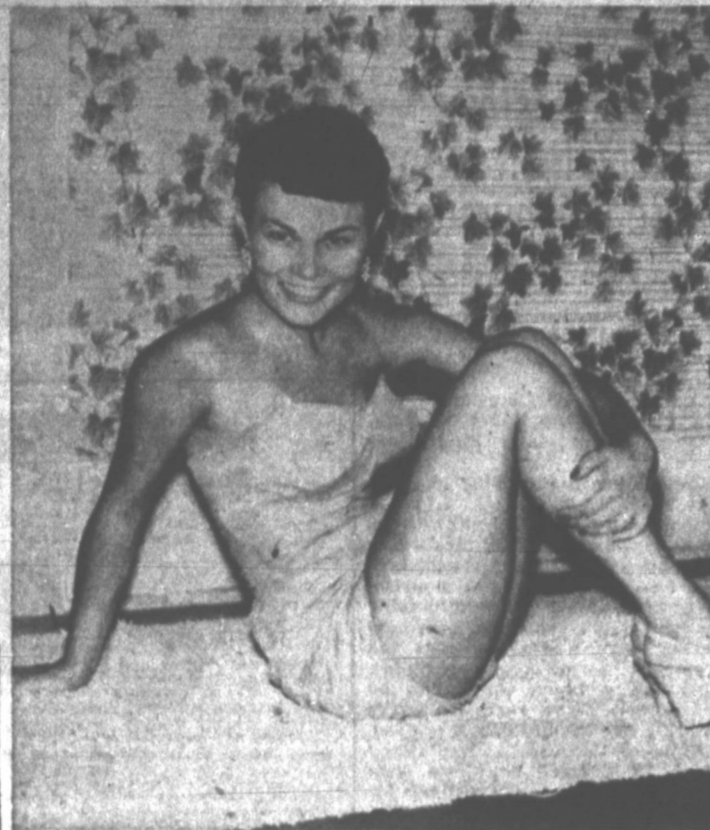

Red China UN Issue Baffles Europeans

EDITOR'S NOTE: President Eisenhower has said the United States is "completely and unalterably opposed" to admitting Red China to the United Nations. The following dispatch tells why U.S. leaders take this stand, and how Europeans feel about it.

By DONALD J. GONZALES
WASHINGTON, July 14—UP—Why is the United States so bitterly opposed to admitting Red China to the United Nations? Many Europeans profess to be baffled by the vehement U.S. stand on this issue. They point out that Russia and several other Communist nations already are UN members. And they argue that the free world should be realistic about the fact that the Red government at Peking actually rules the Chinese mainland — whether we like it or not.

Admitting Red China to the UN, in the European view, would be nothing more than recognizing the facts of international life, and it might pay dividends by opening up a channel for diplomatic negotiation with the biggest country in Asia. In time, dealing with Red China in the UN, the free nations might even succeed in driving a wedge between Russia and its biggest Red satellite.

Expounded Argument
British Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill is reported to have expounded this argument during his recent White House visit.

The U.S. reply was eloquently stated at news conferences last week by President Eisenhower and Secretary of State John Foster Dulles.

Mr. Eisenhower, speaking rapidly and with obvious emotion, ticked off five reasons why he is "completely and unalterably opposed" to giving the Chinese Reds a UN seat:

1. Red China has been declared an aggressor by the UN in the Korean War and — since no peace treaty has ever been signed in that conflict — is actually "at war with the United Nations" today.
2. Chinese forces have supported a "great effort at further enslavement of peoples in Indo-China."
3. Red China continues to hold "certain of our prisoners unjustifiably."
4. At the Geneva Far East conference, first international postwar meeting attended by the Chinese Reds, they "excoriated the United Nations" instead of taking a conciliatory attitude and "demanded repudiation of the UN position."
5. The Peking regime has been "guilty of the employment of the most possible diplomatic department in the international affairs of the world."

Pointing out that the UN was established as "an attempt to marshal the moral strength of the world in order to preserve peace," Mr. Eisenhower asked:

"How can the United States, as a self-respecting nation doing its best and in conformity with moral standards as we understand them, now can we possibly say this country should be admitted to the United Nations?"

Dulles took up the same theme the next day.

Not a Reformatory
He said the UN was not set up to be a reformatory for bad nations, but assumed in its charter that only peace-loving nations would be members. In view of Red, 32 Americans held in Red jails.

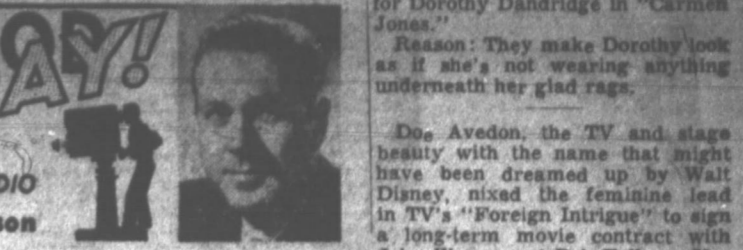
Kerr Given 'Free Ride' Into Election

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 14—UP—The State Election Board ruled Tuesday that Sen. Robert S. Kerr (D-Okla.) got a free ride into November's general election when former Gov. Roy J. Turner dropped out of the July 27 runoff primary.

But David C. Shapard, the third man in the July 6 primary whose request that he replace Turner on the runoff ballot was turned down, said he would ask the State Supreme Court to force the election board to put him on. Shapard got 11,071 votes to Kerr's 228,543.

Turner, like Kerr an oil millionaire, blundered lack of money for his surprise withdrawal Monday night. Oklahoma candidates are limited to \$5,000 in personal campaign spending.

The election board ruled a 1945 attorney general's opinion disqualified Shapard from a place in the runoff. But Shapard said a nominee must receive a majority of votes. Kerr's plurality over Turner was more than 20,000, but he lacked almost 8,000 a majority over his eight opponents.

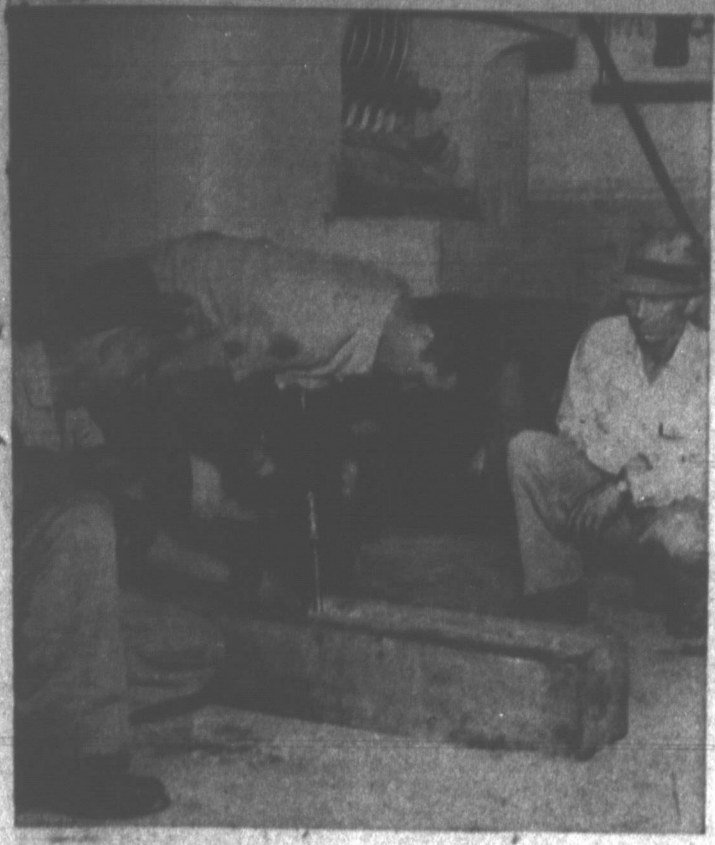

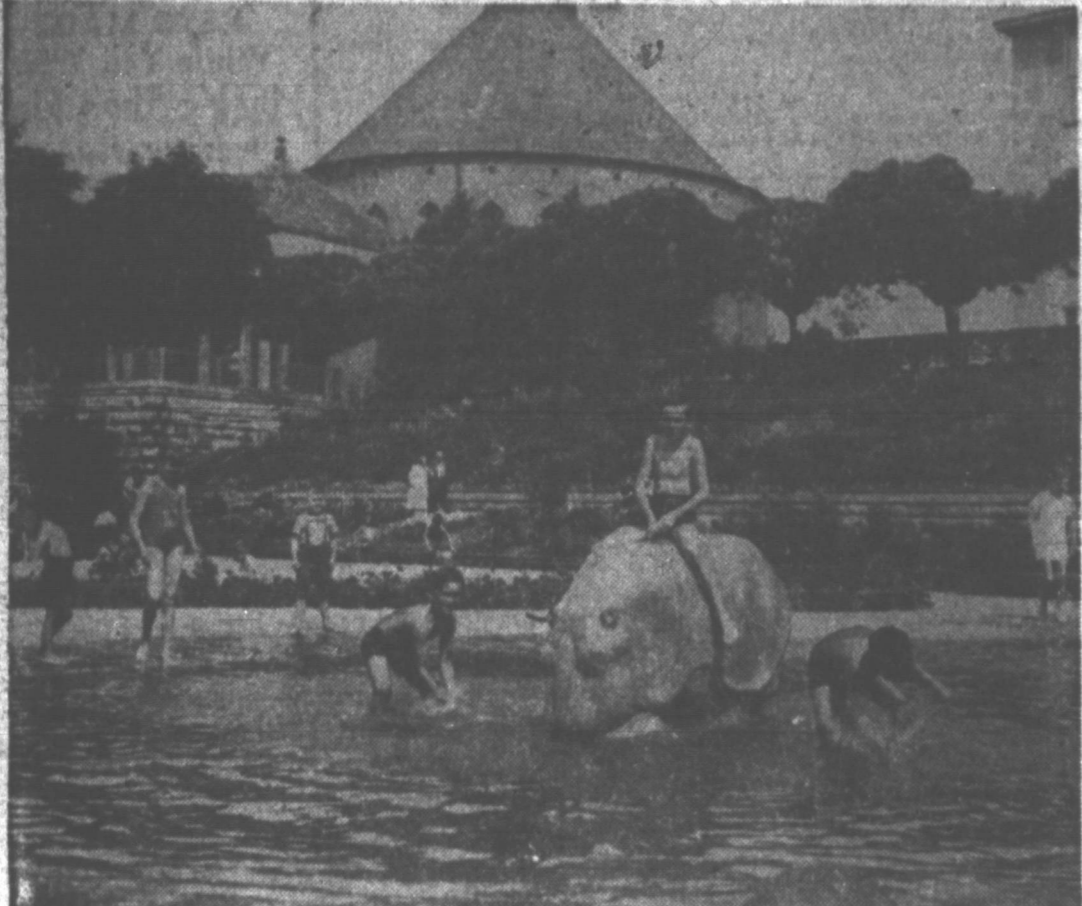

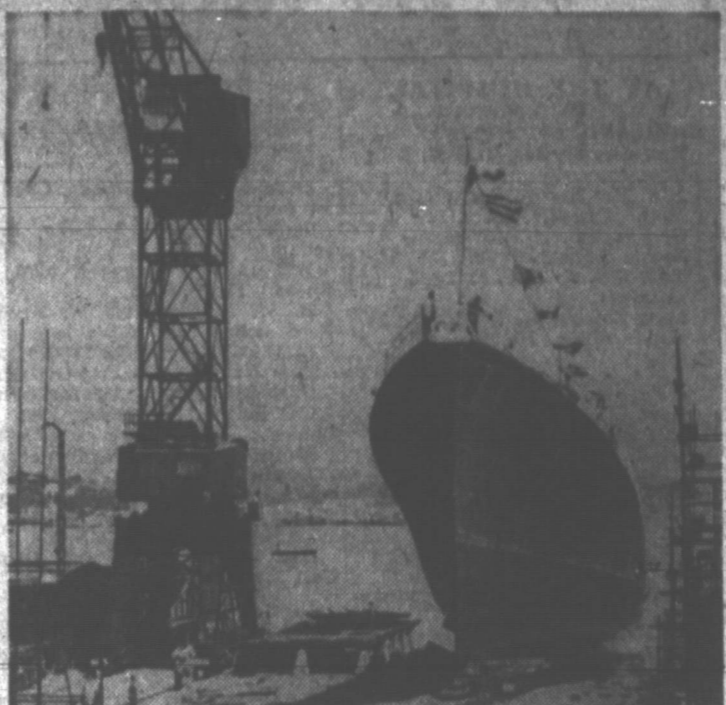

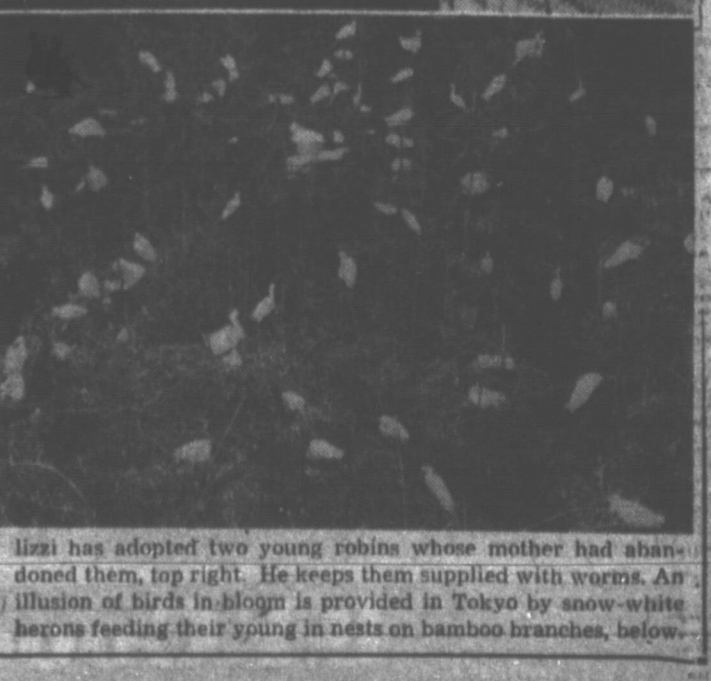

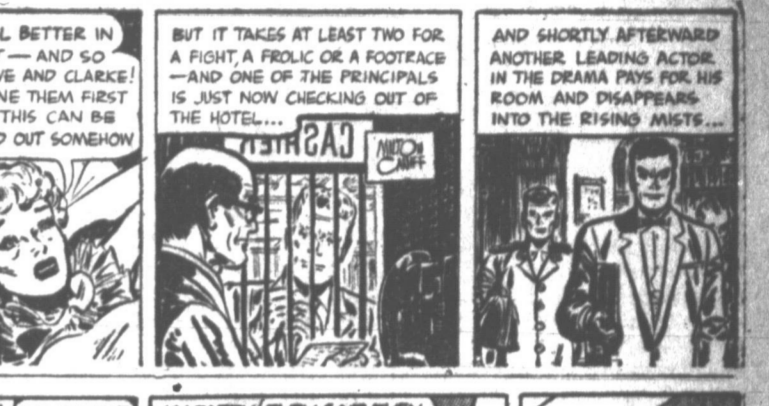

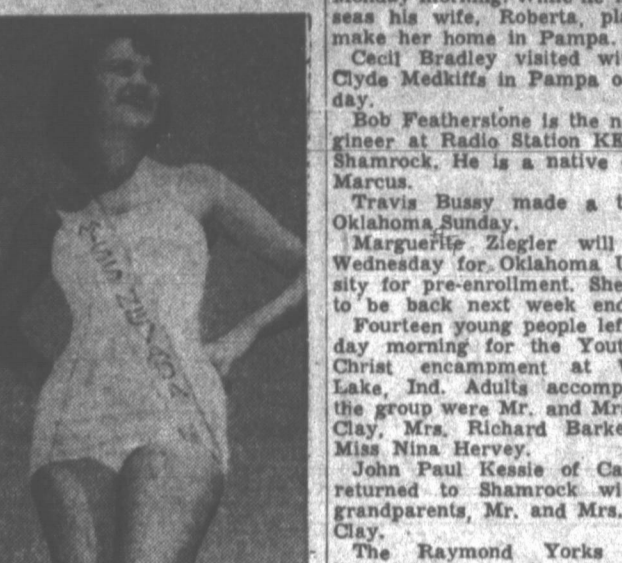
ONE YEAR AGO TODAY

\$256 Million Ideas Talked By Water Men

Seventeen board members considered three proposals totaling \$256,000,000 at the Canadian River Municipal Water meeting at Plainview Monday, said C. A. Huff, one of the two Pampa directors.
The directors representing the 11 cities in the organization will hear feasibility reports concerning each of the proposals at their next meeting Aug. 9. One proposal, with an estimated cost of \$54 million, is that each city in the group have its own water plant. A second proposal, costing \$72 million would cut some of the pumping stations and meter lines of the water system. The third proposal would also cut some of the feeder lines and pumping stations while providing water for all the cities and the industrial organizations around each city. The cost is approximately \$80 million.
Huff and Fred Thompson, Pampa's representatives, returned from Plainview Monday.
"I favor the third proposal from my first glance at it," said Huff. "It will cut a lot of things we won't need for 20 years."
Thompson, a former mayor of Pampa, said he feels the same way. "We didn't seriously consider the first proposal, only the second and third. Of the last two I like the third proposal best."

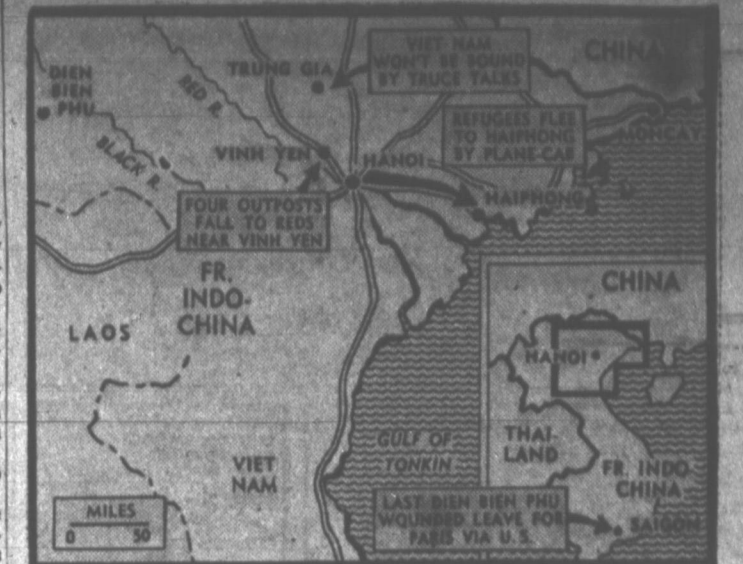
