Astronauts Called To Give Testimony For Fraud Case

AMARILLO, Tex. (AP) - Six American astronauts waited in the wings to testify today as the government pursued its conspiracy-embezzlement case against John Osorio.

Osorio, 50, former state insurance commissioner, is being tried in U.S. District Court on charges growing from the farflung Texas stock fraud scan-

He is accused in a scheme that the government says involved a \$641.250 stock purchase with money questionably collaterized through the retirement fund of National Bankers

Life Insurance Co. Osorio once was president of the company, owned by Houston financier Frank Sharp, the target in a Securities and Exchange Commission investigation that uncovered the scan-

The stock involved here was purchased originally in the names of five Apollo astronauts, all veteran spacemen who subsequently refused to accept the securities.

Among a large number of witnesses sworn in Monday were astronauts James Lovell. Alan Bean, Richard Gordon, Fred Haise. Charles Conrad and

WASHINGTON (AP) - A SUperbudget agency for Congress was proposed today by Rep. Ogden R. Reid, who said it is needed to strip the President of his power to ignore congressional mandates.

As envisioned by the New York Democrat, an "office of budget and expenditure oversight in a reconstituted General Accounting Office, would be an arm of Congress with "broad powers to withhold funds or compel spending by the executive obraneh of government) in accordance with congressional mandates.

responsibilities of Congress. In remarks prepared for a news conference. Reid said the budget office would "restore the constitutional prerogatives of the legislative branch.

Reid accused President Nixon of grabbing authority which the Constitution gave Congress, refusing to carry out programs approved by Congress, evading congressional supervision, and refusing to give the legislators information about administrative actions.

Reid's legislation would take away a president's power to appoint the comptroller generalhead of GAO Instead, GAO would be supervised by officials chosen by Congress.

Meantime, a bipartisan Senate-House committee, selected to devise better congressional control of the budget, decided Monday to study the possibility of an annual spending ceiling set by Congress.

Last year, Congress rejected President Nixon's request for a \$250 billion ceiling and power to make spending cutbacks to stay within the ceiling.

However, Nixon has impounded funds without specific congressional authorization.

Associated Press Writer SAIGON (AP) - A ceasefire will be declared by the United States and South Vietnam on the eve of President Nixon's inauguration Saturday to pave the way toward signing of a peace agreement to end the Indochina war. South Vietnamese sources said

Nixon was said to have advised President Nguyen Van Thieu that an international agreement has been reached to preclude further hostilities by North Vietnam, and to have told Thieu to "trust in me

At the Florida White House. administration spokesmen had no comment on the report. There will be a great number of these reports. We are not going to have comment. We are not going to discuss the subject." Deputy press secretary Neal Ball said.

The unilateral cease-fire would be designed to set the stage for an exchange of prisoners and for the signing by the foreign ministers of the United States, North Vietnam, South Vietnam and the Viet Cong of the peace settlement drafted at Paris, the informants said.

There was no clear understanding of whether Hanoi and the Viet Cong had agreed to the allied cease-fire However, the sources, who have had access to discussions by Thieu and other top-level South Vietnamese leaders of the lat-

Nixon Seeks More Use Of

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Nixon administration is considering encouraging the states to ease their application of some secondary antipollution standards in a move to promote greater use of coal to meet the country's energy needs. Coal has received new atten-

tion from the administration because of delays and lagging production of other energy

The Office of Emergency Preparedness has released a study concluding that "selective and temporary relaxation" of secondary antipollution standards would permit substantial substitution of coal for petroleum.

Elmer Bennett, an assistant director of the OEP, said that while states may be encouraged to slow down application of more stringent secondary standards aimed at preventing environmental harm, he doubts the administration will ask Congress to roll back existing clean-air standards.

He said in an interview Mon day that coal would still be largely unwelcome in areas struggling to meet the national "primary standards" adopted to protect human health.

Evidence Links Cancer With Organ Transplants Veterans Administration

BOSTON (AP) - Medical researchers are compiling increased evidence linking cancer with heart and kidney transplants, a member of the Harvard Medical School staff

Dr. Martin S. Hirsch says transplant recipients show a markedly increased" incidence of cancer. He said 96 cases of malignant tumors have been detected in patients throughout the world who have received organ transplants. Hirsch said available statis-

tics indicate that rare "reticulum cells sarcomas" are the most common form of cancer encountered in transplant patients. These tumors usually are located in the brain and spinal cord. Statistics show that this type

of cancer occurs 4,000 times more frequently among transplant recipients than in a general population of similar age. Hirsch told a meeting of the Harvard Medical Society The worldwide statistics have

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP) - The Texas Senate passed a resolution honoring the late Martin Luther King Jr. on the 44th anniversary of his birth Monday, and a House member said the day should be made a state holiday.

Freshman Sen. Walter Mengden Jr. of Houston shouted his objection to the Senate resolution, but neither he nor any of the other 30 senators asked the secretary of the Senate to record him voting against it.

Mengden, one of three Republicans in the Senate, later released a written statement asking "Did Martin Luther King make any positive contribution for good to society?

"He did favor equal rights for blacks, but how did he go about it? By encouraging both blacks and whites to engage in unlawful acts, such as sit-ins and illegal demonstrations. Martin Luther King helped make popular the concept that if you do not agree with a law you should violate it."

Ms. Thompson, one of eight blacks in the House, said "Dr. King stands above his contemporaries for inculcating in the conscience of Americans the basic principle upon which this nation was founded-the equality of the individual.



The four level transfer response to an opening no-trump bid was invented around 1951 by David Carter of St. Louis and independently by Olle Willner of Stock holm. Willner also extended it to the three level and Richard Troxel of Minneapolis extended it down to the two level. In 1955 Oswald Jacoby took

Troxel's idea, amplified it and developed the Jacoby transfer bids that are now in general expert use in every part of the world.

The basic principle of the Jacoby transfer is that a two-diamond response to a no-trump opening says noth-

guarantees that responder holds at least five hearts. In similar manner the twoheart response guarantees at least five spades.

Today's hand shows the Jacoby transfer at work. North's two-diamond bid tells South to bid hearts. North's rebid to three hearts invites a game contract and South is delighted to accept the invitation.

Four hearts makes easily and would also make if North were declarer, but the transfer bid gave North a chance to invite game. Without the transfer bid Nighth would probably have contented himself with a two heart response and game might not have been reached



He doesn't have to worry about that anymore. All he's got to worry about is living up to the title, "Most Perfect Coach."

"This is a totally unfamiliar experience," he said jokingly as he began his press conference Tuesday, the taste of the 14-7 victory over the Redskins

Then suddenly, he turned serious, almost bitter, as he thought of Carroll Rosenblum, the former owner of the Baltimore Colts who now owns the Los Angeles Rams.



Public TV Hassle Is A Hot One

Despite thinly veiled and not so thinly veiled threats from White House spokesmen, the immediate danger of the government laying a chilling hand on the content of programs beamed over the nation's airwaves is not in the commercial sector but in the area of so-called public broadcasting.

There are two entities involved here. One is the Public Boadcasting Service-P.B.S .- a network of some 225 public and educational television stations.

The other is the Corporation for Public Broadcasting-C.P.B.-whose members are appointed by the President under the Public Broadcasting Act of 1967 and which provides most of the funding for P.B.S.

The two are currently pitted against each other in a controversy over programming authority. Up to now. P.B.S. has been more or less independent

However, Henry W. Loomis, recently appointed head of C.P.B., has announced a policy of more direct involvement by the corporation in programming decisions. He has declared that programs of a 'cotroversial' nature in news and public affairs are no longer

Programs which have been dropped, or which may be dropped, from the pulic broadcasting schedule include Washington Week" and columnist William F. Buckley's Firing Line.

Loomis believes that public television should refrain from controversial programming and devote more of its energies to educational shows and programs directed at the needs and interests of small, localized, and specialized audiences.

Building strong and independent local public TV stations is a commendable goal, agrees the outgoing chairman of P.B.S., James L. Loper, who is president and general manager of KCET in Los Angeles, one of the top half-dozen public TV stations.

But the way the Corporation for Public Broadcasting is going about it, he says, threatens to wipe out the very support local stations need to provide balanced programming.

"I am a strong believer tha in addition to local programming you must have strong national, high-quality programs," says Loper. "If you want to destroy public television, then all you need to do is take away national public

broadcasting programs. He attributes a 200 per cent growth in KCET's audience in the past two years primarily to the fact that many people were attracted by the high-caliber material available from Public

Broadcasting Service series on Henry VIII. pulls up everything else, says Loper-raises new programs, new subscribers and has a mushrooming effect of a constructive nature that influences commercial television as well.

In one way, the problem faced by public broadcasting stations is similar to that faced by commercial outlets: Except for those in a few large cities, local stations simply do not have the facilities or the talent-or the money-to originate the bulk of

their programing In addition, because of the controversy between P.B.S. and C.P.B. and the uncertainties surrounding the future of network programming. back away from underwriting public television programs.

One need not harbor dire throughts about government censorship and Big Brotherism to wonder whether the administration's goal of "freeing" local stations from their close association with the networks, whether public or commercial, may not actually result in degrading the quality of television enjoyed by Americans (low enough as it is, some critics would say) rather than improving it.

Caffeine Is a

By Lawrence Lamb, M.D. Dear Dr. Lamb-I am writng to you about coffee and its effect on the blood pressure. You wrote in your column that it was not good for the digestion, but I would like to know what it does to

Dear Reader-The principal effect of coffee on the irculatory system is from ts caffeine content. Caffeine belongs to the group of brain stimulating drugs called analeptics, which includes the amphetamine group known as "speed" or "uppers." The effects of caffeine on the heart and circulatory system are highly variable. It will that the blood pressure would drop. In contrast, it causes the arteries to the brain to contract and diminishes blood flow to the brain. This latter effect is often useful in relieving headaches, since by overdistention or dilation

Caffeine also stimulates the heart rate to increase, and in general, causes an increased amount of blood to be pumped by the heart. Blood pressure is a balance between the capacity of the arterial system and the mount of blood pumped into it. Blood pressure falls when the heart stops pumping enough blood or when the arteries are over dilated. In the case of caffeine, the increased amount of blood pumped by the heart is balanced off by the dilation of the arteries. Thus, you never know for certain whether a person will have an increased

There are some individuals who definitely have an increased blood pressure from the effects of caffeine. This is particularly true in individuals in whom the blood pressure is affected by their nervous activity. In general, the effects of caffeine on the heart and vascular system are outweighed by its actions on the nervous system. The response of the heart and vascular system is in rela tion to what happens in the nervous system.

Caffeine has the opposite effect of tranquilizers, to the extent that tranquilizers are useful in lowering blood pressure by decreasing nervous tension and nervous activity For this reason, in general, feel that individuals who have elevated blood pressure should not be using caffeine or any of the amphetamine group; and consequently they should not be drinking coffee. For the person with normal blood pressure, this consideration is of little or no importance.

WASHINGTON - There may be "many a slip 'twixt cup and lip" on that juicy congressional pay hike being quietly plotted. Two "slips" already have

developed - thanks to Rep. H.R. Gross, R.-lowa. The veteran economy advocate has introduced legislation designed to prevent a pay boost being sneaked through - as was pulled off in 1969 when a \$12,500 increase was engineered without a

record roll call. If there is to be another big salary grab, it is Gross' determined intention to force his fellow legislators to vote on it out in the open.

Whether he succeeds remains to be seen. So far, the prospects aren't too promising.

Gross's legislation has been completely ignored by the media. There hasn't been a line about it. And the only encouragement has come from one colleague — Rep. Vernon Thomson, R.-Wis., who has declared against raising conressional pay on the ground it would rekingle the fires of inflation

But if there is a hike, it's got to be done open and aboveboard. Says Thomson

Public accountability demands public knowledge. On a decision involving such obvious self-interest, members of Congress should be willing to declare their position and defendit.

In addition to all this, each legislator has a large allowance - for House members, around \$250,000 a year, for Senators, up to as much as \$1 million, depending on state populations

It is possible to have a medical deduction on your income tax return even though you may not have been sick, bought any pre-scriptions, or paid any doctor or dentist fees in 1972. part of the building

If you paid for hospital or health care insurance last year, one-half of your cost (but not more than \$150) is immediately deductible.

Include in your cost of health insurance the cost of the medical insurance portion of your automobile insurance. If you are on Social Security also include your Medicare premiums (for your wife, too, if this is a joint return).

Your remaining medical expenses must be greater than three per cent of adjusted gross income before there is a deduction. Prescriptions are included in your tabulation to the ex-tent their cost is greater than one per cent of adjusted gross income.

Should your medical exenses be sufficiently large to permit a deduction, don't forget to include the remaining portion of your hospital and health insurance which was not immediately deduc-

Don't ignore these frequently overlooked possibi-

Ordinarily, medical expenses are considered only if they are for the taxpayer, his wife and his dependents. A notable exception is a transplant recipient who pays his donor's expenses in relation to the transplant. It is deductible.

If you pay a private duty nurse for services in the home and you furnish her meals and pay her Social Security taxes, include those items with the fee. Include also the proportionate share of a housekeeper's salary if her duties also include nursing care.

The cost of oral contraceptives if prescribed by a physician as necessary to health should be included in the medicine and drug expense. So, too, is the cost of whisky prescribed by a physician for a heart patient and the special food and beverages prescribed as an addition to normal diet.

Among the special aids and supplies that can be listed as medical expenses are: oxygen and oxygen equipment for heart and

asthma patients; iron lung levels of pollutants

It is generally recognized that contributions to churches, hospitals, educational institutions and other recognized charities are fully deductible.

Often forgotten is the fact that in addition to cash con-tributions, the fair market value of furniture, clothing and appliances contributed to a charitable organization are also deductible.

to review a lower court order forbidding pollution of clean air. The high court in a brief order without dissent agreed to hear the government's appeal of a decision by the U.S. Circuit Court here requiring federal enforcement of a policy of

'nondegradation' of clean air. The Environmental Protection Agency was poised in November to reluctantly issue regulations to comply with the decision when the high court blocked its effect pending ap-

Buffies Plod Their Way Into American Homes

AP Special Correspondent SAIGON (AP) - War or peace, build-up or draw-down, herds of buffles inexorably plod their ponderous way to the hearts and attics of America. Several thousand buffies a

day migrated when U.S. troops in Vietnam numbered more than half a million. Now, with troop strength around 24,000, more than 1,000 a week still make the journey.

A buffy, rhymes with stuffy; is an enormous, ornate glazed ceramic elephant. Depending on one's esthetic sensitivity, it represents either the highest camp or the lowest kitsch in Vietnamese folk art.

acronym b-u-f-e, for bloody overseas will accept. useless foul-word elephant, and supposedly was conferred on

these outsized objets d'art by Rear Adm. S. R. Smith, then the officer in charge of construction in Vietnam. Smith couldn't believe the number of U.S.-bound buffles

being loaded on cargo planes at air mail depots at a time when jeeps and bulldozers were being sold as surplus scrap metal for want of shipping space back to bases in America.

Buffies, all with garishly painted toenails and elaborately tasseled saddles and harnesses. come as tall as 21/2 feet and can weigh up to 70 pounds, which is

Until ultimately relegated to the attic or garage, they stand at ridiculous attention on the porches of West Point, alongside the backyard swimming pools of suburbia, on the terraces of high-rise urbanapartments or wherever men feel the need to proclaim a past communion with the culture of

The Vietnamese use buffles to decorate the graves of their ancestors, or for interior deco-

ration to hold plants or an incense urn. The Americans find the big ones just the right height to place a martini at elbow's distance beside a favorite arm chair. Two bearing a plexiglass tray make a particularly repulsive coffee table. Three, placed trunk to tail in circus configuration, can effect a mind-blowing arrangement of hi-fi gear and stereo speakers.
