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



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Repair Bill

Sparked unconstitutionally by Ex-President H. S. Truman, big U. S. armed forces and some United Nations taken units went to war in Korea in June, 1950.

The resulting devastation of the peninsula was frightful. The worst tragedies, as usually happens in war, befell women and children.

A firm of economists, at UN request, has now turned in a detailed estimate of what it will cost to revamp South Korea over a five-year period.

The bill comes to \$1,900,000,000 all told. Of this amount, "international sources," as the report describes them, would furnish \$1,250,000,000. President Syngman Rhee's Republic of Korea government would be asked to get up the other \$650,000,000.

Among the results the money should buy would be big increases in farm and mine production, a considerable boost in manufacturing, and about 300,000 of the 1,000,000 new homes the South Koreans need.

We feel that this is one obligation which the United States should by all means do its full share in discharging. But what is that full share?

The Korean war was touted as a United Nations enterprise. To other UN activities, we contribute directly about 37 per cent of their total upkeep. That, we feel, should be the measure of U. S. contribution to the repair of Korea.

Of course, our forces carried 95 per cent of the UN war effort. We rather expect some UN members will have the colossal gall to say that therefore the United States should pay 95 per cent of the UN repair bill. If Uncle Sam falls for that, he'll rock up a new high

Wise To Money!

The Army is taking the initiative in one of the unhappiest conditions that exist in an armed society — the extravagance tacked onto the fundamentally wasteful function of waging war, hot or cold.

The Army has announced it is sending some of its officers to Syracuse University to find out how to spend money wisely. We are not sure Syracuse or any other university is the place to learn economic wisdom but at any rate it is heartening to observe that the Army is willing to look at the problem, and perhaps even do omething about it. Maybe the Air Force and Navy will follow suit.

The military establishment has been notorious for wastefulness, even recognizing the fact that in creating a machine for bullets, weapons and manpower for security purposes calculation on the penurious side is not always sound business. Too often the safety margin factor has been used as an excuse for waste. A little science and efficiency won't hurt the armed forces.

THE NATION'S PRESS

The federal reserve board issued an order Monday afternoon raising the lending power of the banks of the country by 9 billion dollars. This was a long step in the direction of cheap money. As the banks seek to find employment for the extra funds, interest rates, already extremely low. must decline further. The extent to which borrowed

money had already been cheapened in the last year is indicated by the rates on government borrowing. On April 16, 1953, the treasury sold an issue of 30 years 3% per cent bonds at 100. They are now selling shove 110 and yield only 2.67 per cent. At this time in 1953 the treasury was paying 2% per cent on its 91 days horrowing. Now it is getting its

Money was already exceedingly cheap before the recent moves were made. The Keynes' doctrine, as restated earlier this month in the London Financial Times by his most authentic disciple, R. F. Kahn of the University of Cambridge, is that if money had been cheapened without bringing about the desired results, it only means "that the money restruction has been

insufficiently relaxed." Why the administration is pursuing its present course is readily understandable. Only a little more than four months remain before the November election.

Within a few weeks the unemployment report for June will be out, and there is every likelihood that it will show that the number of jobless is at a new high mark since the Truman recession of 1949-50. The unemployment increase will be seasonal. A jump in the unemployment figures always occurs in June, when schools are out and newcomers seek jobs which cannot be immediately

If this were not an election year, the administration might have been willing to ride out the temporary rise in unemployment statistics. But the President has told the country that he has an arsenal of weapons. He feels it necessary to use the most dangerous -inflation. A great expansion in loans such as the government hopes to bring about would lead to an expansion in the money supply and a rise in prices. The way of Keynes is the Democratic way, which under Roosevelt and Truman, cut the value of our money in two. It is not the Republican

"Myth Of The Post Office"



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

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


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
