Air Service To Dallas Set

Regularly-scheduled roundtrip air passenger service between Pampa and Dallas will begin later this month, it was learned today from Wesley Lewis, former manager of Perry LeFors Field.

Lewis is the Civil Aeronautics Administration for a non-scheduled permit to Dallas and return, permitting regular daily air service, will be approved shortly after his meeting with CAA officials in Pampa this afternoon, he said.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 —UP —Sen. Wayne L. Morse (Ind.-Ore.), told the Senate Monday that President Truman gave him a top secret document during the 1952 political campaign to reply to a speech by Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Morse made the disclosure in reply to Senate Republican leader William F. Knowland, who revealed he had made inquiries about Morse's use of the document in a speech at Minneapolis Oct. 27, 1952.

Knowland responded to Morse's disclosure by asserting he was "deeply shocked." He called Mr. Truman's action "one of the most flagrant abuses of executive power that I have ever heard of."

UN Denies Red Areas Invaded

PANMUNJOM, Korea, Aug. 2 —UP —The UN denied Monday Chinese Communist charges that two Allied soldiers invaded Communist territory and touched off a gun battle in which they were shot and killed.

The Communists refused to identify the nationality of the two men they allege started the incident and refused to allow the United Nations to view or recover the bodies.

American Lt. Col. John A. Brock told newsmen Allied troops investigators "failed to find any evidence to support the charges."

UN officials said the only evidence the Reds introduced were two foreign-made tommy guns, two magazines of ammunition, a Japanese wrist watch and fountain pen with Chinese characters on it.

The UN denial was given Monday during a meeting lasting nearly two hours at Panmunjom.

The Communists have claimed the two soldiers were killed by Communist military police Thursday night in an exchange of gunfire in the western front demilitarized zone. A Communist MP was wounded, the Reds said.

The American strike meanwhile went into its third day with no signs of settlement in sight. The walkout of 1,200 pilots has completely idled the coast-to-coast system.

The United and TWA strike votes, revealed Sunday night, set no date for a walkout. Clarence Sayen, president of the AFL Air Line Pilots Association, said there were no immediate indications that pilots for the two systems would join the American strikers.

Dean Phillips, chairman of the ALPA's Chicago TWA local, said he understood UAL and TWA pilots would join the walkout if a settlement of the American strike is not reached soon.

Airline Tieup May Spread

CHICAGO, Aug. 2 —UP —Pilots for United Air Lines and Trans World Airlines voted in favor of strike action, raising the possibility that a nationwide American Airlines walkout may spread.

Military Garrison Revolts

Guatemala Says Situation Now 'Under Control'

GUATEMALA CITY, Aug. 2 —UP —The anti-Communist government of provisional President Col. Carlos Castillo Armas announced Monday that the local military garrison has revolted.

A government broadcast said fighting was underway, but that the situation was "under control."

Sounds of the battle at the military base in the capital's suburbs could be heard in the center of the city.

Government sources said the revolt began in the army headquarters at 8 a. m. and was joined by cadets in the military academy and by a number of pro-Communists who had sought political asylum in the Mexican embassy.

Government planes were ordered up to join in the fight against the rebels.

The official radio said the "liberation army" formed by Castillo Armas to attack and overthrow the pro-Communist regime of former President Jacobo Arben Guzman "has the situation under control."

Kansas GOP Vote Today On Governor

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 2 —UP —A rousing Republican battle for the governorship nomination and GOP party leadership came to a close Monday in President Eisenhower's home state of Kansas.

Kansas votes in the party primaries Tuesday to name nominees for governor and all state offices.

Knowland Favors Break With Soviet

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 —UP —Senate Republican leader William F. Knowland favors a diplomatic break with Russia or any of its satellites if there is another cold war incident involving Americans and the United States does not get "prompt" satisfaction.

Knowland expressed the view Sunday as Walter Bedell Smith, undersecretary of state, forecast more shooting incidents between U. S. forces and the "belligerent" Chinese Reds.

Smith said, however, "we certainly are not going to be intimidated" and emphasized that this country will take "whatever action seems to us to be necessary in safeguarding our interests."

Knowland conceded that a diplomatic break might wipe out whatever contact the United States has behind the Iron Curtain.

But he said this must be weighed against the continuation of spy centers in Communist embassies throughout the free world. A break in relations, he said, might also give more hope of freedom to enslaved peoples.

In any case, the problem merits "more consideration" than it has given by past administrations, he said.

5 Arrested In Colorado, California

DENVER, Aug. 2 —UP —FBI agents captured five alleged Communist leaders in two states Sunday night. Three of them were described as underground leaders.

The FBI raids nabbed four persons on a quiet midtown street in Denver Sunday night, apparently as they were attempting to rendezvous. The fifth person, a woman, was captured at Los Angeles, Calif.

Flanders' Charges Said Insignificant

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 —UP —Sen. John L. McClellan Monday suggested creation of a special committee to study and report on specific charges against Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy in the fight to censure the Wisconsin Republican.

McClellan (D-Ark.) ranking Democrat on McCarthy's investigating subcommittee, indicated opposition to a resolution by Sen. Ralph E. Flanders (R-Vt.) to reprimand McCarthy. He said a "select" committee should study charges lying behind Flanders' resolution and report its findings to the Senate, possibly before the session ends.

SMOKE TAX BURNS DEALERS THEY WON'T SELL CIGARETS

NORTHLAKE, Ill., Aug. 2 —UP —Smokers in this Chicago suburb had to go at least a mile Monday if they wanted to buy a cigaret.

Dealers refused to sell cigarets for two weeks in protest against a new cent-a-pack tax levied by the city council.

Farm Income Takes Tumble

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 —UP —Housewives have got almost no break in retail food prices despite sharp declines in farm income, the House Agriculture committee staff reported Monday.

Warning farmers to expect "further declines" particularly in livestock, the staff said consumers could expect "little benefit" from these price reductions either unless middle men stop boosting their processing and distributing charges.

The statements were made in a report reviewing "the extent to which recent farm price declines have and have not been passed on to consumers."

Earlier, the Agriculture Department predicted that retail food prices would decline "a little more than usual" during the rest of 1954. It said in a national food situation report that heavy farm marketings are expected to push food supplies above last year's level.
