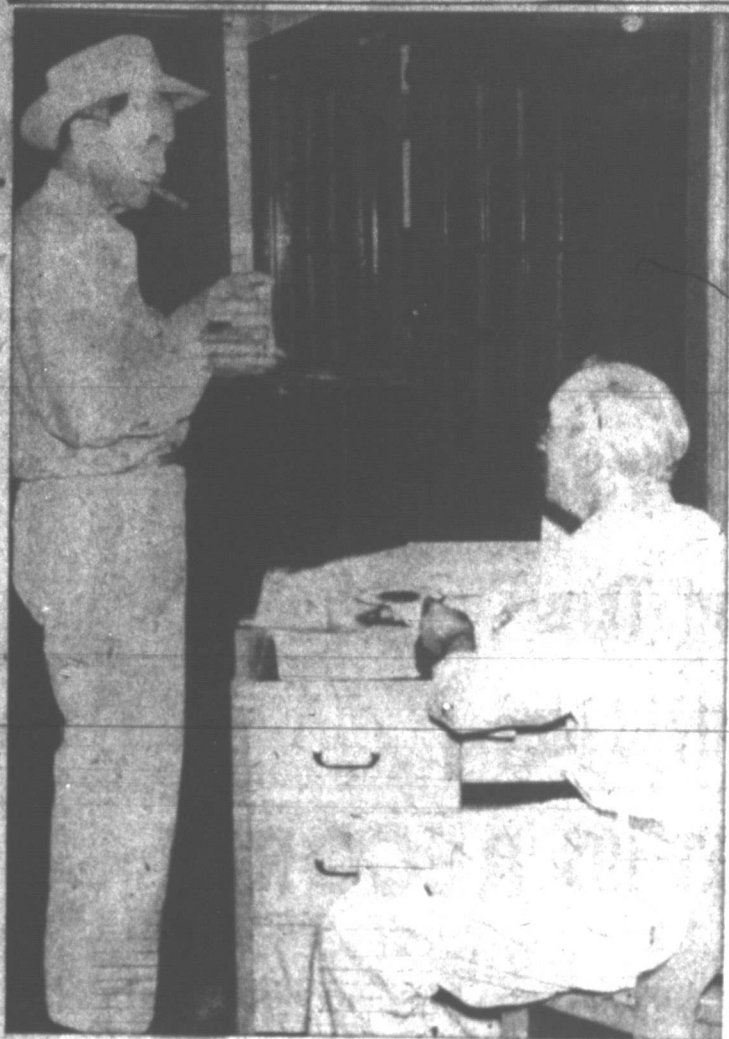

Employees of the enterprises that made up Moody's \$400 million empire were given the day off. Moody, 58, died Wednesday of pneumonia. He was stricken Monday night after working a full day at W. L. Moody & Co., the investment banking firm which was the pinnacle of a domain based on cotton, insurance, newspapers, hotels, ranches and oil. Funeral services will be held at 4 p.m. Saturday. Preparations indicated it would be one of the largest funeral services ever held in Texas, with hundreds of financial leaders attending from both within and without the state.

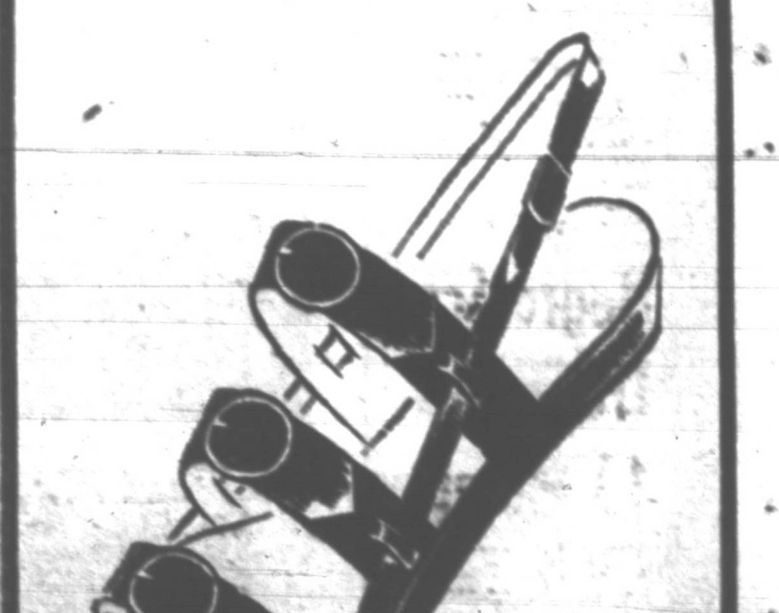

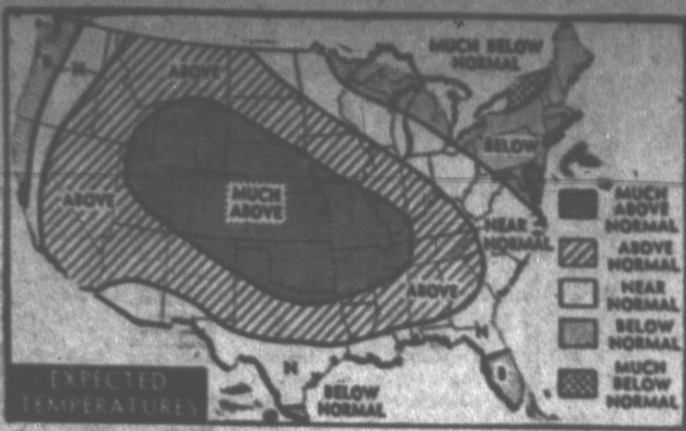

The Record Shop: Jaye P. Morgan, the pretty blonde who made that great record of "Life Is Just a Bowl of Cherries," will switch from Derby Records to RCA in August. Life may be cherries, but a contract is a plum.

Becoming a record star takes more than voice. Eileen Todd, new with Coral Records, is pouring some \$15,000 into her career in an attempt to make it all the way with her first effort, "Paradise." Four thousand went for a new wardrobe for personal appearances with the record, the rest for musicians, writers, and publicity. She'll also make in-person visits to leading disc jockeys.

That's what's called Hi-Fi-nance.

Leave us consider bands, the off-neglected phase of today's popular music business. And while the Combs and Pages and Fishers and Kites get the headlines, the bands are slowly footing their way back into public favor. This comes from the top leader, Ray Anthony.

Ray is standing all by himself in Capitol's big recording studio, dubbing his trumpet notes on top of numbers his band recorded earlier. He likes to work that way, so he doesn't have to worry about giving downbeats and other conducting chores. He can blow his brains out, carefree.

Brevets takes, he talked about bands. He's optimistic. Television has helped. Ray painted to three bands that have TV shows now — the Dorsey Brothers, Sauter-Finigan, and his own group, which is pin-biting for Perry Como.

"Last summer," he said, "that wouldn't have happened. But look at all the band records that have been hit this year — like my 'Dragnet' and big records by Ralph Flanagan and Buddy Morrow, and other TV-discovered bands."

Good production, such as Leo Cooley gives Anthony, makes a

band an exciting thing to watch on television. Cooley's been doing some unusual things, like extreme close-ups on fingers of the musicians and surrealistic shots, and the results are good television.

Measured against the band heyday (the late '30s, early '40s) to day's bands are every bit as good, except in one department. Band vocalists aren't up to the caliber of the singers 15 years ago at least they don't have the fame and following. Anthony has a theory about that.

"A young singer today," he says "can get one TV spot a week and make out. Or a record contract. Why should he go on the road with a band? He'll take the short cut, naturally. I wouldn't advise my own brother to sing with a band."

You never can tell where you'll find a commercial plug nowadays. The austere Boston Pops Orchestra, on RCA, has a new record called "Look Sharp — Be Sharp." It's a semi-symphonic arrangement of the theme music that a razor blade company uses on its sports broadcasts.

Dick's Picks: The summer doldrums are here in full doldrum. Best of the week is "This Old House" by Stuart Hamblen (RCA). Also good: "Riot In Cell Block Number Nine" (Vici Young, Capitol); "Out of the Bushes" (Ralph Flanagan, RCA); "L'Amour, Toujours L'Amour" (Roger Coleman, Decca); "When You're Near" (Barbara Gale and The Laras, Decca); "Nowhere" (Jan Arden, RCA).

Maurice Chevalier, anyone? If you go for monstrosity is straw-hat, Columbia has a fine new collection on a 12-disc LP. There are some good new instrumental albums: "Meet The Commanders," a fine new band on Decca; "Until The Real Thing Comes Along" is the Larry Elgart band, also Decca; The Starostsky play "Serenata," some of Leroy Anderson's cheery compositions on MGM.

Bruckner's Symphony No. 4 (Romantic) is beautifully played by the Hague Philharmonic under Willem van Otterloo, and, with baritone Herman Schay, they also do Mahler's Kindertotenlieder in a two-record Epic set.

He Can't Get Rid Of 'The Thing'

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 22 —UP—Walter Thayer is carrying a \$10,000 treasure around in his suitcase and can't get rid of it.

He found it along a beach in Texas where it had been washed ashore from the Gulf of Mexico. He has been carrying it around with him for more than a year, and is convinced of its high value.

But there is one hitch: He can't find anyone who wants to buy it.

50 pounds of ambergris.

All this came to light when Thayer showed up the other day to visit his family here and announced that the suitcase under his arm contained not only his clothes but 50 pounds of ambergris.

Ambergris is a substance formed inside a sperm whale, making it rather hard to come by. Its traditional value has been as a base for perfume. Whale fishermen over the past century have risked their lives for as much ambergris as Thayer has in his suitcase.

But Thayer, who figures he is one of the lucky few in the world who have ever found ambergris lying on a beach, has also become a victim of supply and demand. The going rate for ambergris is about \$900 a pound, but it is so difficult to obtain most perfume manufacturers have found a substitute for it.

Serve Same Purpose

"Nowadays they use musk from the musk deer, to serve the same purpose," Thayer says.

He scoffed at a suggestion he forget about the ambergris and go out hunting for a musk deer.

"I'm not worried about selling it," he says. "I'll just hang onto it because I know what it is and sooner or later I'll sell it for what it's worth."

Thayer by trade is an upholsterer at Corpus Christi, and he stumbled on his yet-to-be-unlocked goldmine one day while he was driving along the beach of Padre Island on the Gulf of Mexico.

May Bring \$15,000

A companion in his car mentioned seeing a "funny looking rock" in the surf. Thayer took one look at the lump and waded out to retrieve it. From his chemistry class at St. Mary's University at San Antonio, he remembered what ambergris looked like.

"I didn't get excited. It just came out of the sea and I was the one who was there, that's all," he says.

He's been carrying the ambergris around with him ever since, and figures it might bring as high as \$15,000 if he can command a top price. He expects to get an offer any day now from a dealer who is studying a sample.

WASHINGTON, July 22 —UP—Senate House conference committee has recommended approval of a 900-page tax reform bill calling for \$1,383,000,000 in tax relief for individuals and corporations.

Most of the individual tax relief would go to taxpayers with income from dividends, to taxpayers with high medical expenses, to elderly persons living on retirement incomes, and to working widows, widowers, divorced persons or low-income couples who hire a baby-sitter or nursemaid to care for children while they work.

Corporations would benefit through more liberal depreciation allowances and through numerous changes in the laws on the methods required for computing and filing tax returns. On the other side of the ledger, corporations would have to continue to pay for another year a maximum income tax rate of 32 per cent, compared with the 47 per cent rate which became effective April 1.

The compromise bill, which failed to win the unanimous support of the entire conference committee, will be considered by the House early next week and probably by the Senate late next week.

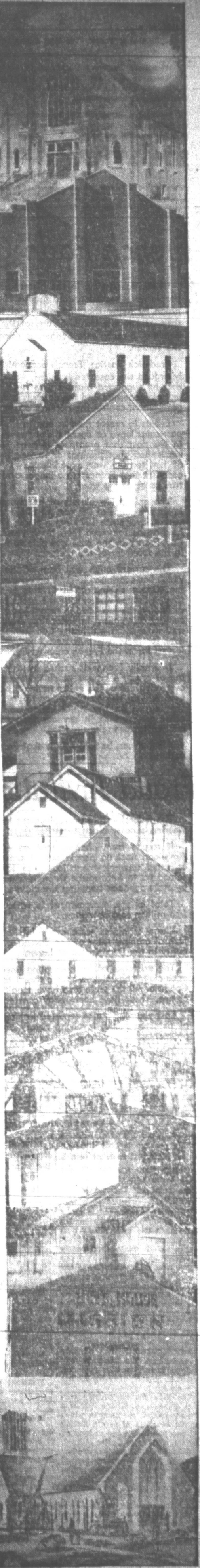

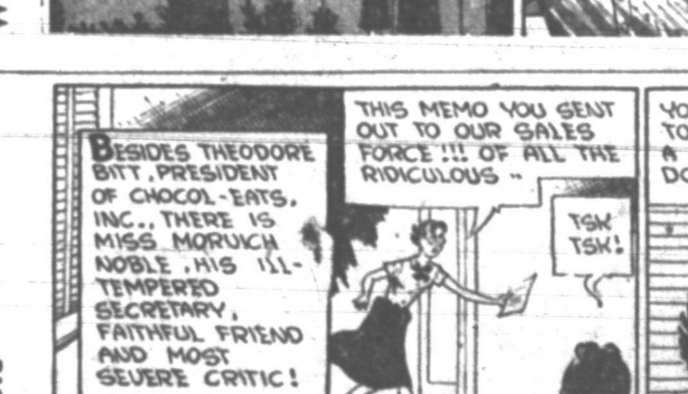
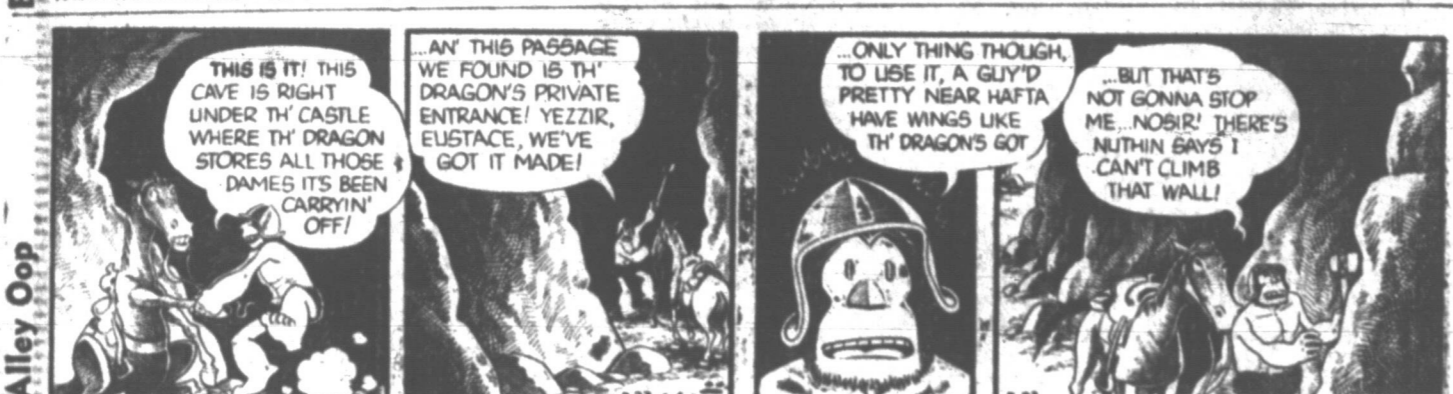

The Good And Bad

The week's good and bad news on the international balance sheet:

THE GOOD

1. For the first time in 20 years there is no "hot" war. The Indo-China armistice agreement, admittedly, was a defeat for the free world. But France's position had become untenable. And it appeared plain that the United States would permit no further Communist conquest to go unchallenged. President Eisenhower warned: "Any renewal of Communist aggression would be viewed by us as a matter of grave concern." The Indo-China setback drew the Western allies closer together. Washington dispatches said the United States and Great Britain, burying their differences, had determined to start organizing Southeast Asia defense.

2. It was announced in Geneva that the Chinese Communists had promised to free six of the Americans they hold. The Reds said they were "reviewing" the cases of about 60 other Americans held. It was hoped most or all of them would be freed soon.

3. The situation in Southwest Asia continued to develop favorably to the West. Iran sharply rejected a Russian warning against joining "the aggressive military bloc which is being created... on the basis of the Turkish-Pakistani military alliance." Iran said it would be ready to join any such pact which might safeguard its independence and territorial integrity. An agreement to end the long British-Iranian oil dispute, which stood in the way of Iranian cooperation with the West, seemed imminent.

THE BAD

1. Though the Indo-China agreement was a recognition of the facts of life, there was no pretense that it was anything but a defeat for the United States as well as France. The prestige of the United States suffered a severe blow especially among the Southeast Asian "neutralist" nations. The prestige of Communist China was correspondingly increased. It will be more difficult to gain the support of India, Ceylon, Burma and Indonesia for a Southeast Asia security pact.

2. Russia, with its hands freed in the Far East, turned promptly to Western Europe. Dispatches from Moscow showed clearly that the Kremlin's next step will be to try again to sabotage allied military cooperation and especially to block the European Defense Community pact. Russia may propose a new four-power foreign ministers conference on Germany. Such a bid might appeal to Great Britain and France. It would not be welcomed by the United States.

3. The situation in Tunisia and Morocco confronted French Premier Pierre Mendes-France with a new crisis. The campaign of Nationalist terrorism continued unchecked. There is always the danger that the Communists may move in on this situation. It is reported that Mendes-France may offer a sweeping series of reforms. The question is whether they will be sweeping enough for the Nationalists.

Fugitive Arrested

EL PASO, July 23 —UP— A fugitive from California, suspected of murder, auto theft and robbery was arrested Thursday night at an El Paso hospital.

He is Paul Hudson, wanted in Kings county, California, in connection with the murder last July 6 of Bill Tuttle, a 60-year-old farmer. Sheriff Jimmy Hicks, who arrested Hudson, said he denied the murder but admitted he was with Tuttle the night he was killed.

Hudson was being treated for an infected foot. He said he was hurt when he wrecked Tuttle's truck.

The Californian, who formerly lived in Idabel, Okla., said he was drinking beer with Tuttle the night of the killing and went home with him. When Tuttle went to sleep, Hudson took his light truck.

After the wreck, Hudson hitchhiked to Fresno, Calif., caught a bus to Tucson, Ariz., then hitchhiked on to El Paso, where he arrived July 15. He went to City-County Hospital two days later.
