LONDON, July 30—UP—Authoritative sources said Friday an end to the four-year-old Anglo-Iranian oil dispute now was in sight. These sources said "the next few days" should show whether the final agreement could be reached in Tehran.

WASHINGTON, July 30—UP—Angry members of Congress Friday denounced wholesale coffee buyers and speculators for the sharp price hikes of recent months but few expected a congressional crack-down this year. Rep. Leonor K. Sullivan (D-Mo.) said the report proves that U.S. coffee drinkers have taken a "merciless beating" on the basis of a "phony shortage which never existed."

McCarthy Censure Up Before Senate

WASHINGTON, July 30—UP—Sen. Ralph E. Klanders formally took his colleagues Friday to censure Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, the first time in 25 years the Senate has been called upon to denounce one of its members. Flanders, a Vermont Republican, planned to deliver a "bill of particulars" speech against the Senate's most controversial member when he introduces his resolution.

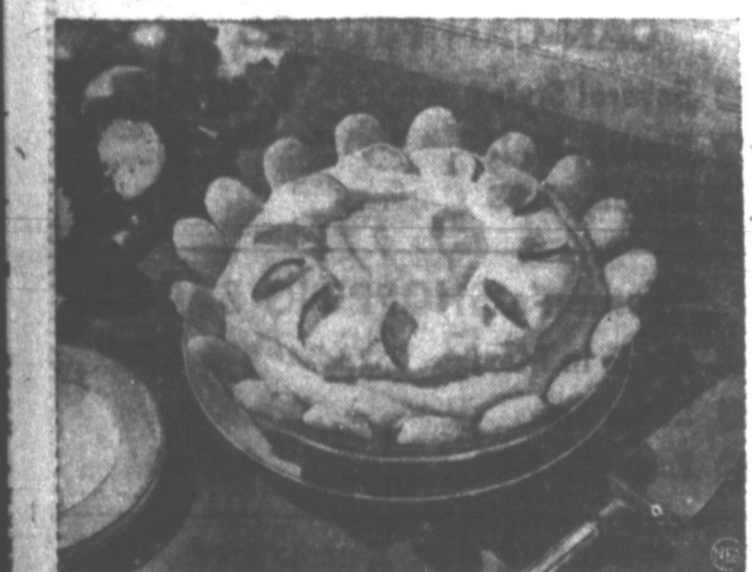

Summertime Enjoyment Given By Cool Lime Pie

From Lakeland, Fla. Sue and Paul Patterson give us two unusual recipes using fresh limes. Florida produces half a million boxes of limes every year—seedless shiny green blessings for summertime enjoyment.

Heavenly Lime Pie
(Yield: 1 9-inch pie)

Twelve lady fingers, 1 envelope unflavored gelatin, 1 cup sugar, divided, 8 eggs, separated, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 cup lime juice, 1 teaspoon grated lime rind.

For lady finger pie shell, split lady fingers. Cut 1/2 inch off end of lady fingers; stand, cut side down, around edge of 9-inch pie plate.

Put remaining whole lady fingers and pieces evenly in bottom of pie plate. Mix together gelatin and 1/2 cup of the sugar in top of double boiler. Beat egg yolks slightly; mix in water and lime juice. Add to gelatin mixture. Place over boiling water and stir constantly until gelatin is dissolved and mixture is slightly thickened. Add lime rind. 10 minutes; place kebabs on rack that will hold mixture in shape. Bake in oven for 30 minutes, turning once.

Second: I'm working on some Crocheting pattern how would I go about having them copyrighted???

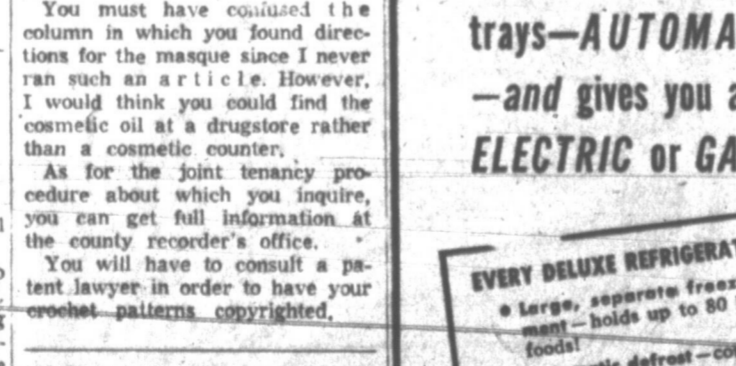

Kit Kat Klub Plans Adult Education Institute In Canada Bake Sale Saturday Attended By Mrs. Dorothy Statton

At a recent meeting of the Kit Kat Klub in the home of Miss Joan Rogers, 921 Ripley, final plans were made for a bake sale, to begin at 8:30 a.m. Saturday in the Hughes building.

Each member and pledge was advised to bring two kinds of pastry and groups were assigned to sell at certain periods during the morning.

Miss Jerry Sloan, vice-president, was in charge of the meeting. She announced that the members were to act as usherettes at the Top of Texas Rodeo. Each pledge recounted what she had done in the preceding week and several assignments were made for the following week.

It was also announced that next week, the Seven-Elevens, brother club of the group, will be allowed to pledge the Kit Kat pledges. The program was presented by the pledges.

Following the meeting, refreshments of soft drinks and homemade cookies were served.



MRS. DOROTHY STATTON

Mrs. Dorothy Statton, Girl Scout executive, returned recently from Bigwin Inn, Ontario, Canada, where she attended an Adult Education Institute. It was the second such conference ever held, as the program itself is only a little over two years old. Mrs. Statton is secretary of the Pampa adult education group.

The classes were taught mainly through the medium of discussion groups. Mrs. Statton pointed out. One of the main discussion items was programs some of the groups had already organized and tried out. Akron, Ohio, was cited as a city and has organized a community leadership institute. Its program stresses world politics, economic affairs and the humanities.

Some of the classes taught were entitled, "You and Your Community," "World Affairs," "You and Your Money," "Great Books," "Parent Education in a Democratic Society," "Jefferson in Our Times," "American Heritage," "Law and Justice," and "Mass Media."

During the institute, the overall purpose and workings of the program were explained. Mrs. Statton advised. The program was started and is supported by the Ford Foundation Fund for Adult Education. Eleven test cities and two test regions have been established throughout the country. Lubbock is a test city and West Texas is a test region. Each test city and region receives \$24,000 a year for this work. The financial support, however, is reduced each year with the aim for each city to eventually support its own program, she explained.

Its purpose, Mrs. Statton pointed out, is to provide liberal education and responsible citizenship for adults. Through the test cities and regions, the project attempts to provide "laboratory" situations where the community can observe adult education program," she explained. "Here they can experiment with new patterns and techniques, especially on liberal arts side. Much of what is developed in test cities may later be transferred to other communities in the nation."

The institute lasted for 10 days with 250 persons enrolled from all over the United States.

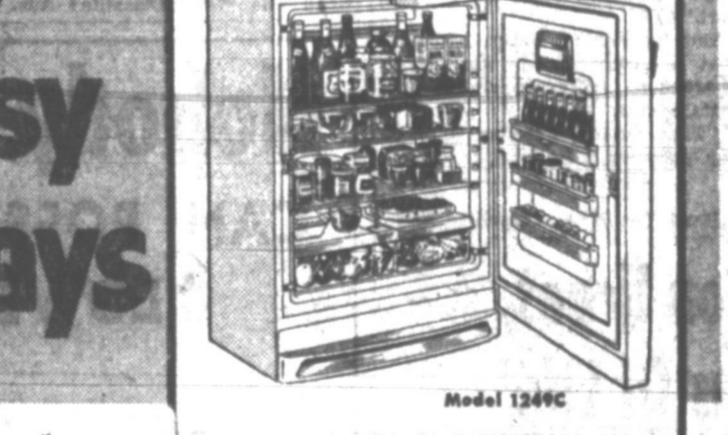
Destroy Poison Ivy Eater of Two Ways

Youths Do Church Work
Among those working with churches this summer are Bob Allford, Jr., First Baptist Church; J. R. Manning, Central Baptist Church; Charlotte Allston, Texas Christian University; Gene Clark, First Christian Church; Harold Smith, Enid, Okla.; James Kirby, Memphis; and Dick Tughe, Berger.

Bonny, a graduate of Pampa High School who is now attending McMurry College, is associate minister at St. Paul's Methodist Church. He intends to go to Yale University.

A church youth director has a lot of responsibilities, he pointed out. Among them: conducting vacation Bible schools, teaching Sunday School classes, organizing evening programs, providing a youth

recreation program and running youth revival or activities week.

Attendance Lacking
Only 7 million of the 26 million young persons, aged 12-23, in the United States are being reached by the church, Bonny noted. "It is those 19 other million we want to reach and," he said pointing to the Lions, "it's part of your job, too, as businessmen."

Ed Myatt, program chairman who introduced Bonny, said after Bonny had finished, "I think this shows the answer to the question, What are our youth doing today?"

E. O. (Red) Wedgeworth, Pampa Chamber of Commerce manager, also spoke and discussed the upcoming Top o' Texas Rodeo and Kid Pony Show and Top o' Texas Agriculture and Livestock Achievement Days.

There were 15 guests present, including Misses Su Stone and Joan Rogers, former club "sweethearts." Former "sweethearts" will be aboard the club float in the 4 p.m. Wednesday parade for the rodeo.

Decorations For Rodeo Completed

Street and business firm decorations for the Top o' Texas Rodeo were completed Thursday, according to R. M. Samples, chairman of big decoration committee.

Approximately 250 merchants had their businesses decorated for the annual event. The Hughes Decoration Service of Vernon, which has done the job for the last six years, strung the decorations. Members of the Business and Professional Women's Club collected the decoration fees.

Unclaimed Dead Given Med Students

FORT WORTH, July 30 — UP — Medical students have dissected bodies of nine Tarrant county paupers who died without provision to pay for burial, County Purchasing Agent Bo Lange announced Thursday.

FORT WORTH, July 30 — UP — Gov. Allan Shivers was scheduled for a non-political speech before the state American Legion convention Friday, after indicating he would try to make segregation the major issue of his run-off campaign against Ralph W. Yarborough. Shivers held a closed meeting with his top campaign workers Thursday in Austin, and then told newsmen "they admitted we have to have a run-off because they didn't work hard enough."

AUSTIN, July 30 — UP — A special session of the Legislature may be called to deal with Texas' drouth problems. Gov. Allan Shivers told newsmen Thursday the legislators might have to appropriate money to carry out the state's end of a federal-state drouth relief program that will provide hay for drouth-hit ranchers in 23 Central and West Texas counties.

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 30 — UP — Claims for jobless insurance pay dropped this month to the lowest point of the year. Chairman Dave Vandivier of the Oklahoma Employment Security Commission said the rate was 3.8 per cent of insured unemployment for the week ending July 27, compared with 4.2 per cent in March. A year ago, the rate was 3 per cent. Seasonal job opportunities: credit for the decline.

OKLAHOMA CITY, July 30 — UP — William O. Coe, beaten for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination, said Thursday the run-off results didn't "truly represent the will of the people." Coe said his supporters should make no commitments to support Democratic nominee Raymond Gary and hinted he might back Republican Republican sparks in November "if my investigation reveals what I suspect."


