France Prepared To Step Up War

GENEVA, July 17 -UP- French Premier Pierro Mendes - France warned the Communists Saturday to make peace in Indo-China within three days or face the prospect of a stepped-up French war offensive.

The Frenchman issued his warning in a radio broadcast to the French people from Geneva where high Red demands for peace in Indo-China have deadlocked the nine-nation Asian peace conference.

She graciously responded with this letter, which we feel will be of interest to all. This letter was not written personally to Peg, but to all of you.)/ DEAR PEG:

Here I've waited 'til the last half of our visit to Germany to fulfill my promise to write, bu. I left Pacipa on butterfly wings and have never quite settled down.

HOT DOG HAVEN

As you probably know, we are headquartering in Frankfurt at the Frankfurter Hot hotel. Incidentally, when I first heard "Frankfurter Hof" I thought of a hot-dog haven, but actually it is the most plush (or posh, as they say in Britain) hotel in Frankfurt, Two-thirds destroyed by the war, the hotel, dating from 1875, is handsomely re- 10:00 built, with a fountained courtyard separated from the street by double arches topped with blossoms.

EUROPE BLOOMS MADLY

All Europe is madly in bloom right now, houses and buildings loaded down with window boxes, even downtown - we find it very charming. Our room has its own flower-bedecked balcony overlooking the courtyard. We don't have time to sit on the balcony, but we feel very grand knowing it's there.

TEXAN PRACTICALITY

As the company Bob is working for here - Degussa - has him see their plants all over Allied Germany, we are gone several days out of each week. Rooms here at the hotel are in great demand (and quite expensive) so we check out each time we leave, and have a different room when we get back. We have lived on every floor of the hotel - and I am convinced that every room in the place has a deep cherry colored carpet - on which one grain of dandruff shows badly.

I don't know why my Texas practicality is so cognizant of this, since there are plenty of maids to clean it up. In fact early mornings they're everywhere underfoot on hands and knees like so many difficulty with my posture as well oversized black and white bugs, on stalrways, hallways, entrances, as trying to walk and get away scrubbing with reddened hands at everything in sight, I guess I'm so aware of it because we're sisters under the skin.





More Isolationists

Those of us who have been scorned as "isolationists" since it became popular under Roosevelt and Truman to follow a path of globaloney may soon find ourselves within lot of new companions whether they want to travel our path or not.

Now the internationalists are being frustrated by a turn of events over which they have no control as the result of crafty negotiations on the part of Chou EnLai, premier and foreign minister from Red China, who mysteriously appeared on the scene in Geneva.

Left behind as the other diplomats pulled out of Geneva, Chou has since made "state visits" that can change the whole course of our foreign policy — leaving us, as mentioned above, completely isolated. As he and Nehru of India pledged mutual goodwill and discussed their own

Asian alliance without the "West" Chou made his position clear in these words:

The ope when outside forces could decide at will the fate of Asia has gone forever. The menace to the peace of Asia comes now from outside, but Asia today is no "longer the Asia of yesterday."

It is thought that the two leaders of not far from billion Asians' are formulating plans for an inter-Asian alliance which excludes the West

This writer is only emphasizing all this, which no doubt you have got from your papers, because the possibility of an inter-alliance amona Red China, India, and other southeast Asian nations COUPLED WITH (1) the peace-with-communists policy of Churchill and Edan and (2) the peace-at-some-price in Indo-China on the part of France . . . the writer is emphasizing this because the interplay of these developments can radically upset all policies and plans we have been gradually getting accustomed to over the past several years.

It means, in cold realism, that the Communists are winning a tremendous victory in the Cold War - and nothing presently in view can prevent a communist coolition which will include over half the population of the globs --- close to two-thirds of the population would be more accurate, probably. And — where are we left then? Just as isolated as if we had adopted the policy at "America for the Americans" which expression and others like it have been violently denounced by the internationalists. Also, one might add, as if money has some value after all, that we would be billions of dollars better off today.

It is not-a-case of being "for" or "against" a given policy. It won't make any difference if one is personally an isolationist or on internationalist. But we may be sure that if the United States is further out-maneuvered - and for all practical purposes, frozen out of world councils --- the trends of economics and politics will be greatly influenced.

The coveting that gets us in trouble and does not pay comes from the Hebrew word Chamad. This word refers to coveting something that belongs to another and desiring to get it on an involuntary basis from someon

else. Another Hebrew word that has an entirely different meaning from the word chamad is zeloo. It means to covet earnestly the best gifts such as understanding, good will, frankness and sincerity. These other six different Hebrew words do not mention things that belong to someone else in using the word

that means to covet. Certainly, it is necessary to cov et life and to covet understanding, but that kind of coveting does not deprive anyone else of his equal right to the good things of life. In fact, instead of depriving them, it benefits them, When one covets wealth and creates it, he benefits everyone else in the world. But

when one covets what belongs to another and tries to get it without giving full value for it, then that injures both parties. It injures the one who covets even more than it injures the party who is despoiled because it degrades his character.


It makes him lose his own selfrespect. It makes him substitute h's will for God's laws.


The reader says: "Covetousness is not cured in people by merely saying: 'Thou shalt not covet.' Example must be given."
