



Washington, June 14—UP—
Senate Republican leader William
F. Knowland Monday predicted Congress will adjourn by its July 31 target date despite the possibility of lengthy debate on foreign aid, farm price supports, and at omic energy.

And Knowland said a floor fight on the atomic energy bill may be averted by compromises reached within the House - Senate committee which is woking on the measure.

Although some Senate leaders believe they will be lucky to wind up business by mid-August, knowland aald he has seen nothing yet to justify moving back the date. The Californian said he doubted the Indo-China crisis would cause any major debate on foreign policy.







## God-Given Rights

In a Christian nation the government doesn't grant rights. Rights are granted by God. They are called Godgiven rights or natural rights.

Our Bill of Rights does not grant rights. It is a statement of prohibitions telling government that it cannot interfere with God-given or natural rights.

It might have been better to call it a statement of prohibitions so that people would remember that rights are natural - not granted by the Bill of Rights - but granted by God!

The Bill of Rights doesn't say men have a right to worship in such and such a church implying that somebody has to build a church for them. It says:

The government is prohibited from legislating on religion or building churches.

It doesn't say that men have a right to read newspapers thereby implying that somebody should give away newspapers. It says: The government is prohibited from passing laws re-

stricting freedom of the press. It doesn't say the people have a right to get together

In a civic auditorium, thereby implying that governments should build auditoriums. It says:

The government is prohibited from preventing assemblies of peaceful citizens.

It doesn't say that the people have a right to a house and home; thereby implying that taxpayers should be forced to build government housing. It says:

The government is prohibited from invading the privacy of those people who have homes, and the government can't search a man's house without a sworn warrant. And that the government is forbidden to try men without juries.

It doesn't say that people have a right to own property, thereby implying that other men should give them property, It says:

The government is prohibited from seizing private property, and that if the government does use a man's property he must be justly compensated for its use.

This is a statement of prohibitions, not the granting of rights or privileges from the state.

The rights are God-given; not state-given.

Contrast this with the UN Declaration on Human Rights which says that one man's rights should be violated to provide another man with all material things.

#### Income Tax Laws

Our present steeply progressive federal income tax rates run up to 91 per cent. A new slant on just who really pays this tax was given by economist Henry Hazlitt in Newsweek. He makes the biting criticism that "The workers of this country are being cruelly deceived when they are led to think that 'the rich' are paying most of the taxes because of , , , confiscatory rates. Of the \$31,000,000,000 that the personal income tax yields, only about \$1,000,000,000 comes from the rates above 50 per cent. In fact, if there were no tax progression at all, and the income tax never rose higher than the twenty per cent that now applies only to the net income tax brackets below \$2,000, the total maximum revenue loss would amount to less than \$5,400,000,000.

Mr. Hazlitt points out that a \$100 increase in the personal income tax exemption would mean four million people would no longer have to pay an income tax. It would "... relieve that many voters of any concern about governmental extravagance, and . . . foster in them the illusion that 'the other fellow' is paying the bill." It would mean a \$2,400,000,000 loss in annual revenue and it wouldn't make financial sense — but it would be politically 'smart'." Although no office halder would dare suggest such a thing, the place to cut federal income taxes is in the higher brackets. Mr. Hazlitt believes that if the income tax were cut to a maximum of 50 per cent it "would within a few years . . . yield more revenue from net incomes above \$18,000, not less."

Mr. Hazlitt clearly describes the greatest danger of confiscatory tax rates in these words: "The worst harm is that they discourage the most productive people from producing and earning what they would otherwise produce and earn. They deprive the nation of this production and of the new enterprises that would otherwise be

#### Profit Essential

The president of one of our leading oil companies recently had something noteworthy to say about profit. "Today the American people have new faith in the profit system," he observed, "They recognize out of their own experience in war and peace, that fair profits make our economic machine go, keep it in good repair and enable us to enlarge it, as the need arises.

"Business — every business, large and small — must bend its every effort to do the best it can profitwise. The more businesses that make profit, the more every-

body will benefit. Plainly and simply, the activities stirred up by profits from all kinds of businesses have meant, and will continue to mean, better distribution of money throughout the economy in the form of wages, taxes, dividends, new investments. After all, business can't lock the profits away in a strong box — it pumps them back into the lifestream of the economy.

Oil is one outstanding example of the progress that comes from the right to make a profit, and the incentive to achievement that the profit motive creates. Without profit, our much vounted living and working standards would swiftly decay to the Iron Curtain level.

William Jennings Bryan, of Nebraska, spoke for the improverished West when he said:

"Gentlemen have denounced the income tax as class legislation because it will affect more people in one section of the country than in another. Because the wealth of the country is, to a large extent, centered in certain cities and states does not make a bill sectional which imposes a tax in proportion to wealth. If New York and Massachusetts pay more tax under this law than other states, it will be because they have more taxable incomes within their borders. And why should not those sections pay most which enjoy most?"

In reading these speeches on e wonders whether there ever would have been an income tax in this country if the advocates of it could have held off until Chicago was able to stand up to New York, and Nebraska farmers, sporting limousines, became the envy of Boston workers. Even the opponents of the bill seemed little aware of the concentration of political power that income taxation would generate, and directed their arguments mostly to the principle of private property, to the unconstitutionality of the bill, to the doctrine of class legislation. Bourke Cockran, Representative from New York, almost touched on the vital subject when he said

(It was not until 1937 that the Supreme Court, through the mouth of Justice Benjamin Cardozo, had the forthrightness to declare that 'natural rights, so-called, are as much a subject of taxation as rights of lesser importance.") Thus, Justice Field, in a brilliant argument supporting the majority opinion declaring the bill unconstitutional, quotes approvingly the point brought up by counsel: There is no such thing in the

theory of our national government as unlimited power of taxation in Congress. There are limits of its powers arising out of the essential nature of all free governments; there are reservations of individual rights, without which society could not exist, and which are respected by every government. The right of taxation is subject to these limitations.'

The seed of class hatred that had been planted during the Civil War proved fertile. Its sprout was merely stunted by the 1895 decision of the Supreme Court. In the years following, it continued to send forth shoots that circumvented the Constitution, for under the guise of "excise" taxation, levies were laid on some corporation incomes and on inheritances. The Spanish-American War created a climate favorable to these taxes, and the Supreme Court, in 1900. did some major logic-chopping to justify the legislation; in fact, the decision of 1900, which was a piece of legislation in itself, was of great help later to those who

wanted general income taxation. The drumfire of "soak the rich" was having its effect. Even the rich began to join in the chorus.
