

Perhaps South should play to day's hand at three no-trump in stead of four spades, since there are nine cold tricks against any opening lead. Most experts would, however, play the hand, at four spades because there is usually greater safety at a good major

An expert would make four spades, but the actual declarer was no expert. He won the opening heart lead with the ace, drew trumps, and then speculated about the right way to play the clubs. This speculation was probably good healthful exercise, but it didn't do South much good. No matter how he played the clubs he was bound to lose three tricks in the suit.

Condemned Man Eats **Big Meals**

OSSINING, N. Y., Aug. 13 -- UP -Gerhard A. Puff, scheduled to be executed in Sing Sing prison Thursday night for the slaying of an FBI agent, spent his final hours in lonely solitude Thursday but ordered two of the largest "last meals" in prison history.

Puff, whose last appeal was refused by President Eisenhower last Friday, was to be electrocuted in the prison's death house at 9 p.m.

When told he could have any thing he wanted for his last two meals, Puff ordered:

Noon -- shrimp cocktail, soup, stzak, peas," carrots, cauliflower, lettuce salad, honey dew melon rolls, strawberry ice cream, soda candy and cigars. Evening -- fried chicken, sweet potatoes, brussel sprouts, combination salad, strawberry shortcake, coffee and ice сгеат

In the one year, two months, 23 days Puff has been in the death house, he has never had a relative call on him. His wife, Annie Laurie Moore Puff, is confined in a state correction department prison farm. His father, mother and brother, of White Fish Bay, Wis., have refused to visit him.


THE LIGHT OF THE WORLD




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
