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



Sometimes the wind shifts or increases or decreases in velocity and makes a fielder misjudge the flight of the ball. If he has raced to get under the ball, he may still have time to change direction and get under it for the catch. Being set also gives him time to get into the best position to throw after water g

Tax On Speed

Well, we've heard a lot of ideas for new taxes but the one recently proposed in Congress has few equals: It is a tax on speed

The way it would work is that a gadget would be attached to the speedometer of your car. Every time you exceeded 50 miles on hour it would record the speed and the number of miles traveled. At the end of the year you would pay a tax of a little more than one cent per mile on speeds of 50 to 60 miles on hour, 3½ cents on 60 to 70, five cents on 70 to 80, and — if you survive six cents on 80 to 90 miles on hour.

Based on how the average American drives (who knows?) it is estimated that the plan would raise \$2 billion a year in taxes. Maybe its best feature would be that instead of substantially increasing the tax take it would substantially reduce the accident and death rate.

Furthermore, it would give back seat drivers something really to kick about when the going got too fast. If you're in favor of the tax write a 25,000 word letter to your congressman about it.

Why Nations Have Inflation

Very few people understand why nations have inflation. I never really understood why until I read Ludwig von Mises' latest book "The Theory of Money and Credit," He explains it in a rational manner.

We have inflation because officeholders want to spend more money or borrowing from individual eitizens or non-bank corporations. Von Mises contends that the great majority of citizens do not want inflation, but that we get inflation because the politicians deceive the voters. They do not explain the serious harmful consequences that

Von Mises points out that inflation is the inevitable result of a welfare state or a socialistic economy. When people believe in a welfare state, that is, that the state has a right to take from one to benefit another, it is only a question of time until the inflation method is adopted.

Where Does The Welfare State Originate?

It seems logical to conclude that the welfare state originates in each community where the majority of citizens believe that the state or the local community should furnish "education" at less than cost. Tax-supported schools, it seems, are the primary origin of the welfare state. They are, in fact, nothing but a welfare state.

The only argument that people can present for tax supported schools is that the poor couldn't afford to get an education on a free market basis. Of course, that argument is nonsense because poverty or necessity is more of a stimulant to the individual than is luxury. If an individual has a will to learn, that is all the requirement there is for him to develop. If he does not have the will or desire to learn, no amount of money, no amount of public schools, can help him. In fact, instead of helping him get an education that includes moral principles, public schools make it infinitely more difficult for him to get an education.

So it seems reasonable that we can trace inflation, step by step, back to grabbing the children and teaching them by example that they need not get things on a voluntary basis and that the state will act as a welfare agent to help him. When the child grows up, he naturally believes in a welfare state. He naturally believes that the state has a right to do things that would be a violation of the Golden Rule if done by an individual, And that is really what a economic and military alliance welfare state is. 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Coronado's Expedition Discovered Panhandle

On February 23, 1510, an expedition left Compostela, Mexico, on what was to be one of the major accomplishments in the history of knew at that time that should he the Western hemisphere — discovery and capture of Cibola and consequently the discovery of the Panhandle of Texas.

At one place the cattle had to be transported one at a time across a riv er, Coronado related.

FOOD RUNS LOW Later, Coronado's food supply be gan to diminish, so a stop was made at a village established years earlier by Nuno de Guzman. It had been abandoned because of the pestilence.

Coronado sent Samaniego with soldiers to hunt for food, but they were attacked by Indians and Sa-maniego was killed. The expedition remained at that point until several of the Indians had been captured, killed, and left hanging on trees in order to counteract the bad augury which followed from the loss of the first life on the

Coronado got a report from a couple of officers of the Spanihs army who had been exploring around Cibola but said they found no rich lands as Friar Marcos had reported. 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



SCORES DIFFER LITTLE A group of judges will seldom be more than a few points off agreement, particulary on the ani-mal's performance. On the rider, scores of judges may vary as much as ten points because a ride always looks different from an-other angle. The rider and animal are scored on an equal basis. Regardless of the point difference of the judges, if they have a reputation of being fair, square and experienced, you won't hear any "beefs" from the cowboy.

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

The cowboy's big danger is that the horse might land on him. When you're flying through the air after suddenly leaving the back of a 1,600-pound horse, it isn't easy to guide yourself away from those flying hooves which might mean an accidental trampling.




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
