

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

Anti UN Button

It is one thing to say "Let's get out of U.N." and quite another to wear a button in public which proclaims to the world at large: "Let's Get Out of U.N.

This could be embarrassing. A lot of people believe the United Nations is a great thing. Somebody such as Edward R. Murrow says:

"The U.N. is our only hope for peace!" Right away his followers go around muttering:

"Well, the U.N. may not be perfect, but it's all we've got and it's our only hope for peace.

So what's a businessman to do if he personally believes America should withdraw, but is afraid maybe some of his customers don't believe that way, and if he wore a button saying: "Let's Get Out of U.N." he might lose some business?

Taking a stand can be dangerous

What's a preacher to do if part of his congregation believes in U.N., but he believes we should withdraw? Should he wear the button and risk losing part of his congregation to some other church? Or should he wear his conscience on his lapel and the devil take the con-

Asking people to wear a button like that when it could be embarrassing to them isn't going to increase our popularity with fence-sitters.

Any time anybody crusades to get people to mount barricades or take a public stand, or sign some dangerous document or petition, such as the Declaration of Independence, it makes people uncomfortable.

Try it; and you'll run into such phenomena as:

"Well, sure I agree with you in principle - but I con't want to get into any arguments just over principles.

"I don't mind telling you I think you're right but don't ask me to wear a button in public - somebody might take it the wrong way.

We don't want to create a conflict in anybody's heart. So we are merely going to put a box of "Let's Get Out of the U.N." buttons here in The News office.

Those who want to wear one and who aren't afraid to do so will find them available. One button is free. For those who want to assist in carrying on the cam-

paign, The News will mail five or more buttons on request at five cents each.

We believe that taking a stand of this kind may be embarrassing and in some cases, dangerous. But we believe that it is much more dangerous to refuse to take a stand. It is more dangerous to let the U.N. supporters

"The Queens County American Legion responded promptly to the news. In a full meeting, it unanimously resolved that Mrs. Peress was 'not a proper person for a PTA post. Mrs. Peress' PTA by this time, however, was smoothly able to cope with the situation. On February 26, at a 'special' execulive officers meeting, a vote of confidence was arthounced for Mrs. Peress. Local papers accepted the announcement as meaningful. Actually, of course, not the who'e PTA membership at all, had auything to do with the vote. To follow it up, however, Airs, Peress' supporters began an intensive phone call campaign to round up the numerical support they lacked and which someday might be questioned. 


