

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Faux Pas

We have had our attention called to an editorial which appeared in The News on June 6 relative to the Ford Foundation which lent an erroneous impression.

In that editorial, we stated that the Ford-Foundation had supported the Institute of Pacific Relations, a notorious red front organization which was largely responsible for directing thought in favor of the "agrarian reformers" of China.

A check, however, has disclosed that we had our foundations confused: Both the Rockefeller and Carnegie Foundations were heavy IPR contributors while the Ford Foundation was in no way involved.

We don't believe that the Communist party should have been outlawed

Our first reason is that we do not believe in preventive laws.

We don't believe that they prevent anything.

One reason that we believe this is because we are Constitutional fundamentalists and believe that most of the harm to America has been done by those who wished to subvert the Constitution.

What does the Constitution have to say about outlowing the Communist Party?

Our favorite Constitutional authority is Isabel Paterson, author of The God of the Machine. She says in Chapter XII, commenting on the Treason Clause in our Consti-

"The treason clause remains unique in all the long record of political institutions.

"In the first place, it declares that there is no such crime as treason in peacetime."

The only method of outlawing Reds consistent with the Constitution would be to have Congress officially declare war on Russia, for the Constitution says: 'Treason against the United States shall consist only

in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid or comfort. "Nothing but armed rebellion or joining with an enemy

nation — and nations are by definition enemies only when at war — can be treason.

"No peaceful or personal opposition to government or to members of government comes under the head of

"Even the forcible attack of resistance of a single person as such (having no connection or agreement with other persons or a foreign government to the same end), could hardly be construed as 'treason,' as it would not

constitute 'levying war.' "Treason must also be an 'overt act,' not merely an expression of an opinion; and a conviction cannot be had on circumstantial evidence; two witnesses to the act

are required. "In the European theory it was treason to attack the person of the king even for a non-political motive. The man and the office are held to be inseparable.

"A like attempt against a member of a true republican government is a strictly personal criminal offense. "By this unprecedented limitation of treason, the gov-

roment or administration was debarred from encroachments. Its members were allowed no means of reprisals against criticism or exposure."

The excuse of catching Communists cannot justify this constant chipping away at the Constitution and the Bill of Rights. The Americans who favored outlawing Communists will live to regret it - for they have granted the government a power which can be used against patriots as well as Communists.

In order to stimulate interest in what the United Nations is doing to the United States and the American people, Freedom News-

The editor of the Tulsa Tribune lieve in the American way of life as set forth in the Declaration of Independence will give a little study to the Charter of the United Nations and the Statute of the International Court of Justice, I am sure they will want to get out of the United Nations. The trouble is that most people have not read the UN Charter and simply believe that it is a method of promoting peace. But the means that the UN proposes to use will not promote peace, but will result in a world government that will be the master rather than the servant of the individual.

Single Buttons Free

Anyone can have a "Let's Get Out of UN" button who wants to wear it by calling at any of the offices of any of the newspapers published by Freedom Newspapers If anyone wants to help distribute these buttons they can get five or more mailed to them for 5 cents

One of the purposes of distributing these buttons is to get people well enough informed on what the United Nations stands for that they will want to get out of the UN. Just as soon as enough people realize how much the United Na-tions contradicts the spirit of 1776 they will want to see that the United States gets out of the United Nations. And Congress will get us out of the United Nations when enough people believe that we should be out.

A short time ago this column carried some of the reasons why Dr. V. Orval Watts-is opposed to the United Nations. He cited several Articles from the Charter that show the means the United Nations proposes to sue to promote peace. Here is wnat Article 55 from the Charter says:

"With a view to the creation of conditions of stability and wellbeing which are necessary for peaceful and friendly relations among nations based on respect for the principle of equal rights and self - determination of peoples, the United Nations shall pro-"a. higher standards of living,

conomic and social progress and "b. solutions of international eco-

nomic, social, health, and related problems; and international cultural and educational co-operation;

"c. universal respect for, and observance of, human rights and fundamental freedoms for all without distinction as to race, sex, language or religion.

Article 25 of this Charter says: 'The Members of the United Nations agree to accept and carry out the decisions of the Security Council in accordance with the present Charter.'

But we already have the permanent members of the United Nations Security Council stacked against the ideologies of the Declaration of Independence. Russia, England and France are all more or less socialistic and all believe that men get their rights from the government rather than from God. Why does the United States want to be a member of an organization where we are in the minority to start with on the beiefs as to how government should be limited.

Here is another Article No. 59 that shows how we are obligated if we stay in the United Nations to carry out the means that the United Nations' Charter proposes o promote peace. It reads:

"The Organization shall, where appropriate, initiate negotions among the states concerned for the creation of any new specialized agencies required for the accomplishment of the purposes set forth in Article 55." Better re - read Article 55 to see




