





Well, that immediate problem doesn't confront you, dear reader, but it faces the people of India where a government commission has recommended government control — what else? — of the content and treatment of news, employment policies and advertising in news-

"In a word," the Wall Street Journal reports, "the government at New Delhi would be empowered to tell the 330 newspapers in India what to print, how to print it, whom to hire and fire, and what advertising should be accepted, what should be charged for it and whether it should go on page 1 or among the want ads

The situation in India is not unusual. As it happens the situation in America is. There is hardly a country aside from the U.S.A. where press freedom really exists. Such press freedom is hedged in the British Commonwealth and either non-existent or sharply restricted by government in the rest of the world.

That a sharp check-rein on what newspapers can tell the people is part and parcel of most nations is most obvious in the debates of United Nations agencies where work seems continually underway on treaties with such high-falutin' titles as "Freedom of Information" and "Covenant of Free Expression" but which all carry - in the fine print - severe restrictions on the gathering and transmission of news. So far, the U.S.A. has steered clear of such dangerous ideas and the American reader is still getting the news "as she is" and not colored up to suit the politics of the pattern power.

Ike's Concept Of An American President Eisenhower's defense

of George Marshall as being a fine American raises the question as to what standard Eisenhower uses to determine whether a man is a fine American. In short, it raises the question of what Americanism is. If Americanism means whatever Eisenhower thinks is Americanism. then his recommendation of a man being a fine American is of little

If, on the other hand, Americanism means a different kind of government than those that exist in the rest of the world and one as set forth by the Declaration of Independence, then Eisenhower's judgment of a fine American is of little value.

And it seems that Eisenhower has a strange conception of an American. The only way we can judge a man as to whether he is truly a fine American or not is by what he advocates and what he

If the Declaration of Independence, that says "governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed" and "all men are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights . . and among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness," be the true standard or measure of an American, then Eisenhowεr himself is far from being a fine American.

Why
This is true because Eisenhower advocates things that are a complete violation of the Declaration of Independence. It proclaims that men should have independence and the government is the servant of the individual, not his master.

Now, what does Eisenhower advocate that violates the American principles as set forth in the Declaration of Independence, the first official document of the United States government? He advocates drafting soldiers, taking away from other groups their right to be a steward of their life-their right to be independent - their right to be owners of themselves and all they produce.

He does this by advocating social security and government housing, both of which are nothing but a violation of the Declaration of Independence and both are following the communist ideo'ogies that the government's job is to take care of people rather than that it is the responsibility of the individual to take care of himse'f or so live that someone wants to. voluntarily assist him.

It might be contended that Eisenhower is receding from this welfare state philosophy when he ports, he only wants to have more power by way of his appointe's. He is still following a planned economy of communism.

Another case where Eisenhower life as set forth in the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence is when he wants to make the executive department supreme over Congress. He does this by instructing his appointees not to answer questions asked by the Congressional Committee on Un-American Activities. He seems to believe that he is so wise and his appointées are so wise that the representatives of the people-our Congressmen - have no right to check on how the money they ap-





Noted Nutritionist Says Iced Tea Is Low Calorie Thirst Quencher

While discussing summer beverages at a recent press conference, Dr. Norman Jolliffe, Director of the Bureau of Nutrition of the New York City Department of Health warned weight-watchers to be discreet in quenching their summer thirst. "Water, carbonated water with a little lemon, and iced tea are excellent non-filling, non-fattening cooling

beverages. Iced tea," Dr. Jolliffe explained, "when sweetened with a non-caloric sweetener and a dash of lemon, not only refreshes and quenches the thirst, but also appeases the appetite, giving a lift without adding calories that count.

"Since everyone eats less but drinks more in the summer, it is important to know which beverages one can, nutritionally, afford to drink," Dr. Jolliffe said. To aid those who are watching their weight, in picking summer drinks, he has compiled a table showing the average calorie content of number of popular hot weather drinks. The table follows:

Approx. No.-11.0 *Iced Tea with sugar and lemon end cream 84.0

"Over indulgence in high calorie beverages can affect health because most of them contain nutritionally inferior calories. Nutritionally inferior calories carry only energy and lack vitamins, minerals and amino acids. "Anyone drinking an unusual

"It is essential to drink more liquids during the summer to make up for the water lost from the body through perspiration. On a hot day the body can lose from two and a half to four quarts of water through perspiration. Under extreme conditions this water loss. may reach as high as ten quarts. Therefore it is important to know what it is best to drink."

Dr. Jolliffe is one of the world's foremost authorities on health and nutrition. He was a member of the Food and Nutrition Board of the National Research Council, United States Public Health, and a director of the National Vitamin Foundation. Dr. Jolliffe is also author of a popular diet book "Reduce and Stay Reduced," published by Simon and Schuster and Family






