Production Waste

According to the Council of State Chambers of Commerce, Uncle Sam's investment in farm products as of March 31, the latest date for which figures are available, had reached on all-time high figure of six bil-Lion, two hundred and twenty nine million dollars!

That astounding figure is about evenly divided between the value of outright inventories of commodities acquired under loan, purchase agreement and direct purchase operations, and the value of loans outstanding. One crop alone, wheat, accounts for more than one-third of the total.

To illustrate the tremendous quantities of the commodities either already owned outright by the government or pledged for government loans, the Council has converted bushels and hundredweights and dollars into the following graphic examples:

There is enough wheat to provide every man, woman and child in the United States, including the armed forces overseas, with a loaf of bread for 364 days.

There is enough tobacco to provide the nation's 60 million cigarette smokers with 183 packs each.

There is enough cotton to make 117 shirts or 91 house dresses for every American family.

There is enough corn for feed to provide the nation with a normal six months supply of pork and pork products.

Inventories of butter and cheese would supply every member of our population with about two pounds each. Cottonseed oil inventories are sufficient to supply every person in the United States with five pounds of margarine.

It is typical of the calibre of the average farm bloc congressman in Washington that he is not so much alarmed by the burden this mounting of surpluses is piling on the taxpayer as he is by the threat of "political death" if he should vote to end this "production for waste" by eliminating the whole subsidy program.

Initis is one of the serious eye diseases. It is usually associated with pain, watering of the eyes, excessive sensitivity to bright light and, if long continued, interference with vision.

The pain is likely to be severe and worse at night. Touching or pressing the eyeball is usually excruciatingly painful.

ONE CORRESPONDENT says that she has had iritis in her right eye for almost a year, and she is getting preity discourged. This is evidently a chronic form of the disease and one can only express the hope that the treatments which she is getting will soon prove effective. Indeed this does regard as good. often happen.
