Atoms For Peace Plan On Global Scale Revealed

SHIPPINGPORT. Sept. 6 - UP - President Eisenhower disclosed Monday that the United States and six other nations have agreed to form an international agency which will foster the growth and spread of atomic technology for peaceful use.

In a speech marking the start of construction of this nation's first full-scale atomic power plant, Mr. Eisenhower again extended an invitation to Russia to join the "atoms for peace" plan which he first broached in an address to the United Nations General Assembly in December, 1953.

"We have just agreed with a number of other nations to go ahead now with the formation of an international agency which will foster the growth and spread of the new atomic technology for peaceful use," the President said.

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

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

However, if you want to take a chance, here are some directions which might help you

Superficial dust and dirt can be College. removed from an old oil painting in sound condition by a light brushing with absorbant cotton or a soft brush: Either of these can be used dry or moistened with a gasoline type dry-cleaning fluid. As it is inflammable the proper precautions must be taken. The canvass must be firmly and uniformly supported from the reverse while any pressure is being put upon the face of the painting.

Paintings should not be treated on front or back with soap, water, breadcrumbs, erasers, raw potato, sliced onion, or oil of any kind. Some of these may improve the appearance of a painting temporarily, but all can be harmful except in experienced hands. I especially warn you about these things as many will try to persuade you to try some of the above home recipes.

A painting whose surface has secome dull can frequently be brightened by the use of a good quality prepared wax emulsion cream furniture wax polish. If the manufacture's directions for use on fine furniture are carefully followed, no harm should result and the thin surface is a safe and mod-

erately durable protection. No other treatment should be followed by inexperienced persons, and my advice is not to try even these methods until the painting has been examined by an expert.

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Council Double Talk

Typical double talk was expressed in a major pronouncement coming from the World Council of Churches on a "responsible society." It was an expression that said that private enterprise is a boon to "economic progress" but added that the state must stand ready to counter depression or injustice.

The convention did recognize that there has been, a "fresh recognition" of value of "relative freedom in en-

'At its best the business system has provided incentives for the responsible initiative and the hard work which produces economic progress," the council said But it added that the state "in the public interest" must

intervene to curb excessive "economic or social power" to counteract depression or individual crisis.

This is the same story that we hear constantly from those who give some sort of lip service to the free enterprise-system and then immediately back-track to say that they don't believe in the free enterprise system at all.

One of the most abused phrases in our modern life is that of "the public interest" which is another way of saying "the general welfare." Neither of these two expressions mean anything without further definition. If in using the phrase "the public interest" we are discussing something that somebody thinks ought to be done by government and which has been given by 51 per cent of the voters, that is one thing. If, however, we are discussing what is in the interest of ALL the public, like freedom, then that is another thing. "The general welfare" generally means that "we as government have decided to take some of your production and give it to someone else we think is deserving because he has not been able to produce for himself." The actual means of preserving "the general welfare" are extremely limited if we are to include ALL of the individuals who go to make up the general public. The only basic beliefs will be found acceptable to ALL of the people and the net result will be that government will be limited to such basic beliefs as are agreed upon by ALL people — in other words, as our Founding Fathers put it, "a government with the consent of the governed."

It should be noted that the phrase does not say "a government with the consent of 51 per cent of the gov-

Actually, it is surprising that the World Council of Churches has even recognized that there has been "fresh recognition" of the value of "relative freedom in enterprise" and such recognition ought to be encouraging to those who have been thumping the freedom drum. It is not likely that such recognition would have been given that the American system of government is tied into our religious and economic beliefs and cannot be separated. With this awakening there has come the discovery that there are many in our churches who give some sort of an official nod to the Judo-Christian belief that enables free enterprise to function but who actually are working against the best interests of those who seek to unshackle free enterprise from government's chains. Many of these, of course, are merely uninformed and have not thought through the issues sufficiently to understand what is going on. Others, unfortunately, know exactly what they are doing and are on a deliberate campaign to undermine the American system and set up in its stead some variation of the socialist-communist system.



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
