Union Loan

A number of newspapers have commented editorially and enthusiastically about the granting of a loan by the AFL United Hatters, Cap and Millinery Workers International Union to a millinery manufacturer. It's really something great, is the tone of the approval, and it just goes to show that unions are peachy, good-hearted kids who want to help everyone.

It is interesting to note, however, that the union itself is \$1,000,000 in debt because it financed a 10months strike against another hat maker and that all of the money being loaned to the first outfit has to come from individual members which amounts to about \$200 per employee.

The Chicago Sun Times, a New Deal publication, adds that "if an employee does not have the money available, arrangements are being made for him to borrow it at a local bank and pay the loan back from future wages' and, we might add, with interest tacked on.

Just how it makes sense to the union members or anyone else to close one plant by strike for 10 months and then borrow money and bay interest so that another plant can operate, maybe again at a loss, is something that hasn't been explained. It seems logical to believe that many of the union members would just as soon not find themselves in this position but are so dominated by the union bosses that they have little choice in the matter. It may be that after they have "been in business" for a while with their own money that the union members will find out that a company has to make a profit to survive and that if the money is pooled the union members and the company will be a whole lot better off if they drop the union and the expense of a union boss and work together as associates. If so, it will have been worthwhile.



ng to step around her husband's dirty clothes, or pick them up and put them in the clothes hamper, announced that in the future any elothing she found on the floor was going in the trash can.


She claims only one dirty shirt got as far as the garbage can before her husband got the idea that she meant what she said and started using the clothes hamper.



Iwo Jima Statue On Way To Site NEW YORK, Sept. 3 UP-The

argest statue ever cast in bronze, the Marine Corps memorial depicting the famous flagraising on Iwo Jima, during World War II, began its journey Thursday to its site at Arlington national cemetery in Washington.

Weighing more than 100 tons and standing 73 feet high, the statue was moved by truck from its cast-ing foundry in Brooklyn to its seven and one-half acre tract overlooking the Potomac River. The memorial will be dedicated to all marines who gave their lives since the corps was founded in
