

In a nutshell, dolltrone exerts an almost hypnotic influence on a patient — even silowing the doctor to order the patient to do some-thing during an operation while the patient is completely unaware of







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### A Train For Pampa

Pampa can be tuly proud today that the officials of the Santa Fe Railroad have agreed to make our city a conditional stop for the San Francisco Chief.

This is one of the fine trains of the nation, and it maintains its pace across the western half of the country because it holds the number of stops to a minimum. So, it is a mark of distinction for the City of Pampa to have been agreed upon as a conditional stopping point.

This development is a result of a lot of hard work by representatives of Pampa's Chamber of Commerce in dealings with the Santa Fe Railroad, and it will mean much in the way of convenience and dollars and cents to traveling Pampans.

Our congratulations to all those who worked so hard to accomplish this, and our thanks to the railroad men who are making it possible.

### Conservatives

W. C. Mullendore, president of Southern California Edison Company, recently spoke on the importance of the true conservative. His remarks are refreshing in an era when office holders of all parties at every political level are scrambling to be indentified as liberals, which generally means being liberal with the taxpayer's money.

In describing the "perspective of a conservative" Mr. Mullendore praised the "type of conservative mind and thought which has both breadth and depth, which is neither nearsighted nor narrow-minded, but is aware of the past and has dispassionately studied the lessons of experience, which sees the present as the fruit of the past and the seed of the future, and respects the relationship of cause and effect."

He then touched upon some of the things that are causing conservatives such grave concern in our country today; the expansion of credit; subsidizing production and consumption at home and abroad; stimulation of capital investment - all under government mandate, with purchasing power secured through inflation and vast expansion of debt for non-productive purposes. For example, the increase in private debt alone just since 1950 has been about \$100,000,000. The non-farm home mort-gage debt in this country in 1925 totaled \$12,000,000,-000 — today it is approximately \$60,000,000,000, Since - today it is approximately \$60,000,000,000. Since the end of World War II other consumer debt has increased from less than \$5,000,000,000 to more than \$28,000,000,000, or between 500 and 600 per cent and so far as the federal government is concerned, spending beyond income has become habitual. During the last four fiscal years, (1950 to 1953) authorized expenditures exceeded actual revenues by over \$19,000,000,000.

Nowadays it is up to conservatives with a perspective to keep hammering at the false brand of liberalism that leads nations to ruin and bankruptcy. Again quoting Mr. Mullendore: "A review of the history of the past two decades should suggest . . . that we should make an honest inquiry into present practices and their meaning. If we will fearlessly and honestly make such an examination, we cannot but see that the sources of much of our present prosperity are destructive spendthrift policies . . . not only the freedom of the American people but the fate of a civilization is involved."

### Warped Intent

Public power zealots in key positions misinterpreted the intent of Congress, as expressed in the Flood Control Act of 1944, in order to foster government development at the expense of private enterprise.

That, in effect is the opinion of a recognized authority — A. J. G. Priest, professor of law at the University of Virginia.

The act in question contains the much debated clause providing that preference in the sale of federal power is to be given to public bodies and cooperatives. But it also says that the power shall be disposed of "in such a manner as to encourage the most widespread use thereof at the lowest possible rates to consumers consistent with sound business principles." It further states that power is to be made available on fair terms not only to public bodies, but to privately-owned companies.

Apparently the influential public-power group seized happily onto the preference clause to the exclusion of other stipulations. Mr. Priest cites a 1945 order by the then Secretary of the Interior which can be construed as saying: "Do everything you can to convert investorowned, tax-paying utility property into government-owned tax-eating utility property." That was plainly the policy for many years.

The proper step now is to get rid of the preference clause and all other unfair "class" clauses and statutes. As the Neligh, Nebraska, Leader, said succinctly: "No U. S. citizen should be discriminated against in the sale of federal hydro power."

### The Only Cure

"We could both cure the budget deficit and many of the pains of taxes without lessening our effectiveness in defense or in the needed functions of government if we could now have a period of self-denial and patience."

That observation has come from a real authority. Herbert Hoover, in a talk made before the American Society of Newspaper Editors. The American people never were given sounder advice or more timely advice. If we are to lay the ghost of Inflation and honestly eliminate the danger of eventual bankruptcy, we must welcome and ancourage every effort to cut government costs, including those which hit us directly in our own pocketbooks.

ism known as the New Deal was made possible by the income tax. But with the advent of income taxation, socialism was unavoidable There have always been, and perhaps always will be, people who are averse to letting other people alone. Recognizing the human inclination to err, they are

impelled by their kindness of heart to overcome this imperfection; invariably they come up with a sureproof plan that needs only politi-cal power to become effective. Political power is the essential ingredient of every one of these plans to improve the human.

Since all the ills of mankind, they argue, follow from the exercise of free will, it follows that the only cure for these ills is to suppress free will and to compel the individual to behave in all things as per the perfect pattern devised by these improvers. Compulsion means force; there must be a policeman to see that the individual does not follow his own inclinations.

But policemen must live. Since they do not produce a thing by which they can live, others must support them. Hence, the planners must have the means of getting at the production of the very people who are to be improved by the policeman. That means taxes, and the more taxes the greater the number of enforcement agents, and therefore the most compre-hensive the plan. No plan can be

bigger than its bureaucracy.

The income tax is the ideal instrument for the planner. It not only enables him to exercise his imagination to the last dollar that can be taken from the producers -for their own improvement, of course-but it also weakens the will to resist the plan. The less property the individual has at his disposal, the less room there is for the exercise of his will. He must conform as a matter of necessity. That is to say, social power decreases as political power

The New Deal, or something like it, was planted when the Sixteenth Amendment was put into the Constitution. It needed only the fertilization of the depression to bring it to flower. Whatever politician happened to to be at the helm at the propitious moment would have done more or less what Mr. Roosevelt did. That is because the business he is in, politics, drives the politician toward the acquisition of more and more power, and a good politician is one who takes advantage of every contingency to increase his power. Mr. Roosevelt was an excellent politician.

Once socialism gets hold of a country, there seems to be nothing that will pry it loose except a complete collapse of the political setup, either as the result of a disastrous war or by way of revolution. The revolutionary way is the least promising, simply because under socialism the will to resist weakens in proportion to the people's adjustment to regulation, con trol, and domination. Because that is the only way to rub along, they make peace with the conditions imposed on them; they lose the habit of self-respect.

Thus, in this country it has become quite proper for bankers and industrialists to stand in the Washington line with "tin cups" in their hands, for veterans and the unemployed to press for handouts, for farmers to expect subsidies, for the educational fraternity and the ministry to maintain bountybegging lobbies. All this is the regular order of things; freedom, which demands self-reliance, is out of style. If the miraculous politician should come along, and urge that all this paternalism should be abandoned, as well as the income tax, he would probably receive short shrift from the

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FIFTY-FIFTY BREAK FOR SMALL BUSINESS By DeWITT EMERY (Editor's Note: DeWitt Emery is

president of the National Small Business Men's Association.) An amendment to the Taft-Hartley Act, which should be of particu lar interest to all small business men all over the country, has recently been presented to the Labor mmittee of the House.

This amendment, which undoubtedly will be known as the "Samil Business Amendment," provides: When a strike is called and a picket line is set up, all of the pickets must be employees of the

company against which the strike is called, and each picket must have his company identification on his person while he is on the picket line - such identification to be shown on request to a police of-ficer, a representative of the Labor Board, or a representative of the company - non employee pickets and employee pickets who do not have company identification on their person while pickets subject to a mandatory fine of \$500

This amendment, of course, would apply to all companies and while it wouldn't mean much if anything to big companies employ ing thousands of workers, it would be of the greatest importance to

It would prevent the use of professional pickets - goons - and would prevent the unior from having twice as many people on the picket line as the company has employees. This happened to many were employees of the company. At the time of the strike the co pany had 57 employees This amendment provides a

much needed equalizer between big national unions and small employ ers. The small employer can take care of himself, can fight his own labor battles so long as he has only his own people and their represen-tative to deal with. But in far too many cases he doesn't have any chance at all when one of the big unions cracks down on him and he is forced to pit his limited resources against the unlimited resources of the union.

This amendment, or something very similar to it, is absolutely essential in order to give small employers the fifty-fifty break they are' entitled to in their dealings

with labor unions.

I think this amendment is pretty important. I have seen what im ported pickets can do to a small company particularly in a small town. I have seen picket lines maintained by outsiders - goons when more than 90 per cent of the employees of the struck plant wanted to go back to work. I have known such picketing to be kept up month after month until the company was forced into bankrupt cy. This doesn't make sense, except that some labor bosses do not want to mess around with small break the little fellows and help the oig companies to get bigger.

It seems to me that every small business man, whether he is a manufacturer, retailer, wholesaler or what have you, should be interested in doing all he can to get Congress to pass this amendment. If a considerable number of these small business men will write to their congressmen and senators, demanding passage of the S m a 1 Business Amendment to the Taft-Hartley Act, you may be sure that the amendment will be adopted.


