



## FHA Scandal

The current scandals in the Federal Housing Authority and the manner in which tantastic profits have been made through the operation of this government bureau bught to serve as new impetus for a campaign to get the government out of the housing business.

Certainly it comes as no surprise to those who have seen the folly of having government fooling around in activities it has no business in to learn that there has been irregularities and crookedness and graft. These are the natural consequences of such governmental activities and are one consideration to be kept in mind when the so-called good works of the FHA are paraded before

In this connection we ought to give some special consideration to the public housing program as well as the over-all general activities of the FHA in connection with loaning money for private construction. One bit of practical information that a great many people who speak well of the idea of FHA financing seem to forget is that the American people like to make money. And if the financing that has been done by FHA was such a good deal that "everyone" is in favor of it, there would have been available private capital to do all of the financing. It is proof within itself that FHA guarantees of various types of loans were unsound in many instances and the taxpayers left holding the bag for had they been sound financial ventures private capital would have jumped at the chance to take care of the

All of this is better illustrated in the instance of public housing for which there is no excuse. As Ronald J. Chinnock, president of the National Association of Real Estate Boards, pointed out recently, public housing is bad because it is:

A failure in housing the families in greatest need.

A special privilege and a political racket. A Russian custom which, in that country, has destroyed freedom and home life in the cities and on the farms. A new kind of "ahetto" which herds problem families

together and accentuates their difficulties. An unfair tax on those who save and struggle to pro-

vide their own homes. Chinnock adds that the new federal housing law permits any community to vote out its public housing if it assumes responsibility for the outstanding bonded debt involved. Since most public housing projects can now be -sold to their occupants or investors for more than the original cost the bonds can be paid off and the vicious

grip of the housing authority in Washington can now be Naturally such a procedure will be met with violent opposition by the public housing boys who are making a good thing out of it. So-called liberals will scream to high heaven against what they hold to be the loss of 'social gains," and there will be name-calling aplenty. But the fight to rid ourselves of public housing is one that can be won if we have the courage and will to fight for property rights and the American system of free



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
