General Assembly Convenes Tuesday

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 20 -UP- Red China served notice on the West in general and the United States in particular Monday that she will make a formal and determined bid for United Nations membership in the ninth General Assembly session, opening here Tuesday.

The Chinese Communist regime stated its intentions in an official Peiping radio broadcast.

Soviet Russia, which will be Red China's principal support in the fight for UN recognition, promptly backed the Chinese plan in an article in the Soviet Communist party paper, Pravda.

Charge U.S. Policy Both charged that only "the aburd obstructionist policy of the United States blocks Red China's membership' in the world body. Neither the announcement of Chinese intentions nor the propaganda blasts came as any surprise.

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# Fight All Statism

A very nice lady from London Bridge, Virginia, writes us about our editorial "Don't Outlaw Reds."

We knew when we wrote this that the strongest objections would come from people who are otherwise on the side of freedom.

The gracious lady from London Bridge avows that we have been at war with Russia ever since Roosevelt so arranged affairs.

But the fact is that the many people who still support the New Deal which includes not only Roosevelt's family. but Dewey, Dodge, Stassen, Sherman Adams, Adlai Stevenson, and even lke himself, do not recognize that we are at war with Russia.

Whether the war is cold or hot (as it was in Korea) the fact is that we cannot afford to encourage politicians to ignore the Constitution.

The Constitution says that only Congress can declare war. In the absence of a legal decharation of war any law which assumes that we are at war must be considered illegal and unconstitutional.

The only constitutional method of outlawing Reds is to declare war on Russia.

The worst thing about asking Eisenhower's government to outlaw Reds is that we are fastening the blame for all our troubles on Reds. Our correspondent says "Communism affects us more seriously than Socialism."

Let's consider this for a moment.

Many economists, including the staff of the Foundation for Economic Education, believe that one of the greatest threats to the United States is the income tax, which was pushed through by the Republican party in 1913.

Frank Chodorov, one of our favorite anti-Communist writers, goes so far as to call the income tax the "Root of All Evil" in his book by that name

This pernicious tax, as well as Social Security, and most of the rest of the New Deal, was passed because Congress felt that the people wanted it that way, Ike asked that ten million more persons, including farmers. and doctors, be forced to pay Social Security tax on wages.

cluded in "social security" "It seems to be generally accepted that the system referred to as Social Security, 1s not insurance. It is patently not secure,

and there is serious doubt if there is anything 'social' about it, except that it has-in every nation-led to, and been a most important part of the imposition of Social-ism upon the people. So there will be no doubt about

my meaning, permit me to quote Webster, Socialism is defined as -'A political and economic theory of social organization based on collective or governmental ownership and democratic man-agement of the essential means for the production and distribution of goods; socialism-favors extension of government action." "We are told now that the groups presently 'excluded' should be brought into the Social Security system, to pay their rightful share of a welfare program for all. We reject this type of thinking. It is false. It is a mask for the acceptance of the communist idea of the redistribution of wealth, as a number of the proponents have admitted that most of the professionals will never claim one 'benefit' from the program. This last group is, in es-

sence, regarded as a source of funds to attempt to salvage an impossible, actuarially unsound system of federal grants. It is no less than another tax, a very poorly disguised and unfair 'class discrimination' tax at that. "The intent of the Social Se-

curity Law is clear. It is to make everyone a ward of the government, destroy personal respon-sibility and incentive, and to be an agent in the process of 'levelling.

"In the publication 'Social Security Financing,' published by the Social Security Administration in Bureau Report No. 17, 1952, frequent reference is made to acceptance of this principle and it is plainly stated and admitled in a number of places in that publication that one of the principal features of universal

Social Security involves the redistribution of wealth. 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

Outlawing the Communist party will not get rid of one drop of Socialism which our popular (?) President favors.

The income tax, the New Deal, our needless involvement in three wars in this century, did not result primarily from Russian Communist activity. They resulted from the blunders and/or evil. intentions of apparently benign humanitarians who believe in the philosophy of Statism.

Statism is our greatest danger, whether it be called Communism, Socialism or New Dealism. But asking a Statist New Deal government to outlaw its chief competitor, the Red Russian Communists, will not remove the danger of Statism.

Our correspondent suggests that Socialism should be abandoned. She did not use the word "outlawed." Why not?

Isn't it because it is obvious that particularly when our highest officials believe in it?

Suppose the Communists resigned in order to join the Socialist party.

How would be go about outlawing Socialism?

Yet more harm has been done by the Socialists (who didn't realize that they were Socialists) who put over the income tax, the New Deal, and involved us in war, than has been done to us by the Red Russian Communists.

We are not defending the Communists. But outlawing them will not win us a single victory in the war of ideas. To win this war we must ultimately defeat all shades of collectivism, from that believed in by Ike at one end, to that believed in by the Reds at the other end. Passing laws which give more power to a socialistic government will advance Statism by giving it power to outlaw competitors. And, as J. Edgar Hoover says, outlawing Reds will not prevent the spread of Communism.


