# Mystery **Figure** Indicted

Henry Grunewald Accused Of Perjury

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21 -UP-The Justice Department announced Tuesday that a federal grand jury in Brooklyn, N. Y., has indicted Henry W. (The Dutchman) Grune. wald on perjury charges.

The indictment charged that Grunewald in 1952 lied five times before a Brooklyn grand jury which was investigating crime and corruption in the Internal Revenue

Grunewald, so-called Washington mystery man and alleged influence peddler, already is under indictment here on 10 counts of perjury A local grand jury charged that he lied 10 times in testimony before a grand jury here and before a House Ways & Means subcommittee investigating tax scandals.

Trial Set for Nov. 15 Grunewald's trial in the District of Columbia case has been set for

Nov. 15. Conviction of perjury charges carries a maximum penalty of \$2,000 fine and five years impris-

Tuesday's indictment was returned to U. S. District Judge Mortimer W. Byers in Brooklyn. The five counts charged that Grunewald lied when he testified before the grand jury that:

1. He never received any money for exerting any influence on government officials in connection with tax cases.

2. He never heard of the tax case involving Pattullo Modes Inc., a New York dress firm, until he read a newspaper item about it. 3. He was not instrumental in averting criminal prosecutions in tax cases.

(Continued from page one) other elemental isotopes are "made" by transmutation in vnuclear reactors, they're dangerous because they're both radio-active and, being elements, are practically indestructible.

Dangerous Waste Elements No atomic scientist doubts that the day will come when nuclear reactors will provide the power for industry, for transportation, for just the ordinary living of ordinary people. When the day comes there will be large and everincreasing quantities of these dangerous and indestructible "waste" elements.

Drs. John H. Rediske, A. A. Selders, and their associates in the vegetable laboratories at Hanford are "feeding" these elements to kidney beans - and to tomatoes, wheat, thistle, and barley. Because each chemical step in their growth and maturing is precisely control-led, the scientists can measure precisely what each "waste" element does to the plants and - more important - what the plants do with the "waste" element.

How much of each element do the plants "take up - how radioactive do the plants become? That is the vital question. In making use of the vast potentials for easier, better living in atomic en-ergy, man would lose if he contaminated his earth with atomic "waste" elements. In the shape of things to come, that will be a problem. Rediske and Selders are getting the answers ready now.





BETTER JOBS By R. C. HOILES

How Lucky Are Our School Children?

Dr. George S. Benson, president of Harding College at Searcy, Ar-kansas, who sends out a column when she said most of our trou-ble comes from "good people."

In a column recently sent out, Dr. Benson reiterates and reitercontends among other things that admits that many things need to be corrected or improved, in our school system, but he seems to think the test of education is whether it is better than any other educational system in the world.

> He uses other government schools as a stardard rather than God's laws as set down by Jesus. The question is not whether it is better than other educational systems, but it is a question of whether a tax-supported school system is in agreement with the Golden Rule and whether it is doing a job to promote beliefs in the responsibility of the individual and his inalienable rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. If we judge from how rapidly we are losing more and more of our liberty, it certainly is not a

good educational system. In fact, it is not an educational system at all-it is only a system of training, of indoctrinating the youth of the land to believe in security rather than liberty. It certainly is not as good an educational system as we had in the United States before most states had compulsory school attendance laws. Then we had competition in education. Now the children are the wards of the state rather than of their parents in most every state in the union. As evidence of this, re-member the case of Mrs. William Turner who wanted to educate her own children and was fined in California for her attempt and the-Supreme Court refused to hear an Appeal. She is now in Arizona and the educational hierarchy in that state is determined that she shall not have the right to educate her

own children there. Does Dr. Benson believe that a training that violates the Golden Rule can produce results that are in agreement with the Golden Rule? And if Dr. Benson does not think our educational system violates the Golden Rule, let him answer these questions:

1. Would it be a violation of the Golden Rule for one individual, say John Smith, to set up a school and coerce another individual, say Bob Jones, either to pay a fee for

Smith's school or leave town? 2. If it is a violation of the Golden Rule for John Smith to coerce Bob Jones to help pay for Smith's for one group, say Group A, to group, say Group B, to either help pay to support Group A's school or leave town?

3. In question 2. Group A could be a majority or it could be a minority. If it is a violation of the Golden Rule for a minority to coerce the majority either to pay a fee or leave town, why isn't it a violation of the Golden Rule for a majority to coerce a minority either pay a fee or leave town? Of course, Dr. Benson will not answer these questions wthout evasion because if he did he would prove that tax-supported schools do violate the Golden Rule. So, Dr. Benson must believe that a school system in order to 'good'' does not need to be in harmony with the Golden Rule. He must believe that an evil tree produces good fruits. He must believe that we can correct a prac-

tice that violates the Golden Rule. Dr. Benson hammers away on the freedom in our American system. But we had infinitely more freedom in American before we had compulsory attendance at public schools. Then the National Education Association didn't have a strangle hold on the youth of the land. Then parents were responsible for the education of their children and not the state, as is the case in most every state in

Somehow youths have become convinced that no large opening to a successful life is available to the fellow who does not have a college diploma. So the rush to college halls has grown. We have acquired the notion

that colleges make smart men. Yet, Lincoln, Washington and Benjamin Franklin, to mention a few of our greatest minds, never went to college. Over in England Shakespeare triumphed without the help of a Bachelor's sheepskin. No professor of literature could teach him how to write, With this increasing rush to college halls it is pertinent to ask how smart have our colleges made us? Men who make work for work-

If you want to build muscle, go pitch hay, swing an axe, or go to a gymnasium and work on the vaulting horse or the parallel bars





By HOWARD WILSON OKLAHOMA CITY, Sept. 21 that from its top you could look down, not up, at the Empire State

The needle-like tower of station ("world's tallest viedo") rises 1,572 feet into the Oklahoma sky and ranks as the tallest manmade structure on earth.

But the Empire State building, though 100 feet shorter, is still a etter tourist attraction. After a trip to the top of the KWTV tower it is possible to report that as a perch for sightseeing it is stricly

An elevator was built into the lower so workmen wouldn't have spend most of their time climbing the slender framework. The two-foot by two-foot elevator cage whooshes the passenger up to a narrow steel beam that seems closer to heaven than to earth. The Steel Sings

The wind sings the steel. The desire to hug the nearest crossbeam with both arms is irresist-

But workmen fitting together the final connections for television transmission climb about with unstudied nonchalance, They don't

use safety belts. "When you have to move around a belt gets in your way," explained Eddie G. Bures, one of the highaltitude construction men.

KWTV began using its \$650,000 tower Sunday on a reduced-power basis. The station expects to turn its full 50,000 watts of power into the antenna in a week or 10 days, and hopes its picture will then jump crystal-clear into TV receiv-"in the far corners of Oklaho-

KWTV General Manager Edgar T. Bell said the station built such a high tower not to set any building record but to provide greater coverage for the station,

"We're especially concerned with bringing the urban and rural families in the state the informative, educational type of programs as well as the finest entertainment," he said.

The station expects good reception beyond a 100-mile radius of the tower, although the line-of-sight mileage from the top to the horison is about 60 miles.

### Dope Squad Nabs Hormel Heir


