WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 -UP- Prospects that President Eisenhower will propose a general income tax cut next year dimmed Wednesday with disclosure that the Treasury probably will have to ask Congress for another hike in the federal debt limit.

But the administration is expected to seek revisions in the tax laws which would benefit certain persons, such as those receiving retirement income not covered by pension plans or income from for-

eign investments. Other tax changes under study by administration experts would affect business mainly. They include revisions in tax treatment of capital gains and losses and of co-operatives and tax-exempt organizations, and oil and mining depletion allowances



On Sunday a syndicated column with wide circulation neaded "Washington, D. C. the City Which Makes up Your Mind for You" appeared on the subject of something the late Senator Maybank told the people.

It should be a source of delight to all who believe with the "liberals" that salvation lies down the road of more . . then a little more, political ownership and management of man's enterprise and woman's purchasing power.

From all this we are supposed to draw the stock inference in this kind of socialist propaganda.

The inference is this:

When people of a wicked, wicked group have taken the trouble to save a few bucks, get together privately and risk their money in a pool of corporate shares and from there on hire engineers and contractors to develop a piece of property . . . then the philosopher, the humanitarian and the poet can only take down their hair and

For when they hire people to send - for example electricity throbbing out over the high-lines, no home owner, no farmer, no industrialist, no wage earner gets any possible benefit.

"A veto-proof method has at last been evolved for bringing a collective defense program into being by recommendations passed by a two-thirds vote of the General Assembly, When, as, and if aggression occurs in the future. we will no longer be paralyzed by the Communist abuse of the

But since each one of the 60 nations has one vote in the General Assembly, then the larger nations or the nations that believe in a government with the consent of the governed, can be forced into action by a small percentage of the total population of the 60 nations. Each nation has five delegates, but has only one vote in the General Assembly, thus two-thirds of the nations can determine whether we have general war or not. It is not based on principles, but based on twothirds of the votes of the different nations.

In the next paragraph, Ambassador Lodge, as he calls himself, refers to:

"The existence of a common sense of justice, which means a common sense of right and wrong and a common view of the relation of the individual to his government."

Where in the world does he get the idea that we have a common sense of justice and a common view of the relation of the individual to his government, when ve have nations like Russia based n the theory that might makes right? How can there be a comnon view of the relation of the individual to his government if the United States is to take the view as set forth in the Declaration of Independence that "governments derive their just powers from the consent of the governed"? Most of the other nations have the concept that the individual is the servant of the state rather than that the state is the servant of the individual.

than it has ever been, Lodge also says that the United Nations is not a world government and that it cannot impose taxes of any kind and cannot draft a single soldier from any country for service in Korea or elsewhere. But the UN can assess a certain amount of money that each nation must pay. While it doesn't have the power to say how each nation should raise the money, it has the power to assess us all collectively.

Lodge harps on the fact that the United States cannot exist without supplies far in excess of what it can produce. In the September issue of U.S.A. a survey was reported that showed that the Americans can produce everything we need for defense and we do not need a UN in order to get supplies from the Americas, let alone other parts of the world.

Lodge contends that there is great need for the UN. He says: "This explains why men of good will throughout the world would be straining every nerve to create even the imperfect device which we have now if the United Na-

tions did not exist." That is an arbitrary statement not based on any evidence, I know of no men of good will who will answer questions without evasion who would be "training every nerve" to create a UN. 
