NATO To Probe **Explosion**

Missile Fuel Dump Blast Kills Thirty

BITBURG, Ger., Sept. 24 -UP- The North Atlantic Treaty Organization assigned investigators Friday to determine whether an explosion at a U. S. guided missile base means the Allies must revamp safety factors in their Europe-wide pipeline and fuel storage

NATO council headquarters in Paris said pipeline experts would go to Germany to assist on the spot investigators to find out why a safety test Thursday backfired into West Germany's second biggest postwar explosion disaster.

Thirty persons died in the blast that ripped the U.S. Matador guided missile base here. Five to 40 persons were missing and German authorities said "about 30" were hospitalized, 10 in critical condi-

Stupid Are We?

A few days ago a man named William A. Kimbel, a public relations director for a South Carolina firm, returned home from a Geneva meeting of the United Nations Economic and Social Council and pontificated that Americans criticize the UN because they neither understand it nor know how much it is accomplishing.

The only interpretation that can be placed on Mr. Kimbel's remarks is that the American citizen does not understand the English language and is completely barren of historical knowledge.

Let us briefly dally with Mr. Kimbel and his remarks since they echo arguments you will hear from almost any advocate of UN.

What is the meaning of the UN's Declaration of Human Rights which in one article sets forth: "Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of his family . . . and the right to security . . . " that we don't understand?

"Everyone" in this article doesn't mean every citizen of the United States. It means, at the very least, everyone in the nations affiliated with the UN. So we are confronted with the contention that the objective of the UN is to guarantee a healthy standard of living to practically everyone in the world regardless of personal habits or individual intelligence and initiative. And the guarantee is not qualified to the point that "everyone" should be free to seek such a standard of living. It sets forth plainly enough that everyone has the "right" to it.

As a practical measure that means if "one" is not ingenious enough individually to achieve this standard it must be provided somehow. And that in-furn means that the margin of difference must be taken from someone

The American citizen knows what that means. He knows that he has been living himself in a welfare state for many years and that roughly one-third of his production is now being taken by the government in taxes for distribution among others — for public charity at home and abroad, for defense of his own and foreign lands and for operation of functions which he may or may not ap-

Now it is granted that the American citizen is a citizen of one of the few lands in the world where the individual can and will produce enough to provide his own healthy standard of living and to still pay levies for the help of others. In other lands most of the citizenry manages to produce barely enough for their own needs and never enough to give any away.

So it would appear that the UN asserted "right" of an "adequate" standard of living and security would place its heaviest burden upon the children of Uncle Sam and even there resting would be an absurdity unless we are to abandon our own living standards.

So we think that we know at least one purpose of the *Ut1... and that is to IMPOVERISH the United States.

Mr. Kimbal denies that there is any intent in UN philosophy to create world government. Our present American system of taxation is now running point blank against resistance from those faxed and theoretically at least our level of taxation is for our own "public good." How would Mr. Kimbel et al persuade the American taxpover to distribute the results of his production further except by force and how else could that force be exerted except by an agency superseding our own elected representatives who as silly as they sometimes are draw a pretty fine line on how far they can go in levying taxes which is the only method ever yet devised by man to "guarantee" payments for such services as the UN pro-

Furthermore, Mr. Kimbel hangs himself on the basis of historical precedent with his comparison of the UN's work with developments in the United States. He sets forth that in the early days of the United States there was no centralized government "to integrate over-lapping in-

A good many of us contend there was an adequate federal government in this land to serve all necessary purposes. What we had to do was to create a strong central bureaucracy - primarily through the income tax mendment - in order to destroy the principle of State's Cights which was one of the foundation stones of individual freedom. 
