

Could you please tell me what personal information is needed to obtain a passport.

Is it necessary to have a birth certificate or a photostatic copy of one? I was born in New York City and as I don't have my original copy where can I write to have one made.

Dear Mrs. R. G.

An applicant for a passpor must appear in person before a clerk of a federal court or a state court authorized to naturalize aliens, or before a passport agent of the Department of State.

A native American citizen must submit a birth certificate, or a baptismal certificate, or a certified copy of the record of baptism. If mit an affidavit made by a parent, brother, sister or other relative, or by the physician at his birth, or by a reputable person, giving name, date and place of birth.

A naturalized citizen must submit a certificate of naturalization. U.S. citizens visiting Mexico for a pleasure trip need only a tourist card which may be obtained from a Mexican consulate. Citizens only need carry evidence of U.S. citizenship in visiting Canada.





# Longer Life

Langevity of America's wage earners and their fam-Ilies has reached an all-time high.

The average length of life, based on mortality pre-vailing in 1953, climbed to 68.9 years for the industrial group, climaxing a decade of successive gains during which their average lifetime increased by five years.

The expectation of life in this group has been rising for more than two generations. Based on mortality in 1879-1889, the average lifetime was only 34 years. By 1909 it was 46.3 years, which was a gain of one-half year of life for each calendar year - a record which has been maintained since that time.

The achievements in life conservation are under-scored by the very low death rates now prevailing among children and young adults. The death rate among the industrial class as a whole is now less than one per 1,000 at ages 3 to 19, and remains under three per 1,000 until age 40 and under 10 per 1,000 until age 53. Only 10 years ago the death rates in the 15 to 35 age group were about twice those currently experienced.

The long-term ingrease in the average length of life of American wage-earners and their families has been due in large measure to the control of infectious diseases, statisticians believe. The cardiovascular diseases and cancer have now come to be responsible for over twothirds of all deaths. The magnitude of future gains in langevity will depend chiefly on the success of efforts directed against these diseases.

No "McCarthyism" is involved, and this must be a severe blow to those who refer to talk about McCarthyism rather than McBrownellism or McFlanderism.

"I see disturbing indications that our armed forces have been subjected to a carefully planned Communist campaign working through many channels, to weaken our military strength so far as it could be done without detection, and to separate it as far as possible from Congress.

'We have learned what hidden Communists did to our foreign policy agencies. We have not spelled out what they did to our military

#### THE SENATOR STATES HIS REMEDY

"I want something very simple. I want to cut the silken threads which tie our Defense establishment to any policy or agency except Defense. I want our military to work at one problem only -how can we best protect the United States, today?

"I do not want our military to be limited to explaining how to defend the United States within the framework of alliances and global commitments made by Hopkins, Acheson, White and Hiss. I want the President, the Secretary of De-fense, and our military experts to prepare the best possible plan for delense of our country, without reierence to existing foreign policy commitments, and to report the results to Congress and the people. ."

AND THEN THE SENATOR CONCLUDED:

"We are still bound by the commitments these men made, in the UN Charter. We have put the Pan American Union, defense of the defend itself if the UN including the Soviet Union, says its desire for independence is not 'peace.
