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#### WARM WORDS AT LAKE SUCCESS

It might have been the heat or it might have been the humidity. Perhaps it was the result of a concerted decision. Or maybe they just got fed up. Anyway, some representatives of the United States, Great Britain and Australia really got together and teed off on the spokesmen of Russia and her satellites at Lake Success the other day.

There is nothing elevating in the spectacle of government representatives getting angry and calling names. Against the background of recent events at Lake Success, the spectacle might even be a little frightening. But we can't say we blame the gentlemen from the Englishspeaking nations.

At a meeting on Albania's UN membership, Chief Dep uty Alexei Krosilnikov made a typical Russian-type speech. Then Britain's Valentine Lawford blew off steam. "It is deplorable," he said, "that we should be subjected day after day, week after week, month after month, to all this junk about provocations, lies, noises and repetitions.

That's not diplomatic language. But it probably better expressed some feelings that before have been expressed more elegantly, or else suppressed.

In the Security Council meeting the Communist bloc had complained that "monarcho-fascism" is rampant in Greece. Then America's Herschel Johnson had his sayand it seems to us that what he said has needed saying in the Russian and Balkan representatives' presence for a long time.

"Dictatorship is dictatorship," he told them, "no matter what name you call it." He explained that his government held no brief for the Greek government, but that Greece was no menace to international peace "and we think her three northern neighbors are." He added that there was not "the slightest evidence" of civil liberties to be found inside those neighbors' borders.

Testy Colonel Hodgson of Australia had something to say after the Krasilnikov speech on Albania, too. "I am glad these meetings are now open to the press," he said. "In the past the delegations here . . . have had to put with calculated abuse and distortions" from the Soviet repre sentative.

But perhaps the best thrust was got in by Mr. Lawford, who said, "We are presumed to be a gathering of intelligent officials, not a gathering of illiterates. We draw our conclusions from facts, not from catchwords."

Any non-Communist who has ever engaged in argument with one of the well-schooled comrades will know what Mr. Lawford meant. The comrades enter the list armed with a vocabulary of mumbo-jumbo and catchwords. They turn aside an opponent's argument by ignoring it and hurling a new accusation couched in the Marxist-Leninist-Stalinist double-talk of the moment.

It's most irritating. And it must be particularly irritating to the UN members, for the Communist delegates are post-graduate masters of their trade. One has only to read the speeches of Mr. Gromyko and his staff to catch the sneering condescension, the cool insult, and the smug sense of rightness that will admit of no question.

We don't wonder that their intelligent colleagues finally blew up and talked straight talk. It may not improve international relations, but it might clear the air. It might also give the Russians and their followers an idea that there is a limit to which taunts and goadings will be endured.
