



Why I Believe Labor Unions Keep Wage Levels Down

Since the belief is very generally held in recent years that labor unions can raise real wage levels and since it is such a pleasant belief that wages can be raised by collective action without increasing production, I want to try to cal manner how labor unions that arrive at wages by strikes or threats of strikes keep wage levels down rather than raise wage levels. I will try to establish truisms nd class or facts and then reason from these

The starting premise is that total wages cannot permanently be greater than total production. Does anyone dispute that fact?

Now, if the premise is true that total wages cannot be permanently greater than total production, then it follows logically that anything that reduces total production must eventually of necessity reduce total wages. If thi be true, then if we demonstrate that labor unions that try to establish wages by strikes or threats of strikes retred production, then it is logical to conclude that the total real wages must of necessity be less. Now I want to name some of

the reasons why tabor unions retard production: They retard total production when men are idle because of

strikes. Certainly no one would de-

They retard production by limiting hours. That is, by making an employer pay extra for overtime. They retard production by seniority - by keeping the least efficient man operating a machine when a more capable man could produce more. Thus they reduce They retard production by doing

work that is not useful to any individual. This is commonly known come into the union shop in plate or mat form. by minimum wages that keep the slow and inefficient workers from being able to learn a trade or even get a job of any kind.

The reason arbitrary wages cause unemployment is that busiof labor where both parties believe ty's wages gets so high that the other worker does not believe he is benefitted by trading his labor with the other high wage worker, then we have unemployment. That is true because men do not buy things when they do not think they

save them labor. The real wages, or the real stanone would perish if labor was not exchanged, and to the degree that we have a free division of labor, where there is no obstacle for the man changing jobs and finding the job that uses his talents to the best advantage, to that degree will production increase. 

Here is declarer's full line of reasoning: If East started with only two small trumps he would have some reason to hope that his partner could overruff the dummy on a third round of spades. Therefore East would lead a third spade if he had only two small trumps.

If East has the queen of trumps, however, he knows that his partner cannot overruff dummy's ten. (If West happens to hold the jack of hearts, it doesn't matter what East does, since the queen of hearts will then surely provide the setting trick.)

East will carefully avoid leading a third round of spades since he will not want to make it clear to declarer that West cannot overruff the Dummy.

It was therefore clear that East

had the queen of trumps.



An estimated \$600 million will go into the hands of forgers, kiters and counterfeiters.

The Todd Co. of Rochester, which manufactures, protective check machines, has surveyed po lice departments in 98 cites and found that arrests for check fraud in 1953 jumped 11 per cent over 1953 and this year's rate is running still higher,

The crooks range from who carefully counterfeit the pay roll checks of well-known compa nies to the more primitive type who brazenly draw checks on an account in "The East Bank of the Mississippi.

George W. Adlam, head of Todd's insurance department, said the increase in bad check losses is no credit to the skill of the criminals but a result simply of more widespread use of

The "special checking account" which requires no minimum balance has flooded the country with checkbooks, Todd's researchers estimate' between 90 and 95 per cent of all financial transactions now are handled by check and 14 million of them change hands ev-

"Check fraud is probably the easiest crime to commit," a Los Angeles police official said recent-"If a man tenders a bad check to a merchant and the merchant refuses to cash it, the man just walks out and tries somewhere else. There's nobody shooting at

The Rochester firm says it has found that no more than a third of the merchants in most cities demand proper identification before cashing a check. And 9nly a third of those cheated ever do anything about it.

"Such carelessness invites newcomers to the game," Adlam said. "I've seen piles of unreported bad checks stuffed in drawers at supermarkets. They seem to be willing to write off the loss as part

of the overhead." While many "pros" work the clack game regularly, 54 per cent of the persons arrested for check fraud in 1953 were first offenders. Almost a fifth of them were wom-

en. Many were juveniles, Department stores are the most frequent victims of check artists. Supermarkets come next, followed by liquor stores, taverns and independent groceries. Some 85 per cent of last year's bad checks inced into these four types of
