The Amendments

AMENDMENT NO. 5

This measure would give the State Legislature the right to fix the salaries of the governor, attorney generol, treasurer of the General Land Office, comptroller of public accounts and the secretary of state and would approve a raise in the pay of the members of the legisla-

At present the annual salaries of the state's top officials are set by the Constitution. It provides that the governor draw \$12,000, the attorney general \$10.-000, and the comptroller, treasurer and secretary of state, \$6,000 each.

Members of the Texas Legislature are now drawing \$10 for the first 120 days and \$5 a day for the remainder of the session. The amendment provides \$25 for the first 120 days. The present solaries of the constitutional state of-

ficers were set at an election in 1936. Since that time, of course, the dollar has changed in value a time or two. In 1955, 26 states will be paying their governors more than Texas does. Gubernatorial pay ranges from \$4,500 in Maryland to \$30,000 in New Jersey.

Legislators over the nation are paid on two basesa fixed biennial salary or a per diem rate for a specified number of days per session.

In 1936, Texas' top officials and legislators were maybe overpaid, but they — particularly the legislators - are not well paid by today's standards.

AMENDMENT NO. 6

This plan would prohibit the use of state credit or grants of any public money for the construction, maintenance or operation of toll roads and turnpikes.

It is already prohibited by law, but members of the Legislature feel that the voters should be given the opportunity to place it in constitutional wording so, that it would clearly ban some future Legislature from assuming obligations in toll road matters.

It is felt that if the faith and credit of the state were made available to these projects, the temptation to undertake uneconomic projects would exist. Passage of this amendment would eliminate this possibility

AMENDMENT NO. 7

Passage of this amendment would see that women sit alongside the men in judgment of their fellow citizens by requiring them to serve on grand and petit juries.

This amendment has caused more street corner discussion than any of the others. There are plenty of men who don't feel that it is a woman's place to sit on a jury and there are some women who feel the same way. These same fellows who believe the woman's place is not on a jury are not amazed to see them elbow at elbow in the taverns, puffing cigarets and pipes and holding down jobs just as capably as men — and believe it or not a woman can do it.

Perhaps behind this prejudice is the fear that a man might find himself confronted by 12 stern-faced gals ready to give him the works.

A survey has shown that 23 states have laws compelling women to serve on juries and 21 states and the District of Columbia have voluntary jury service laws which permit women to be excused solely on the basis of sex. Six states - all south of the Mason-Dixon Line - do not permit or require women to serve on juries.

This will be the last chance for some years to come for the gals to get themselves a seat on Texas juries. A similar amendment was defeated in 1949.

We feel that a woman is a citizen of this country, who now serves during wartime, and that she should meet the obligations of that citizenship, one of which is jury duty. Vote yes.

AMENDMENT NO. 8

The purpose of this amendment is to double the term of office of all elective district, county and precinct officers.

We are against this amendment because we believe that four years is too long a time to keep a sorry public afficial around. To the argument that a good official should have a longer term than two years, we believe that if he is good he will have little trouble being reelected. Most good officials, or officials whom the public thinks are good, are re-elected time and time again. Some of the sorrier ones are, too. This is a good one to vate against and talk against.

AMENDMENT NO. 9

This proposition would authorize the creation of county-wide hospital districts in Bexar, Dallas, El Paso, Galveston, Harris, Jefferson and Tarrant counties and authorize ad valorum taxes for support and operation of

This move would set up independent hospital districts which would serve to increase the complexity of local government.

If local government agencies continue to achieve independent status, the benefits of unification and coordination are lost. The independent agencies, instead of working together in using tax resources effectively, could osily become competitive for the tax dollar.

Although set up for the larger counties, it would serve as a precedent to follow later for the smaller counties. AMENDMENT NO. 10

These government interventionists state that their program will 'stimulate employment, production and consumption directly; affect powerfully the psychology of busiincrease man's productive power and provide old age security.

They recommend that the government take eight specific steps. The first, "the annual rate of Federal outlays should be increased." The second, "to promote current spending . . . reduce personal income taxes," particularly for those in the lower income brackets. They claim that a higher national debt is "highly desirable." The presumption is that the deficit would be financed by inflation.

"The third step, "Assurances should be given that the present liberal credit and monetary policy will be continued." That is, they desire the government to hold interest rates below free market rates. This would increase the demand for loans, which would be met by printing more money. This new and additional money would bid up prices and fool business men into thinking they were making boom profits when they were actually consuming their capital. The bust would come when they realized they could not replace their plants at their original prices. They would then have to charge still higher inflated prices. Sales would sag and sooner or later they would have to release large numbers of employees, producing goods for which consumers would not pay the real costs.

"The fourth step, "enlarge farm income while absorbing surpluses." They seem to advocate a continuance of paying farmers for growing food which cannot be so dat the cost of production and thus keeping farmers from producing things consumers consider more desirable than unsalable surpluses. "The fifth step. "Unemployment

compensation should be expanded to augment the buying power of those temporarily unemployed." In other words, they would encourage people to remain unemployed as solution to unemployment. The sixth step. "A higher minimum wage law is needed." These steps mean that job seekers, who would not be allowed to compete for the limited number of high paid jobs union shops, would be kept unorganized workers to being supported from tax collections until further inflation permitted emplovers to offer higher paper wages worth less than the minimum wage was, when originally anacted.

'The seventh step. "A comprehensive long - range housing program" which would include "subsidized housing" for middle as well as low income groups, who in their opinion cannot afford "a trus ly American standard of housing." All people would be asked to help pay for the housing of a privileged few. The eighth step, "A liberalized international trade policy" is one which liberal economists could accept, but they go on to ask that some types of foreign aid (be), enlarged, especially in underdeveloped areas." This is asking our politicians to rob American taxpayers of part of their purchasing power for the benefit of others abroad. This is neither a Christian nor a Constitutional function of our

"Such steps can but lead to economic ruin and regimentation. They would result in a great consumption and reduction of savings, further inflation of the dollar and the enthronement of economic controls which would remove the free market as the regulator of our economy. The demand and supply of goods and jobs could not be equated except by the methods of dictatorship. Of course, full employment could be maintained by the direct control of production and regimentation of all labor as was done in Hitler's Germany and is now done behind the iron curtain.

"The only way for free men to eliminate unemployment is to permit the free functioning of wages in an open market. The problem of unemployment, like all other economic problems, can best be solved by free market policies that encourage people to save and thus create more and better jobs, rather than by coercive policies that ruin free market prices and wages while destroying the very savings so necessary for increased productive employment. When new savings are put to work, they must of necessity increase the demand for workers. This increased de-




