'Judgement Day' For Administration **Texas Votes On Constitution Change**

Four Statewide Races Contested

United Press Staff Correspondent Eleven changes in Texas' constitution drew most of the attention Tuesday in a non-presidential election in which 500,000 persons were expected to vote.

There were contests in only a few races-four statewide, three in congressional districts and a scattered handful for county and local offices across the state.



by adding different minerals and metal oxides to colorless glass They are granulated, washed and made into a paste, which then is applied to the prepared copper bracelet, rings, belt buckles and uch, in the desired design.

The jewelry next goes into the kiln for three or four minutes of firing at about 1,500 degrees. The Austrians revived the pro cess just before World War I, and Americans learned the art from the Austrians.







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On Freedom

"At no time in the history of the world was there ever a crisis as far-reaching and destructive as the current struggle between communism and freedom. The current crisis includes more people. it comprehends more vital issues: it will determine whether the people of the world are to be free or slaves.

"The place of the United States among the peoples of the world makes it imperative for American education to take a long, careful look ahead. Let it be repeated again and again, that the education and training of this generation of children and youth now in our schools could determine the outcome for the freedom of mankind. The big question is: Can Aemrican schools educate and train a generation of men and women who will keep the United States the strongest nation in the world in resources and character?

"Can there be any doubt that freedom is the supreme issue of education and our increased responsibility to teach and train for strong character and well-informed trustworthy citizenship? Some things we can do better than we have been doing."

Such an approach might be suggested in another editorial appearing in this column any day for we have been saying, in season and out, that the real issue is freedom insofar as the teaching of our children is concerned. Thus it is interesting to note that the above quotation is not taken from some Pampa News editorial but is from Lee L. Caldwell, superindentent of schools in Hammond, Ind., before a convention of public school teachers.

Superintendent Caldwell then went on to say: "A better understanding and appreciation of the meaning of 'human freedom' is needed. We need to consider (a) what is freedom — for me, for you, for others? (b) What is its source? Is it God-given or only a concept of the human mind?"

School Survey Shows Results Just As Could Be Expected

Mix J. Bird, Manager of External Affairs of the United States Chamber of Commerce, made some statements in a Los Angeles talk that should be startling to those who believe in tax-supported schools. They are not startling, however, to those who have made some study of the kind of education that has to be taught in schools that are subsidized by the state. Only 39 Per Cent For Profit Motive

Mr. Bird reported that in a survey of 1280 high schools made by the Opinion Research Corporation only 39 per cent of the seniors surveyed felt that keeping the profit

incentive alive is necessary to a sound economy. In other words, 61 per cent did not believe that the profit motive is necessary; they must then believe in some form of a government planned economy. Another 55 per cent of those questioned think that the socialist doctrine of "from each according to his ability and to each according to his needs" is better than the current American system. Of course, that is rather a loaded question because our current American system uses so much of what Karl Marx advocated as to what the government should do that the students were naturally confused. It is because the government has interfered with an unhampered market by discriminatory labor laws and discriminatory taxation, protective tariffs and immigration quotas, and by subsidizing farmers and "educators" and government bureaucrats, and is attempting to


control the value of money and credit, that we do not really have the American system. And it is due to these interferences with a free economy that we have had long periods of unemployment, one war after another and most people scared to death about their financial security, let alone military se-

curity. As a whole, the results are just as every individual who will answer questions without evasion about the



Too Late

If Douglas R. Stringfellow, congressman, had been Douglas R. Stringfellow, writer, his fertile imagination could have made him a wealthy man. For he made up a "cloak and dagger" tale which had all the essential ingredients for a best-selling novel or movie.

The story concerned the leader of a World War II parachute mission, which captured a German scientist thought to be working on A-bombs. The mission came off successfully, but the 38 men who made it - all of them O.S.S. men - later were caught by the Nazis. They were taken to concentration camps where they underwent weeks of torture.

Only one of the agents survived - the young, heroic leader, who managed a thrilling escape.

But Stringfellow wasn't a writer. He did not put his tale on paper, but instead tried to bring to life, with himself as the fabulous hero. And finally it grew so big that it turned out to be a Frankenstein monster.

During the past nine years, he told the story again and again, and it made him a famous young man. In 1952, Republican friends in Utah ran him for U.S. Congress and he won the race in a walk. The Junior Chamber of Commerce named him as one of America's "Ten Outstanding Young Men." A high-ranking national tele-vision show re-enacted his life for many millions of viewers.

Now, as the nation knows, his lie has at last been exposed. When the hoax was challenged in print, he tried, at first to defend himself, even asking the President to prove that the tale was true by opening secret files. But the pressure became too great and Stringfellow finally cracked.

He now has confessed in public that none of the stories were true and stands withdrawn from the coming election. He simply "fell into a trap," he says, which was laid by his own "glib tongue."

According to news reports, the reaction has been tremendous, with most of it "sympathetic." Hundreds of Utah voters are said to admire Stringfellow's "courage" in admitting his falsehoods publicly.

can prevent competition that they can raise the wages of those in this group. The question that they overlook is what it does to those outside of the group. What it does to the customer or to the stockholder who has furnished the tools. It is rather easy to see that people will not furnish tools unless they get some reward for furnishing tools and there must be an incentive for saving and investing. If the price is simply raised and the consumer pays the extra cost, it is easy to see that the other consumers, who are workers, have their standard of living lowered because of these special monopoly wages.

From Rich Stockholders So the labor unions and the ad-


vocates of collective bargaining and a closed shop like to leave the impression that these extra wages that labor unions get come from the pocket of the rich stockholders - that they have more money than they need and therefore "anything goes" in reducing their share of the production. Now let's analyze three of the larger companies to see how rich the average stockholder is.

Take the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. It has over 46 million shares of stock. It has 1,293,000 stockholders. That lets each stockholder own 36 shares of stock. This stock is selling for about \$170 a share, thus the average investment of American Telephone and Telegraph stock is worth \$6.120

Or take U. S. Steel. It has over 26 million shares of common stock. It has 230,048 owners of common stock, thus their average holdings



Outgoing Congressman Stringfellow hardly deserves "sympathy" - what he merits, instead, is "pity." For he set out to add embellishment where no embellishment was needed.

He was good-looking, young and personable. He had given his country much as an infantry soldier in France, becoming a paraplegic from a battlefield land mine explosion. With his excellent record and talents, he undoubtedly could have gone for in whatever field he entered - especially public service.

But Stringfellow chose, instead, to live out a terrible lie. By trying to be what he wasn't, all he succeeded in doing was shattering that which he was. And in this man's tragic mistake, there are clearly lessons for all.

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
