

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 UP-Government economists said Tuesin 1955 which may rank second to 1953's record peak.

in the same period of 1953. Overall dividend payments, including non-reporting firms, were-believed to total about \$10.5 bil lions for the 10-month period,

The construction estimate was contained in a joint report by thecommerce and labor departments which predicted that a record \$27.4billions will be spent for private building and a record \$12.1 billions. for public construction

The report cautioned, however, that the forecast was "based on the assumption" that building costs and the "general level of economic activity, will remain relatively stable, and disposable income of consumers will continue at a record rate."







No Other Round

With all of the election shouting over, we are not one whit better off insofar as our relationships with the United Nations is concerned and probably have gone deeper into the mess that is the UN.

There are many siren voices now in America who are actively seeking to exploit our people into a crass sysinternational serfdom.

They intend this to be centered in a frightful Frankenstein monster of world federalism about which they steadfastly refuse now to debate or answer frank questions concerning its aims.

That it is disadvantageous to the welfare of the American people can be proven to the satisfaction of nearly any honest citizen - but how can it be proven for our benefit and to our satisfaction when the forces of internationalism fear to come out in the open to be examined by the people and their representatives?

Those who have cried out against world government and the United Nations in the past have been invariably hounded and smeared with the big-lie technique.

Nevertheless they have spoken out in behalf of what is really best for America — and the people of this nation have responded within their hearts to the message. That is why there can be no real unity in the United States in the future until bona fide American patriotism prevails again throughout the land.

Although the false promises of New Dealism and Marxist Socialism are both high sounding on the surface - more so than enlightened capitalism sometimes it must be admitted --- they cannot pay off when it comes to results on the line.

There are few real results to be had from Socialism in any of its forms; it is only famous for its false promises and apologies. Can we honestly compare such a mirage favorably with our own form of capitalism which presently produces the most substantial accomplishments in the world for us?

New Dealism in any of its forms must be repelled by the American people. For its devotees, both Republican and Democratic members of the cult, are now engaged in attempting to engineer us cunningly into a world government trap from which there is no return.

They hope to accomplish their maneuver next Spring at the time of the United Nations Charter revision.

Those Americans who are honest in heart and who love our Republic and its Constitution must now arise to be counted - before we are later counted out! And on a projected "sleeper play" at that. We must win the present hand which has been dealt us from below the edge of the table. There may not be another round again.

Destruction of our American way of life and the Infamous subservience of our Constitution to the Alger Hiss inspired United Nations Charter would be the most ugly and reactionary blow against the freedom of mankind earned from hateful tyronny which the world might

I want to quote from a radio address made by Dean Clarence E. Manion, He says:

"This network time has been purchased by the contributions of hundreds of your fellow-citizens. I am not accepting any of this money for myself. The work entailed in the preparation and delivery of these addresses will represent my attempt to match the patriotic sacrifices of those who have made this venture possible, Truthfully, I cannot afford to take this time and effort from my private business any more than you can atford to listen now and act later upon what I shall have to say. But let me tell you something: This mounting crisis in our history has long since passed the point where it can be solved merely with what you and I can afford. Only by painful pinching sacrifice on the part of every American who loves liberty, can the

bright promise of American civilization be redeemed. Observe that I used the word "redeemed," and precisely . . . because the bright American promise is now in an international pawnshop. It has been flagrantly pledged, in other words, and the time for its redemption by your understanding action is rapidly passing away.

"What did you do last July 4th? You enjoyed the holiday probably, and so did I. But the first American Fourth of July was no holiday. It was a hard-working day for the men in the Continental Congress, and when night fell, the independence of the new United States had been officially declared. For the ultimate redemption of that independence, the signers pledged their lives, fortunes and sacred honor-The chances for redemption were slim indeed, but valor, determination and sacrifice overcame the odds. When victory finally came it was retroactive to July 4th, 1776. That is the great day upon which the bright promise of American civilization was officially born.

"Thereafter we took our hardwon independence most seriously. On the international scene we did precisely and consistently what was best for the United States and for the freedom and happiness of American citizens. Our national independence was the supporting predicate of our freedom, which is limited constitutional government. Independence Ikewise immunized us from the successive contagions of despostism which plagued the old world with torture and terror. swarmed into the United States from every country on earth. 
