The computers are coming to Pampa's schools

EDITOR'S NOTE: On Tuesday night the board of trustees of the Pampa Independent School District voted to accept a number of recommendations suggested by its Long-Range Planning Committee. One of the developments is a plan to incorporate "computer literacy" into the public school

Students, staff and faculty in the Pampa public school system all will receive computer instruction and use skills starting with the next school year as Pampa moves toward instituting computer training at all levels, an action approved by the school board this week.

The program will be introduced in several steps. 'The cost is so great we can't do it all at once," said John English, assistant superintendent of schools.

The introduction of computer use throughout the school system is one of the sweeping changes recommended by the Long-Range Planning Committee, headed by school board member Ken Fields.

The plan for implementation of computer use "gives us flexibility to change directions," English said. New computers will be purchased over the next several years. allowing for changes in software in the growing computer

Initially, the elementary schools will receive the main thrust of implementing the new program.

First priority, according to a report submitted to and approved by the board, will go to supplying computers for use in the fourth grade classes, beginning with the 1984-1985 school year. Software will be acquired for use in the language arts classes, with at least one computer purchased for each fourth grade class. Computers in each building will rotate among the classrooms.

Due to the limited number of computers initially available, students will have to be rotated between the computers and other lessons on the days when the computers are in the rooms, the report indicated. Some of the software to be selected should be suitable for group work, allowing more than one student to be at each

The committee suggested particular attention should also be paid to software for remedial use and for use by advanced students.

When the computers are not in use by the fourth grade. they will be available for use by other teachers in the building, especially by the third and fifth grades and

The committee recommended the second priority be to increase the number of computers available for the eighth grade Computer Awareness course and the high school Computer Math course. Both courses should begin expanding beyond the current enrollments when more computers are purchased.

The third priority is to begin evaluation of software for special education purposes, using dedicated special education funds to purchase software and hardware, the committee suggested.

During the next school year, additional plans will be made for the expansion of computer use into other areas in the school system. Teachers and coordinators will determine the needs in each subject area, including software evaluation, visits to other schools using computers and attendance at teacher conventions.

The program calls for computer use in the elementary schools to spread from the fourth grade to the third and fifth grades. Eventually, computer use will reach all of the grades from kindergarten through the fifth.

The committee noted plans need to be made next year concerning the placement of the computers, with emphasis on the question of computer labs versus mobile computers.

Students in the middle school will be tested to determine their competency in the required computer literacy course at the end of the sixth grade. The test will determine which students need further exposure to the computer to meet the state's requirements. Students failing the test will take a computer literacy course during the seventh grade.

Students new to the local school system in the seventh or eighth grades not able to pass the literacy test should be placed in either the literacy course or the Computer Awareness course, depending on their math abilities, the committee recommended.

The committee suggested the high school Computer Math course be expanded gradually beyond the three current sections. Additionally, either a data processing course or an introduction to programming course should be started in the Business Education Department to provide an alternative for students in the academic track.

Upon full implementation by 1987-1988, a lab of at least 12 computers will be needed for these two programs, the committee reported. Due to the number of other potential uses for computers in both the business and math departments, it may become necessary to establish

Andropov's death ends rumors

MOSCOW (AP) — President Yuri V. Andropov died Thursday at age 69, the Soviet Union announced today He led the Communist Party for 15 months. ailing and out of public view the final six months of his leadership

The announcement of his death ended months of reports that he was seriously ill with kidney and heart problems and suffering from diabetes. He had not been seen in public since Aug. 18. when he met with nine U.S. Democratic

The Kremlin withheld announcement of his death for nearly 24 hours, and there was no word on a possible successor

But if the Kremlin rulers decide to turn over the reins of power to a vounger generation, the names most frequently mentioned are Grigory V Romanov, 61, and Mikhail

Andropov's death was announced at 2:20 p.m. (6:20 a.m. EST) by the official Soviet news agency Tass, on its English-language wire. Tass said he died Thursday, but did not give a cause

The only official comment on Andropov's health came when he missed the early November parade through Red Square. Officials said then he was suffering from a cold

Andropov's brief tenure was marked by a deterioration of relations with the United States and the rupture of talks between the superpowers on limiting both strategic and medium range nuclear weapons Relations were subject to additional strain on Sept 1. 1982 when the Soviet Union shot down a South Korean jetliner with the loss of

U.S. defense officials said his death is unlikely to make any changes in the Kremlin's military policies, but could lead to resumption of arms talks between the two countries

Andropov, former head of the KGB secret police for 15 years, took the leadership of the nation of 280 million people after the death of President Leonid I. Brezhnev on Nov. 9, 1982 Brezhnev led the country for 18 years

He started a campaign to crack down on corruption and enhance labor discipline and had placed his proteges in many key positions of the Soviet

Although Andropov was known to be ailing, the Kremlin issued a series of statements and speeches bearing his name and officials continued to insist until the end that he was functioning and making decisions

The Soviet people heard the news when a black-suited announcer read the death announcement slowly and

solemnly on Soviet television He said: The Central Committee of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union, the Presidium of the U.S.S.R. and the U.S.S.R. Council of Ministers with deep sorrow inform the party and the entire Soviet people that Yuri Vladimirovich Andropov, general secretary of the CPSU Central Committee, president of the Presidium of the U.S.S.R. Supreme Soviet, died after a long illness at 16 hours 50 minutes on Feb. 9. 1984.

The name of Yuri Vladimirovich Andropov, an outstanding leader of the Communist Party and of the Soviet state, a staunch fighter for the ideals of Communism and for peace, will always remain in the hearts of the Soviet people of the whole progressive humanity

The same report followed shortly afterward on the Russian language Tass wire and Soviet television showed a photograph of the Kremlin. interrupting its programming

There was no announcement of funeral plans.

On Friday morning - which dawned with the first steady snowfall in Moscow in weeks - Soviet radio and television abandoned most scheduled programming and played classical music, often a sign that a prominent figure has died.

Because of the mixture of classical music, documentary films, and winter Olympics programming on Soviet TV there had been some speculation that a figure less prominent than Andropov



'Flash' and 'Buck' tell of free flight

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) -Challenger's two spacewalkers, who call themselves "Flash Gordon and Buck Rogers," said today their free flights outside the shuttle paved the way for repairing a crippled satellite on the next mission and for building space stations piece-by-piece in orbit. Calling his jet-pack "a beautiful

flying machine." Robert Stewart said. 'Absolutely, it's ready for the the Solar Max flight The jet-powered back packs, which

Stewart and Bruce McCandless flew flawlessly during two untethered space walks, are to be used by another shuttle crew in April to retrieve the Solar Max satellite for replacement of a defective electronics box. The satellite has been ailing in orbit since it was launched four years ago.

Challenger's five crewmen discussed their mission in a long-distance news conference as they neared the end of their journey. heading for the first shuttle landing in Florida on Saturday, with their flight log reflecting both major disappointments and the exhilarating successes of man's first unanchored space walks. Reporters at the Johnson Space Center in Houston asked the questions

Beyond Solar Max and the servicing of satellites. McCandless said their successful checkouts of the jet-pack opens the way for astronauts "to do by the space shuttle. With President Reagan's recent endorsement of a permanent orbiting station, that work is expected to start early in the 1990s.

Asked to assess the mission. commander Vance Brand said the failure of two communications satellites to fire into the proper orbits was "an extreme disappointment." even though they were deployed properly by Stewart and Ronald

Pilot Robert Gibson said the walks put us on top of the world.

Brand disclosed that the spacewalkers referred to themselves as "Flash Gordon and Buck Rogers" and he said the crew got an unexpected bonus when a foot restraint floated away from the shuttle during the second space walk. and he guided Challenger close so McCandless could reach out and grab

After the session, commander Brand and his crew shut down experiments and stowed gear as they prepared to return to Earth on Saturday. They checked their flight control systems and pronounced them in perfect working order

The landing target Saturday is a 15,000-foot runway just four miles from the launch pad from where Challenger started its journey last Friday. Touchdown time is 7.19 a.m.

landing attempt at the Kennedy Space Center here turned to optimism Thursday as an expected storm moved away from the area. "Right now, it's looking real good for KSC. the astronauts were told

The weather forecast called for light, scattered clouds, unlimited visibility and winds 9 miles an hour out of the south.

The only previous attempt to land a shuttle in Florida, last July, was erased by fog and rain, with the flight diverted to Edwards Air Force Base. Calif., where eight of the nine earlier flights have ended. One mission

returned to White Sands, N.M. because of wet runways in California.

NASA wants to start landing the shuttle at Cape Canaveral regularly to save money and cut down turnaround time between flights.

Spacewalkers McCandless and Stewart were in the spotlight again Thursday as they went outside the ship for a second time to test-fly their jet-powered backpacks, maneuvering without safety lines in and around Challenger's open cargo bay as the ship sped along at 17,400 mph 170 miles above the Earth.

Price of food surges upward

WASHINGTON (AP) - Wholesale prices surged 0.6 percent in January their biggest one-month rise in 14 months — as food prices skyrocketed 2.7 percent, the government said today

Pacing the sharpest food price climb since August 1980 were a 92 percent gain for pork prices, a 7 percent increase for vegetable prices and a 3.2 percent hike for beef prices.

The overall gain surprised analysts. who had expected that the moderate increases of recent months would be recorded into 1984 Last year's 0.6 percent rise had been the best 12-month showing in two decades

And, while analysts had expected food prices to rise last month as a result of the harsh winter weather that devastated crops, livestock and poultry in much of the South and Midwest, the size of the increase had not been forecast.

Meat prices had fallen in the autumn as producers sent their livestock to slaughter rather than pay feed prices sent sharply higher by the summer's drought. But, with supplies diminished. meat prices are resuming their climb. In December, beef prices were up 6.3 percent.

As for last month, food price gains were also posted for poultry, up 2.9 percent; fish, up 5.6 percent; coffee, 2.6 percent Fresh fruit prices fell 3.5 percent.

Over the last year, food has become steadily more expensive. Vegetable prices have risen 50.5 percent; egg prices have gained 66.1 percent, and poultry costs have increased 24.5 percent

Today's report from the Labor Department recorded a 1.2 percent decline in energy prices. The calculation, which reflected December price activity, reflected the largest single-month decline since April and the sixth decline in the last seven

Gasoline prices fell a sharp 1.6 percent, about the same as in the previous two months, while home heating oil prices plunged 3.4 percent, more than double the two previous months' declines Natural gas prices rose 0.9 percent.

Over the last 12 months, energy prices have fallen 6.9 percent. Gasoline prices are off 9.3 percent and heating oil prices have dropped 10.8 percent

Analysts expect those costs to begin climbing in the next few months, however, because of heating oil supplies diminished during the winter.

The energy price calculations reported today lag a month behind the rest of the Producer Price Index for finished goods because energy companies report their prices too late for inclusion in the most recent index.

Price changes that show up at the wholesale level are a good barometer of how food, energy and other commodity prices will move at the retail level. The Consumer Price Index, though, checks for a broader range of items, including housing and medical care, than does the wholesale inflation index.

In all, wholesale prices fell a seasonally adjusted 0.2 percent in November and rose by 0.2 percent in December.

Detailing last month's price activity, the Labor Department offered these

-New car prices rose 0.3 percent, the same as in December. Light truck prices were up 0.8 percent, a bit ahead of the December increase.

-Capital equipment costs rose 10.1 percent, half the 0.2 percent gain of the preceding month.

The first level will consist of a six-hour workshop for all professional staff to cover general computer capabilities. concentrating on specific software currently available in the system This will include word processing. administrative aids such as grade averaging programs, worksheet and puzzle generators and educational software

The goal for the first workshop will be to provide the staff with some specific skills on the computer, to acquaint them with the equipment and to help them get comfortable with



Post contains the carcasses of more than 550 coyotes

COLLINSVILLE, Texas (AP) - Across the road from Robert Child's weather-beaten farmhouse stands a snarled wooden landmark that attracts a lot more flies than it does people.

Those who have seen it, a lone pole planted on the flatlands of southwest Grayson County, call it the "wolf post." On it have hung the bones and carcasses of more than 550 coyotes that have either strayed into Child's steel leg traps, or strayed into range of his rifle.

"I just hang 'em there for people to see," the 82-year-old retired farmer says. "You'd be surprised at the people who come by here and take pictures of it. They even drive from town (Sherman) to take a look at it.

Child, who has lived here since moving from West Texas in 1910, said he and his father erected the post 40 years ago as a telephone pole. He's been hanging carcasses on it since 1971.

"I went to hang them coyotes on a power line post, but they said I better not put 'em there because it might cause trouble," he

Seated in his blue pickup truck, Child proudly pulls a stack of faded photographs from the glove box and begins peeling back through the years, spinning stories about the rangy predators he has trapped and hunted

since he was a boy "The first time I ever set a trap was on my birthday when I was 17 years old," he recounts. "That evening I walked over to it and saw I'd caught one. I killed him by

throwing rocks at him. He carries a gun when he checks his traps

now and, listening to him talk, one has little doubt as to his marksmanship. "I went over to tend my cows one evening

and I saw 'em staring at something across the fence. I looked over and saw more (covotes) than I could count. I started shooting and killed eight of 'em,'' he recalls.

"They (coyotes) just can't figure out how I hit 'em running," he says with a smile. "But · I've been shooting a gun since I was knee high

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

The free market and government

Sometimes you find bits of enlightment unexpectedly. This one was found way back in the pages of a California newspaper

Up in the corner of the page was a brief story about a Silicon Valley company that is working on a microchip the firm believes could greatly increase the security of computers against hackers. Next to it was a much longer story about the U.S. Forest Service spending \$37 million to develop what would be the world's largest aircraft, combining helicopters and a blimp, designed to retrieve timber from out-of-the-way places.

The microchip envisioned by Sierra Microsystems Inc., is simplicity itself. It would electronically encode-scramble-the secret passwords needed to gain access to computer systems, thus making it infinitely more difficult for hackers to determine passwords by trial and error. The company thinks there may be a \$100 million world-wide market for such a microchip and thinks the firm can begin producing it in about a year.

The aircraft being built by a Philadelphia firm under contract to the forest service, meanwhile, is a Rube Goldberg contraption standing 10 stories high and consisting essentially of a blip attached to a frame, which in turn is attached to four helicopters. It is designed to lift twice as much weight as the largest existing helicopter.

The market for this aircraft? Well, the government's own General Accounting Office says that lumber companies had not been contacted before the project got underway, but found in its own survey that "it is questionable whether the aircraft...will have practical application as a timber harvesting method." The president of the firm building the prototype-not scheduled to fly, by the way, until 1986-says, however, that timber companies he knows are interested. But it's a peculiar type of interest. "They don't want to develop it he says, "but said, 'Bring it around and we'll lease it today'." The GAO has also expressed doubt about the design of the aircraft—essentially about whether the frame around the blimp is strong enough. There you have it. In the first case, the market

responds quickly and efficiently to a real demand (computer security) and private firms take the risk that the demand may not live up to estimates. In the second case, the government responds slowly and expensively to a questionable demand for a product about which there are doubts it will even work. And the government risks our money to do it.

Canceling the \$37 million contract for his helicopter-assisted blimp would not make much of a dent in the federal deficit. But every little bit helps.

It'll be Reagan by a landslide

NEW YORK (NEA) - Regular readers of this column will have been spared the amazement of, say, Bill Safire's aficionados at Ronald Reagan's decision to seek re election. As I have reported consistently for years, Mr. Reagan positively enjoys the presidency and has a great many more things that he want to do for America before stepping down from it. Only serious ill health would have deterred him from running for a second term.

Safire, to my surprise, turned out to be simply a dicethrower. Without a clue as to Mr. Reagan's real intentions, he solemnly predicted that the president would not run again - leaving me, and I am sure many others, wondering uneasily what Safire knew that we didn't. If Reagan had in fact stepped down, Safire would have looked like the ultimate insider. Instead, he has egg on his face - and deservedly so.

There is more excuse for those oracles on the liberal left and the freaked - out right who let their private hopes in the matter influence their judgement. James Reston led the way, sighing gratefully just after Mr. Reagan's election in 1980 that at least the

age issue would rule out any possibility of a second term. I demurred at the time, suggesting playfully that Reston (who is slighly older than Reagan) might want to blaze the trail by retiring first. But Reston didn't accept my proposal

Among the Washington press corps, Lou Cannon in particular deserves a teasing chuck under the chin. He has been covering Reagan since his days as governor of California, and ought to have understood better the character of the man he was watching. But ideological blinders can obscure almost anything, and in Cannon's case the liberal wish overpowered all else, and dictated the journalistic thought: In his 1982 book, "Reagan," Cannon flatly predicted that the president would not run

Over on the other side of the divide, New Right activist Richard Viguerie shared with the liberals a disapproval of Ronald Reagan so powerful that it affected his judgement: He, to, declared that Mr. Reagan would decide not to run again.

Of such Democratic prognasticators as House Speaker Tip O'Neill and New York Gov. Mario Cuomo. both of whom insisted that they could not imagine a Reagan candidacy for re - election, little need be said. There isn't a Democratic politician in America who hasn't prayed daily for three years that his party would be spared facing Reagan at the polls again; O'Neill and Cuomo simply managed to convince themselves that the Lord would answer

They would have done better to consult Ted Kennedy. Teddy attributed his own decision not to run in 1984 to a desire to spend more time with his children; but you will find few political observers who think he will want to spend as much time with them in 1988 as he does in 1984. Teddy's real motive in sitting out this year's election is simple: He knows enough to get out of the way when the California Express is coming down the track.

Mr. Reagan enters the campaign as an almost prohibitive favorite. His managers, Ed Rollins and Frank Fahrenkopf, quite properly speak of a "tough, close" race: Overconfidence must of course be avoided like poison ivy. But it is hard to remember when a party out of power has been as short of issues as the Democrats are today. Never mind the sharp tax cuts, the end of inflation. the lowered interest rates, the buildup of our defenses, the Grenada operation; even unemployment, an issue to which they had clung like castaways to a raft, has capsized.

When Jimmy Carter stepped down, the unemployment rate was 7.4 percent and rising; today it is 8.0 - but falling month by

That leaves the deficits, and the Democrats can be counted on to try to undermine the voters' confidence in the current economic recovery with dire predictions of deficit - induced horrors in 1985 and thereafter. When they nominate Fritz Mondale, all the favorable publicity will briefly elavate that pleasant fellow's ratings in the polls, and Gallup and Harris will report breathlessly that Mondale is "narrowing the gap" - that the election, in fact, is now "too close to call."

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But on Wednesday morning, Nov. 7, it will transpire that Ronald Reagan has been reelected by a handsome margin. Just remember: You read it here first.



When I was married 11 years ago, my husband asked my father in a joshing way, "Well, do you think we'll make it?"

Father grinned and answered, "Sure - if you learn to overlook a lot."

I was a little hurt at first, because I thought he was implying that I was difficult to live with, and I knew there was more than a hint of truth in that. With the passing years, however, I've concluded that he wasn't talking about me, but philosophizing

about marriage in general. It does seem that overlooking each other's flaws is an important element. For example, my husband reads several newspapers and magazines most evenings, dropping each on the floor when he's finished. Then he's apt to get up and walk off to another room, where he begins the process all over again. It annoys me - just as I annoy him complaining about it in my

peevish voice "Don't be so critical of me," he mutters.

That's when I think Katharine Hepburn was right. She said once: "Sometimes I wonder if men and women really suit each other. Perhaps they should live next door and just visit now and then.'

Of course, I don't really believe that. The fact that my husband lives easily in his clutter, and I do not, does not affect our love and respect for each other. There's a basic good feeling rooted deep beneath the minor annovances

Psychologists and sociologists have spent years trying to figure out what makes a good marriage. Two of the many researchers are Sol Gordon, head of the Syracuse University Institute for Family Research and Education, and Kathleen Everly, formerly of the institute.

They came up with a 10 - ingredient recipe for abiding love that put sensitivity and respect at the top of the list. Sex and sharing household chores came out at the bottom. In between were such ingredients as a sense of

to compromise who you are or what you want to be, tolerance for each other's weak spots and acceptance of each other's likes and dislikes and level of energy.

In his book, "Marriage," David Edens, a clinical psychologist at Stephens College, Columbia, Mo., compares matrimony to buying a record: You buy it for what's on one side but you have to take the flip side. too. Getting divorced is something like the hole in the middle.

We all know that marriages pass through strenuous stages. After the sweet and often short newlywed stage comes the much more difficult parental stage

"How did we know that babies would lose half of every feeding, leaving us with a wardrobe comprised of blouses with yellow shoulder stains?" wrote Marilyn Ryan in "Making a Marriage," the book she co authored with her husband, Kevin.

"Where did we learn to pick up roots and

rugs," she continued, "and move with the company every three years? We married for love and affection, not for fixing the overflowing toilet." According to psychologist Edens, one study found that couples changed more than 50 percent of their values.

"Few people," he concluded, "wake up on their 25th anniversary to find that they are the same as when they married."

The ability to grow, adjust expectations and change together is apparently the clue to a successful long - term union.

Perhaps actor and "MASH" star Alan Alda said it best when he commented on his 25 - year - marriage to photographer Arlene

"It's occurred to me recently that being with people you love over a long period of time is like creating a work of art. Nobody's ever done it before, not in your particular

Nurse wants to testify in her own defense

GEORGETOWN, Texas (AP) - Genene Jones, who sat silently as 44 witnesses told a story that points to her as a baby-killer, wants to testify on her own behalf, but her lawyers are not convinced it's a good idea.

A source close to the defense says Ms. Jones has made it clear she wants to take the stand, but that no decision has been made on whether she will testify.

Defense lawyers, who opened their case Thursday, are wary of a courtroom confrontation between Ms. Jones and Kerr

County District Attorney Ron Sutton. The decision on whether she will testify could be a tough one for defense lawyers. Attorneys can face legal malpractice

suits from defendants they tell not to testify. Ms. Jones, a 33-year-old mother of two, is accused of using a muscle relaxant to kill 15-month-old Chelsea McClellan on Sept. 17, 1982. Chelsea was one of six children who suffered mysterious seizures after getting injections from Ms. Jones,

who worked for a Kerrville pediatrician. The state's case, a circumstantial one, portrayed Ms. Jones as an aggressive nurse who made children sick in order to convince Kerrville hospital officials that they needed a pediatric intensive care unit.

Defense lawyer Jim Brookshire on Thursday opened his case with three witnesses who contradicted portions of the state's case. Before starting his case, he told reporters he would try to show that Chelsea was not a murder victim, just a sick child who died.

One of Brookshire's witnesses opened that possibility Thursday by recalling what a weeping Petti McClellan, Chelsea's mother, said when nurse Jones handed her the

baby's body moments after her death. "She'll wake up in a few minutes. She's done this before. She'll wake up," emergency medical technician Tommy

James of Kerrville recalled the mother saying. The first major defense witness was Debbie Soltenfuss, a

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - Mexico wants the United States to stop blaming the unrest in Central America on "communism" and start pushing for social and economic reform, an expert on diplomatic relations says.

Differing views on how to deal with the Central American region constitute the "single most important political issue" between the U.S. and Mexico, said Dr. Gabriel Szekely

"All of the United States" efforts have been aimed at controlling communism rather than promoting social and economic change,' Szekely said Thursday.

'We hope the Reagan administration at some point will be willing to listen to other alternatives for peace in the region," he said:

Szekely, a full-time professor and researcher at the Center of Industrial Studies in Mexico City, addressed members of the Texas Daily Newspaper Association during a special seminar on relations between Mexico and the U.S.

The group planned to meet in Mexico City today with President Miguel de la

Szekely said that Reagan's highly publicized Bipartisan Commission on Central new answers or innovative solutions

"It wasn't anything that everybody hadn't heard before," he said.

Szekely also said the U.S. should stop cursing the several hours and it was impossible to "get an IV pole in that unit (bubble)

Ms. Griffin said the boy has no rash. She did not know whether he was undergoing tests of his liver.

Rappaport said David was one of about 100 patients who have received bone marrow transplants from less than perfect donors. That means the 1 2-3 ounces of tissue from his 15-year-old sister, Katherine, did not perfectly match David's

The donor marrow had been treated with monoclonal antibodies, which are designed to kill mature T-cells. T-cells are key antibodies in the body's defense against disease. But doctors said transplanted mature T-cells might attack their new body, mistaking it for an outside infection.


Rappaport said the treatment is designed to leave immature T-cells, which should then develop into cells accustomed to their new environment and form an immune system.

If the treatment is "successfully done, graft versus host disease shouldn't occur," he said. "If he has that kind of reaction, the possibilities are, one, all the (mature T-) cells are not cleaned out and they've expanded, or secondly, a more immature T-cell has now grown up and is now causing the

Arms control chief confident in duties

WASHINGTON (AP) - A year ago, Kenneth Adelman's nomination to head the U.S. nuclear arms control and disarmament agency hung by a thread.

His qualifications were being challenged, especially by senators who questioned President Reagan's commitment to curbing nuclear weapons.

In April, the White House twisted some arms and Adelman squeezed through, 57-42

Now he sits in a spacious office at the State Department, unassuming in an unseasonal short-sleeve yellow shirt and fetching a cup of coffee for the reporter interviewing him. Adelman answers

questions about U.S. nuclear policy with care and confidence. The only notes he has prepared relate to his handling of the agency and his access to the president.

During the Senate hearings, critics accused him of planning a purge of an already demoralized staff.

They suggested he lacked the clout to play a major role in shaping policy and would not press his views on the White House

Adelman insisted he was no milquetoast and that he also would keep Congress advised.

The 38-year-old director read from the cards: from April through the end of 1983 he participated in eight National Security Council meetings on arms control with the president, saw Reagan six other times in the Oval Office or the Situation Room, had 50 meetings with members of Congress, 84 meetings with foreign officials and made 11 speeches.

He has started a special seminar on arms control and another to keep assistant directors in close touch with their staffs.

All major agency jobs have been filled and there will be expansion: 20 more slots over the next few years and a budget increase of 10 percent. "A good sign of support," Adelman says.

His loyalty to the man in the White House and his policies "There is no signature on

agreements because the Soviets have not been reasonable in their approach," he says. "We are willing to sit down and talk about our differences."

Is arms control a winning issue, then, for Reagan as he seeks re-election?

"It's a winning issue for those who know U.S. proposals, which very few people do, to tell the truth,'

"I think the administration has reason to be proud on arms control," he says. "I think we have gone into an approach of real reductions and greater stability through arms control that is not something that has been tried

Back then, Adelman says, 'arms control was more a legitimization of increases on both sides.

At this juncture, nuclear weapons negotiations are stalemated, although the Americans and the Soviets appear to be having productive talks on strengthening the

"hotline" and next month will resume talks in Vienna on a mutual reduction of ground forces in central Europe.

Adelman is against merging the suspended negotiations on Euromissiles with those on strategic nuclear weapons. "It would make the talks far more complex," he says.

He doen't think other channels ought to be developed to substitute for the stalemate in Geneva. People, he says, "are always looking for an answer in arms control that doesn't have to do with Soviet policy. Either the framework is wrong, or the forum is wrong, or the channel is wrong.

And Adelman does not agree with the theory that the Soviets are taking a hard line because the military is on the ascendancy in Moscow.

On arms control issues, he says, "the military has always been dominant.

Adelman credits the Soviets with making some positive moves before the talks broke down. particularly in their stand on

But he says the Soviets still insist on having a monopoly blocking new U.S. intermediate-range nuclear missiles while retaining at least some of the SS-20s they have targeted on the NATO allies.

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

By STEWART TAGGART **Associated Press Writer** HONOLULU (AP) -Hawaiians knew Ronald Rewald only as a society figure, the owner of a polo club on Oahu's north shore. until the day he was found by the manager of the Sheraton Waikiki with his wrists slashed.

That was the day after a television station reported that state and federal agencies were looking into the financial activities of Rewald's investment counseling firm.

- Since then the plot has thickened. Rewald survived his suicide attempt, but his name has become entangled with the CIA, his firm has gone bankrupt, he has been charged with theft by deception, and authorities say he may have stolen millions of dollars from investors and used the money for his polo club, lavish home and a fleet of fancy cars.

Now he has joined forces with his former clients to sue the CIA, saying the agency may be the key to as much as \$17 million in missing funds.

The lawsuit, filed Tuesday in U.S. District Court in Honolulu, seeks \$671 million from the agency for damages related to the collapse of his company - Bishop, Baldwin, Rewald, Dillingham and

· But the details of the suit are still secret. The specific grounds of the case may not be released, under an order signed by U.S. District Judge Martin Pence.

The CIA has acknowledged using Rewald's firm as a maildrop, but says the agency wasn't involved in the formation of the company and had nothing to do with Rewald's use of investor's funds. The agency has contended Rewald had only minor ties with the agency.

Investors say otherwise. In a separate \$5.5 million suit against the agency, a group of Northern California investors contend they were told by Rewald that funds placed with the firm were 'secured and backed by the full faith and credit" of the United States and guaranteed by the CIA.

That suit was filed by Robert W. Jinks of Napa, Calif., and 14 Napa County investors who say they placed \$597,938 with the firm between October 1982 and

In pressing Rewald's claim against the agency, Rewald's civil attorney, Robert Smith, has joined forces with San Francisco attorney Melvin Belli, who is representing a third group of investors who say they placed money with the firm because they thought it was connected to the CIA.

Rewald, who has been out of jail only a week, on Wednesday received permission from Circuit Judge Robert Won Bae Chang to travel to the U.S. mainland to meet with Belli in San Francisco and with Rewald's family in the Milwaukee

The same day, Rewald checked into the Sheraton Waikiki. On the morning of July 29, a manager came to Rewald's room to find out why he hadn't checked out. Rewald had slashed his wrists with a razor blade.

Among the questionable practices reportedly under investigation, according to KHON, were claims that deposits in the firm were insured to \$150,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

That would be "impossible on its face," said Mary Bitterman of the state Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs, because the FDIC only insures banks or savings and loan associations, and then only to \$100,000 per account.

Investigators were also curious about company claims to investors of guaranteed returns of 20

Rewald was charged by the state Aug. 9 with two counts of first degree theft by deception. Bail was originally set at \$10 million, the highest ever set in the state for a criminal case. That figure has been twice reduced, and Rewald was released from the Oahu Community

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

Spring enrollment in academic courses at Clarendon College, Pampa Center, increased 32 percent compared to enrollments figures for the spring semester a year ago. indicating to college officials that "there's some good teaching going on here.'

More than 300 persons enrolled. (321 to be exact) in 498 courses for the spring semester here, said Larry Gilbert, director of the

"I'm real excited about this," Gilbert said. "It means we've got some good teaching going on here. Universities have academic sessions. services and research to offer, but good teaching is typical of a community college.

Naturalization records available

Naturalization records are becoming more available, especially now that many libraries have the 11 - volume Index to Records of Aliens Declarations of Intention and - or Oaths of Allegiance, 1789 - 1880 (WPA Project No. 20837).

This index gives the person's name, the country of former allegiance, the court where he applies, and the date of the event whether it was the Declaration of Intention or Oath of Allegiance

The index lists records from five courts: Philadelphia city county courts, Court of Common Pleas, Court of Quarter Sessions, federal courts, United States Circuit Court, United States District Court and the State Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

The Historical Society of Pennsylvania, 1300 Locust Street, Philadelphia, Pa., 19107, will supply copies of the index pages for the following prepaid fees: 25 cents for each page xeroxed, \$1 service charge for each volume handled, and at least \$1 postage on the order. This would be worth the expense if you

think your ancestor became a citizen during that time.

For naturalizations that occurred after Sept. 26, 1906, write The Immigration and Naturalization Service, Washington, D.C., 20536. If you need information about citizenship granted other than in Pennsylvania and prior to Sept. 27, 1906, write the clerk of the federal, state, or other court that issued the naturalization certificate. If you are not sure of the court and know the port of entry into the country, try the federal court nearest that port

DEAR NAMELESS: If you want to know your legal rights, consult an attorney, and/or the women's rights advocate in your area. But if you can't afford to jeopardize your career, I advise you to live according to society's prevailing rules and get married before having a family.

The Speakers Endowment Fund has attracted \$2,000. Names of contributors are added each year to a plaque which hangs in the Returning Student Center in the Student Union Building.

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





Born four long years ago in the afterglow of America's astonishing hockey gold medal and fed by a a fine exhibition record, hopes for a dramatic reprise died a swift. shocking death.

In three short days, the miracle of Lake Placid became the debacle of Sarajevo. There will, almost certainly, be no gold medal for the U.S. hockey team at these Winter Olympics.

"It just seemed like you blinked and everything just ended," Ed Olczyk, whose presence and poise belie his 17 years, said in a voice cracking with emotion. "We worked so hard every day the whole year. We came out tonight and we knew it was really do or die and we gave it our all. That's all anybody can ask.'

American determination was no match for Czechoslovak talent Thursday night when a 4-1 loss killed all realistic hopes that U.S. necks once again would be draped with the medallion of Olympic hockey champions.

The disappointment flowed freely in the locker room.

"Twenty guys cried their eves out," U.S. Coach Lou Vairo said.



Human rights abuses detailed

WASHINGTON (AP) -The State Department, in its annual report on human rights abuses, says the re-emergence of far-right death squads in El Salvador last year further terrorized a nation already wracked by left-wing guerrilla violence.

The report concludes that major human rights improvements were made in Latin America during 1983 as a number of military governments - notably Argentina - moved towards democracy.

But the report said that while killings, torture, disappearances, kidnappings and other abuses diminished in El Salvador last year, "the level of political violence remains high" and persists as "a central problem.

The department's report assesses the human rights performance of all 160 members of the United Nations during 1983 in a detailed, 1,484-page account that records both abuses and progress.

One of the most hopeful developments in recent years the march of democracy in Latin America - has gone largely unnoticed," the

It cited the recent inauguration of President Raul Alfonsin who replaced a military regime in Argentina as "only the latest of a series of victories for democracy' in the region.

"Apart from Cuba. Suriname, Haiti, Guyana and Paraguay, the other 27 nations of Latin America and the Caribbean are either basically democratic, or at least nominally embarked on the transition to full democracy," the report said. It noted that since 1980 nine Latin American nations have either held free elections or announced they will do so

But the report made clear that while there are hopeful signs and bright spots, Latin America also is blighted by persistent and flagrant human rights violations.

In Guatemala, 1,600 people were said killed for political reasons during 1983, a number the report noted was less than half those killed in

However, the department said reports of "massacres and other atrocities' continued throughout the year and that Guatemalan security forces, including the army, were responsible for an unspecified number of "arbitrary deaths and disappearances.

Elsewhere in the world, the report scored the Soviet Union for "an escalation of efforts to eliminate free expression" that focused on Christians Jews free trade union organizers, and independent peace activists.

It said North Korea runs one of the most highly regimented and controlled (societies) in the world today," that Albania is "one of the most totalitarian regimes" and that Iran is one of the world's worst human rights abusers with a record marked last year by continuing executions and increased and "barbaric" persecution of the Bahai religious sect.

Among U.S. allies, the report notes the continuing furor over the government investigation into the assassination of opposition political leader Benigno Aguino in the Philippines

Crackdown on unpaid tickets is underway

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — The police chief has issued an ultimatum to thousands of motorists with unpaid traffic tickets: either pay up during a two-week amnesty period or expect a uniformed officer at the door.

People who have failed to pay their tickets have until the end of February before Police Chief Charles Rodriguez begins sending out beefed-up teams armed with arrest warrants.

"We don't relish bringing people in on warrants. We're not interested in taking people to jail. We just want them to pay their fines," Rodriguez said.

More than 72,000 outstanding arrest warrants have piled up in the past three years against people who have ignored repeated notices to pay traffic fines, the chief said.

The intent of this is to have people come in, pay their fines and clear those warrants out of the system," he said. A grace period will be in effect from Monday until Feb. 29,

during which the Municipal Court will subtract the \$6 warrant fee usually applied to outstanding tickets." Rodriguez said. Special court sessions also have been planned the last two Saturdays of the month to handle the expected overflow of

More than half of the tickets were issued to motorists driving cars without licenses, and the rest include violations of city environmental ordinances and state laws such as public

intoxication, assault and failure to appear in court. The chief estimated that about 30 percent of the names contained on the warrants might be fictitious.

"In many cases when people are stopped and have no identification, they are issued tickets and released," he said. 'In most places, they would be subject to arrest. Redriguez said he expected quite of a few of the outstanding warrants to be cleared up by people who hear about the

amnesty program and come in to pay their fines. "We're hoping most of the people will come in on their own," he said. "The people we have to go out and get probably wouldn't come in anyway."

Withdrawal announcement surprised military

Marine commandant Gen. P.X. Kelley was apparently surprised by President Reagan's announcement of a phased withdrawal of Marines from Beirut, according to congressional

Other top military advisers are disputing the exact time the decision was made.

Kelley, in a secret briefing Tuesday afternoon to the Senate Armed Services Committee which ended less than an hour before Reagan's statement, gave the senators no indication a decision to move the Marines was imminent, the sources said Thursday, speaking only on condition they not be identified.

Later, after the White House statement, Kelley telephoned some senators who had been in the briefing to say he had not meant to mislead them, said the sources. The general said that "had he known the details of the information that came out, he would have given more of it," said one

Another source who attended the briefing said, the announcement

completely surprised him." A third source said Kelley was apparently "not aware of the timing" of the decision.

Members of the Senate Armed Services panel appeared to accept Kelley's explanation that he was unaware of the pending decision when he spoke with

WASHINGTON (AP) - them at the briefing, the sources said.

"I don't think Congress has been purposefully misinformed by the military leadership," said one senator, speaking on condition he not be named.

Kelley is a member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the president's principal military advisers. Although he has no legal command authority over the Marines in Beirut, it would be highly unusual for him not to know of such a decision.

Kelley's apparent surprise about the decision added a new twist to the question of



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
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
