The advice came from Col. Homer Garrison, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, who told a convention of the International in her contest with the United States for leadership in the United Na-Association of Chiefs of Police:

"With the threat of atomic war hanging over our heads, I do not see how those of us who are charged with preserving the public safety of the nation can do any less than to plan against every sort of disaster, whether from fire or flood or explosion or warfare.

Half of Gold Pot To Be Divided Now

VASHINGTON --- P--- An Allied Big Three commission has agreed to make a prompt distribution of part of a \$330,000,000 gold store seized during the war from the Germans as a means of helping meet critical financial needs of European countries.

Undersecretary of State Robert Lovett said today that representatives of the United States, Britain and France, forming a "gold pot" commission, agreed to restore the gold to those countries from which it was looted by the Nazis.

Lovett told a news conference that only about half of the gold pot can be distributed immediately. In answer to a question, Lovett said he believes use of the gold will not eliminate the need for stop-gap emergency aid for Western Europe from the United States.



WASHINGTON- (AP) -President Truman called a special cabinet meeting (for 2 p. m. EST) today to discuss what was officially describ-as the "general food situation."

Presumably the cabinet will dis-cuss appeals from western Europe for additional relief and the possible effect this might have on the high cost of living in this country.

Even Ayers, assistant White House press secretary, told reporters an expected White House statement on the European emergency aid program will not be forthcoming to-night. It may possibly come tomor-row since the President will hold a press conference at 9:30 a. m. (EST).

Mr. Truman in a letter to Rep. O'Toole (D-NY) said yesterday that he is giving the matter of high prices careful attention and hopes to reach a decision " soon" as to what may to help the situation.

Before today's cabinet meeting, Mr. Truman arranged to see Secretary of Agriculture Anderson for the third consecutive day. He also had an appointment with Dr. Edwin G. Nourse, chairman of his Council of Economic Advisers.

Anderson is a member of the spe-cial Cabinet Food Committee, along with Secretary of State Marshall and Secretary of Commerce Harri-

Marshall is calling his top experts on western Europe's needs back to the United States for an intensified discussion of what this country can do to help and when.

Six of the nine cabinet members are in Washington and the remain-ing three will be represented at the meeting with Mr. Truman. Under-secretary Robert A. Lovett will at-tend from the State Department in the absence of Marshall at the United Nations General Assembly in New York.

important passages in Henry Link's latest book "The Rediscovery of Morals." His book turn to Religion" was a best seller. "The Rediscovery of Man" by Dr. Link is somewhat along the same lines as "The Rediscovery of Mora's"

Common Ground

I personally do not like the title of this book. I do not think morals need to be rediscovered. I think the individual needs to return to moral ideals. This is a minor detail, however, compared with the many wise admonitions made in this book. Here are a few of them:

Oop "Unless we can learn how to achieve peace in our relationships at home there can be little hope of maintaining peace abroad." *** "As a psyhchologist, dealing with people both as individuals and in the mass, the following conclusion has impressed itself upon me above all others; people are not nearly as bad as their ideologies. The worst devils of modern times are the false philosophies and theories which have taken possession of people. I am continuously discovering that individuals are basically better than

the education and the theories that have been literally thrust upon them." Note what Dr. Link says about

the people's education. He pretty well agrees with my ideas on public education.

I sent Dr. Link some of the editorials which appeared in this newspaper. Here is a remark he made in a letter to me:

"Let me hasten to say that of all the correspondence I have had and from all that I have heard being undertaken by busi-nessmen and publishers, nothing Wash can match your program of courage and definiteness. I hope you will continue your challenging editorials in this connection. They are bound to bear fruit. People are beginning to waken up to the situation."

Thanks, Dr. Link, for that encouragement.

Theory Of Relative Morals

Dr. Link realizes that one of our great dangers is that too many people believe there are no moral principles that we need to live by. That the state can make its own laws in violation to these moral principles and we will not suffer. This is the way he puts it:



P. t: local manager of the Texas The program will also serve to all attention to National Handicap Week, October 5-11, Fort said.

Handicapped workers are not handicapped when placed on the right job. Fort declared. "Pampa now has only six handicapped peowho are registered for work at local office. But for these six people their problem is a 100 per-cent problem, although their handi-

aps are not 100 percent by any means," Fort said. He noted that some of the larg-est firms in the Pampa area em-ploy handicapped people and the experience of these firms has been a credit to such workers. Fort also stated 51 percent of handicapped workers have better records than non-handi-

capped workers, 49 percent have better than average absence rec-ords, 53 percent stay on the job longer, and 73 percent produce at a rate as good or better than unimpaired workers on the same jobs.
