Operating out of what Meals on $W$ heels Direct. Operating out of what Meals on Wheels Director
Ann Loter calls the "combination warehouse, office and dispensary ${ }^{\prime \prime}$ in the basement of First United
Methodist Church. Meals on Wheels dispatches Methodist Church. Meals on Wheels dispatches
about 15 drivers and other volunteers to deliver hot and hearty meals to more than 100 elderly or
handicapped handicapped Pampa residents.
The walls of what would otherwise be a tiny
Sunday school classroom are piled with shelves of Sunday school classroom are piled with shelves of
giant size canned goods: boxes of salt, spices and glant size canned goods; boxes of salt, spices and
dehydrated foods and packages of aluminum plates and plastic cups. Three refrigerators and freezers

In one case are boxes of special mixes and deserts for diabetics and others on special diets. Throughout the room are pastel doilies and stuffed

Since it began in 1978, Pampa Meals on Wheels
