justifiably, at usurpation of power by the judicial system. but that usurpation is a reality. Justices
of the Supreme Court are important ind viduals indeed The Constitution does not require those nom inated to
the Supreme Court to be judges or even lawyers. All that is constitutionally mandated is that they be nominated by
the president and confirmed by the Senate. The tradition the president and conirmed by the Senate. The radition
that they be judges of long experience in the tools of the
law one. but it could be broken without damage to the law of the land. There might be value in sumag an It is outrageous that it should be so, but the Supreme
Court is routinely called upon to decide cases whose implications go far beyond the narrow confines of what
first - year law students are enjoined to revere as The Law Supreme Court decisions aftrect (sometimes
dictate social policy, economic and regulatory policy
and have such broad implications. it might be helpputu to to have on the Supreme Court people with a broader perspective
For all the values of a legal education. such an education (and long experience in the legal system) can
lead to a certain narrowing of perspective. Lawyers and judges may come to see matters strictly in terms of
procedure and precedent. Those who have learned to revere the law may come to see prescriptive law as the
universal answer to ovirtually all of ociciety sproblems. It isnt in in many cases pr
problem than the solution.

readily than those whose perspective has been confined inside a courtroom. The knowledge of a social

Blake must make up the difference, either in grain or cash,
Marxman said. Elevators are legally responsible for maintaining
the "quality and quantity" of the grain they store. Marxman said.

As of the end of March, the
government had paid about $\$ 20$
million in storage fees to the
elever elevator, according to the GAO. The elevator has been used
primarily for primarily for storage of
government-owned grain ged in the "Payment-in-Kind" program for farmers who agreed to reduce the number of acres they plant. "There is some farmer-owned
grain in there, but farmers have not aggressively or continually used that elevator from year to
