Texas' Stepped Up Attack On Water Pollution May Slow Down

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — The chairman of the Texas Water Quality Board said Sunday his water pollution may have to be slowed down because of a shortage of funds. Gordon Fulcher of Atlanta said the state's water pollution control agency needs twice as much money as the legislature is providing to do a thorough job. Answering newsmen's questions on the weekly television panel show "Capital Eye," Fulcher said his agency has a good staff, but is undermanned and underfinanced. "As our case load gets bigger, like everybody's load in government, we don't have enough people, we don't have enough money, and we're going to be hard put before the next legislature comes around if we continue at the pace we've done for the last two or three months, trying to clean this thing up and put people in compliance and keep them there," Fulcher said. "We're going to be hard put for enough money to run out our term," he said. The present state budget expires in August 1971. Fulcher said the current spending of about \$1.6 million a year in state funds is "about 10 cents per person in Texas per year for water quality control, and I think that's mighty thin. 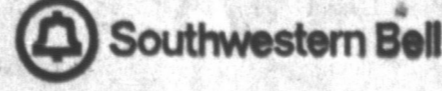

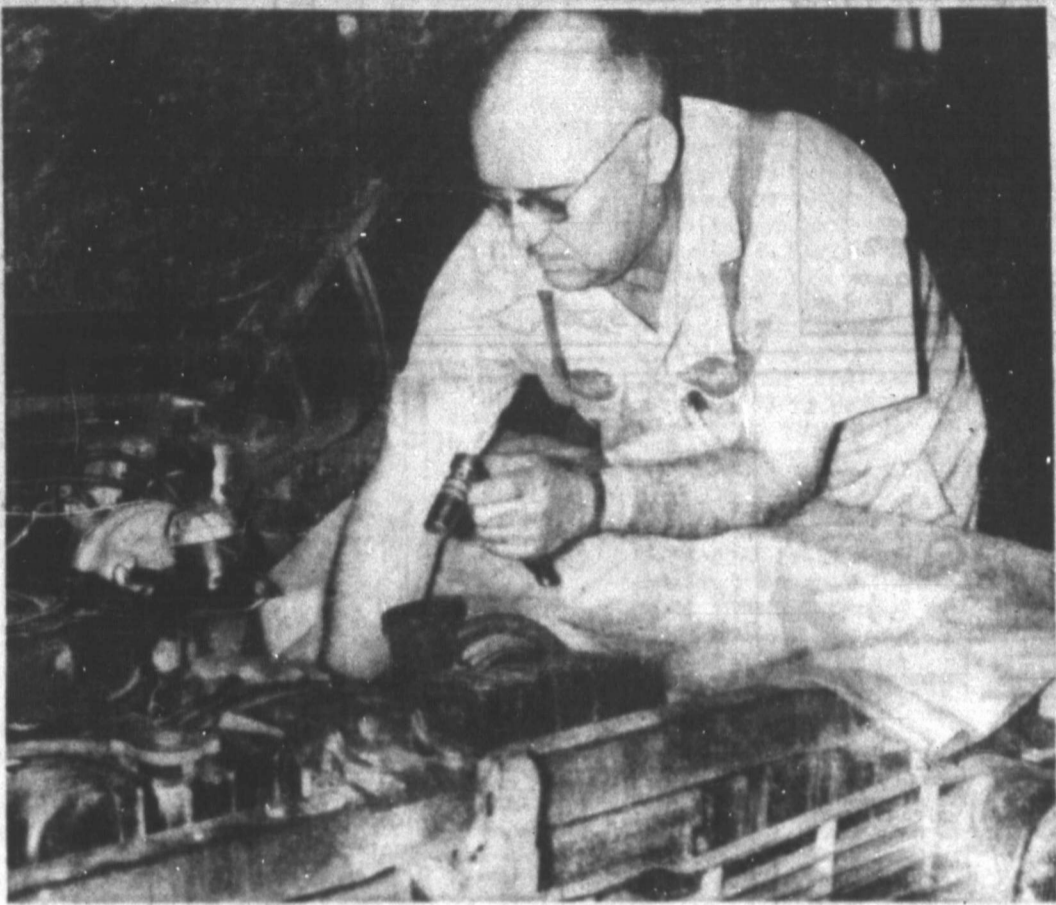

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Johnson, Fulbright Embroiled In Caustic Dispute Over Gulf

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Former President Lyndon B. Johnson and Sen. J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., were embroiled today in a caustic dispute over their dealings leading to Senate approval of the 1964 Tonkin Gulf Resolution which let Johnson escalate the Vietnam War.

"It never occurred to me that Sen. Fulbright, this Rhodes scholar, didn't understand what was in that language," Johnson asserted in a television interview.

"It never occurred to me that the President of the United States would lie to members of the Senate," Fulbright shot back in comment to newsmen.

"I was completely taken in, as was the whole Senate."

The outright clash between Johnson and Fulbright, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, was the most controversial outgrowth of an interview with the former president by Walter Cronkite, aired by CBS Friday night.

The former president speaking from the quietude of his Texas ranch, scarcely concealed his antagonism toward Fulbright and other senators who wound up in the "dove" camp on the war.

He said Fulbright and other Senate leaders had been given full briefings on the import of the resolution before it was publicly announced.

Wall Street Chatter

NEW YORK (UPI)—The market's 14-point surge Tuesday in less than two hours following Treasury Secretary David M. Kennedy's recent statement that easier credit could come sooner than most people expect is hardly likely to turn out to have been a wrong steer, Wright Advisory Reports said. The firm feels that there is no appreciable risk to those seasoned investors who buy now at "rock bottom" prices those seasoned "true blue" chips which have successfully weathered economic recession in the past.

As soon as there's some indication of a change in Federal Reserve policy, Paine, Webber, Jackson & Curtis expects to see "a rather dramatic upturn in the stock market, on a selective basis." The firm expects to see an upturn in the economy later this year and expects the market to anticipate this upturn.

From a technical standpoint it looks as if the market is in the process of tracing out an important reversal, E. F. Hutton & Co. says. Following its surge after Treasury Secretary Kennedy's remarks, the Dow Jones industrial average traced out a double bottom or "W" pattern.

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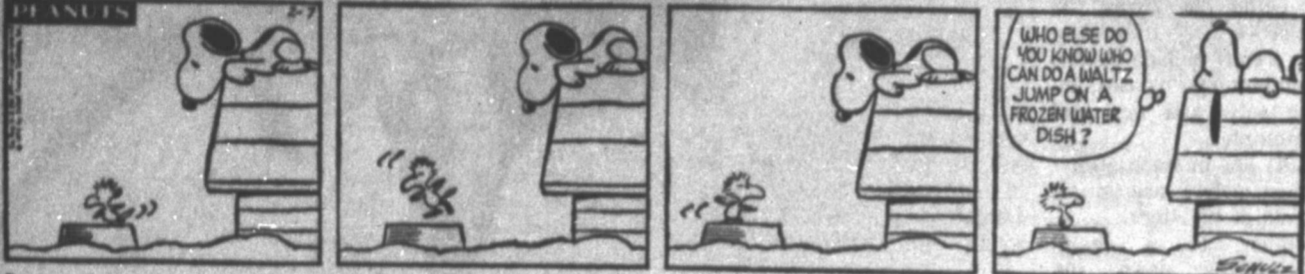
