In order to give a fair, consistant and impartial treatmen to all our crime reports emanating from the city, county and district courtrooms, the Pampa Daily News instituted the following guildelines last winter.

Driving while intoxicated cases will be reported one time only and that is at the time a plea is entered and the person is fined and sentenced.

No newspaper can set down hard, fast rules that will not have exceptions and with regard to the DWI's mentioned above we will have stories earlier if the person is involved in a traffic accident or there is extensive property damage or any harm done to a life.


