Friendly Senate Sets More Money For Trips

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Already feted by President Nixon, the heroes of Apollo 13 were called today before a Senate committee so friendly it already has authorized money for future moon flights.

Although members of the Senate Aeronautical Space Sciences Committee planned to ask astronauts about the aborted flight, spokesmen made it clear the hearing was not an investigation and signalled no slowdown of the manned space flight programs.

Navy Capt. James A. Lovell Jr. and John L. Swigert Jr. Apollo 13 astronauts, were to be joined at the hearing by Thomas O. Paine, administrator of the National Aeronauics and Space Administration (NASA); Recco Petrone, Apollo program director; and Glynn S. Lunney, Apollo flight director. Fred W.
